The Sovereign

The apostle Paul refers to Jesus as God's beloved Son, as "the firstborn of all creation" who made peace "by the blood of his cross" (Second Reading). The Kingship of Jesus Christ is unique in that his emphasis is not on displaying power but on making himself powerless so that others may live. He wears a crown of thorns. His hands are nailed to the cross and cannot hold any sceptre. His throne is the cross, an instrument of punishment and cruelty, a stark symbol of an ignominious death for a criminal. Jesus wears no royal purple and is shamelessly stripped naked. Calvary Hill hisses and heckles like a venomous serpent, but the resplendent image of Jesus, forlorn on the cross, cuts across the sky as a gleam of glory. Jesus Christ towers over everybody else on Calvary. He only has words of forgiveness for his tormentors. He assures one of the criminals, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Jesus surprises the small group of loyal people who dare stand at the foot of his cross. He gives Mary his mother and the beloved disciple to each other. In his final hour, Jesus creates a community between Mary and John, between Mary and every future believer. In a larger sense, Jesus gives Mary to the People of God, also known by another name: the Church.

World leaders rise to power then fall to oblivion or suffer disgrace. Jesus is not just another leader who assumes power but dies afterwards. Paul identifies him as "the firstborn from the dead," and by God's grace we are all his siblings. He shows to us that the royal road to life is one of selfless, loving, and dedicated service to our needy brethren. He teaches this by sincerely caring for the sick and the sinners. Jesus is our King who welcomes to his circle those who are in most need of his mercy until his last breath on the cross.

Drowning All the Sins of the World

Jesus permitted the darkness of the world to envelop him. In the densely textured Passion narratives of the Gospels we see all forms of human dysfunction on display. Jesus was met by betrayal, denial, institutional corruption, violence, stupidity, deep injustice, and incomparable cruelty, but he did not respond in kind. Rather, like the scapegoat, upon whom "all the iniquities of the people of Israel" (Lev 16:21) were symbolically placed on the Day of Atonement, Jesus took upon himself the sins of the world. As he hung from the cross, he became sin, as St Paul would later put it, and bearing the full weight of that disorder he said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."

Jesus on the cross drowned all the sins of the world in the infinite ocean of the divine mercy, and that is how he fought. We can see here how important it is to affirm the divinity of Jesus, for if he were only a human being, his death on the cross would be, at best, an inspiring example of dedication and courage. But as the Son of God, Jesus died a death that transfigured the world.

The theological tradition has said that God the Father was pleased with this sacrifice of his Son, but we should never interpret this along sadistic lines, as though the Father needed to see the suffering of his Son in order to assuage his infinite anger. The Father loved the willingness of the Son to go to the very limits of godforsakenness all the way to the bottom of sin - in order to manifest the divine mercy.

Communion Under Both Kinds

Bishop Anthony has instructed that in Broken Bay Diocese from this weekend each parish will make Communion under both kinds available at each Mass celebration. We will slowly introduce this with 1 chalice only at this stage. Those wishing to receive the Chalice need to line up on the left-hand aisle for the Host then go to the left to receive the Chalice. As is the church custom the minister will give you the Chalice to consume a small amount of the Precious Blood and then you will hand it back to the minister. N.B. After the minister says 'The Body of Christ', or 'The Blood of Christ' we reply with: 'Amen'.

A reminder that the church allows us to receive the Host either on the hand or on the tongue. If receiving on the hand, please place your hand well out in front of you for the minister to place the host upon. If receiving on the tongue, please open your mouth wide enough and place your tongue out so that the minister does not contaminate their hand with saliva.
