Nothing Less than the Best

Through the parable of the 'Talents' Jesus teaches his followers a great lesson. The disciples are reminded that one day they too will have to give an account of life they received from God. God's grace and gifts can neither be wasted, nor can they remain static, nor be hidden. They have to be put to use for the purpose they have been given and should bear fruits. What is evaluated at the coming of the master is not 'how much' a worker has made but how hard he has worked and how committed he was to the gifts given to him. In the parable, the first and the second servants doubled the amount they received. No doubt these two servants had to exercise considerable shrewdness and astuteness in investing the money. The third servant, showing no imagination or industry, took an easy path and hid the resources given to him. He was found lazy and unproductive and was fired from his job.

For us this parable communicates the message that each one of us is given a share in the mission of Christ. Our failure to live up to the call and produce fruits for the kingdom will invite punishment from God. Though the master does not specify how much we should produce, he does not compromise on anything less than the best from us.

World Day of the Poor

This Sunday is the seventh World Day of the Poor, with the theme of not turning away. Pope Francis takes his inspiration from the elderly Tobit, who says to his son, "Do not turn your face away from anyone who is poor" (*Tobit 4:7*). Whenever we turn away from those who are poor, we turn away from Jesus himself, who is forever associated with the most vulnerable in society (*Matthew 25: 31-46*). Pope Francis goes on to celebrate the next door neighbours, "ordinary people who quietly make themselves poor among the poor. They do more than give alms: they listen, they engage, they try to understand and deal with difficult situations and their causes." An important theme throughout the papacy of Pope Francis has been the need to do more than just relieve suffering (compassion), but to work to challenge the causes of suffering and do what we can to ensure it does not happen in the first place (justice). We must all deepen our encounter with those who are poor, examining our own consciences about our lifestyles and how our faith is expressed in loving action. Love & Trust

Jesus' story is not difficult to understand, for the scene is very contemporary. It speaks of a down-to-earth reality about taking responsibility and being accountable to the boss for money or tasks. The initiative one takes will determine the success or failure of the enterprise.

As a parable, however, Jesus' story is saying something more. Matthew touches on the end-time where the master is Jesus, the Son of Man coming back to judge the world. The servants are the disciples entrusted with his work or mission while they await his coming. During his absence, since only God knows the day and hour of his return, the disciples are enjoined to be watchful and to act appropriately as responsible stewards.

Good and faithful disciples imitate God, who is good, and are consistent with their commitment as trusted servants. They will be rewarded with greater tasks and responsibilities as they enter into the joy and abundance of the reign of God. On the contrary, the disciples who do not perceive the love and trust of the master for them and do not appropriately act or take risks in their tasks and responsibilities, due to fear and laziness, cannot come before God's presence.

The parable speaks about discipleship, especially the relationship of trust and love between the Master and disciples, and their commitment to fulfill the tasks and responsibilities entrusted them in the Christian community.

E very time we pray for a deceased person, or have a Mass offered for them, implicit in our thought is that the deceased might be in Purgatory. It is good to think that if a family member is already in Heaven, the Mass can be applied to others who need it. How many of us have visited cemeteries and found abandoned graves! We can be certain that God, as a good Father, is able to distribute those prayers of the living for the dead for whom no one prays any longer and yet, they are in need of prayer. This is precisely what in popular piety has come to be called "prayer for the souls in Purgatory."

We can be certain that, if one of our deceased could ask us for something, they would ask for prayers for their soul. And the Mass being the most perfect prayer, you can have its inestimable value applied to your deceased loved one. There is no greater gift.
