Hear the Cries of Others

In John's Gospel, some Greeks who want to see Jesus, arrive at the beginning of his Passion, at the very moment he is experiencing his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. I believe that in some way these Greeks are the answer to Jesus' prayer to be saved from the anguish of his hour. Jesus cannot dwell on what awaits him; their cry reminds him that there are people who need him, who need his saving love. The whole purpose of his being lifted on the cross is to draw all people to himself - all people, Jews and Greeks alike.

When we feel that our own troubles are getting too great, we can share our feelings with others as Jesus did. Like Jesus we can also cry out, 'Father save me from this hour!' Our good God will save us, probably not by solving our problems, but by helping us to hear the cries of others who need us, the cries of those who are less fortunate than we are. Remarkably, responding to their needs will bring healing peace to our life as well.

on the 5th Sunday of Lent, we are invited to reflect on the themes of death and new life. The Coming Hour

Jesus declares: "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat, but if it dies, it produces much fruit." Spoken in a time of distress, the agony in the garden, Jesus is greatly "troubled" at the coming of the "hour" which will culminate in his death on the cross. But he is determined to go through it because this is how he will glorify the Father. Moreover, it is by dying that he will give life - much life ("much fruit") as his death and resurrection will draw all peoples (Jews and Gentiles) to him in faith, and in "believing, have life in his name" (*Jn 20:31*).

The coming of the Greeks to Jesus does not just show the curiosity of the Greeks over the Rabbi of Nazareth. For the evangelist, it anticipates and fulfills the very words of Jesus: "When I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself." The "lifting up" is the glorification of Jesus which entails his dying on the cross and his return to the Father from whom he came, bringing along many other children. In his death and resurrection, the Father of the Son becomes the Father of the disciples, his God is their God (*Jn 20:17*).

And they came to a country place called Gethsemane, and he took with him Peter and James and John, and he began to feel dread and to be exceedingly troubled. And he said to them, "My soul is sad, even unto death. Wait here and watch.... Watch and pray, that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

What do these inspired words from Gethsemane tell us? First of all, they show how truly human Jesus was. He dreaded the prospect, not so much of death itself, as of death under such circumstances: death through a gross miscarriage of justice; death at the hands of the very people he had done so much good for; death with such ignominy and disgrace. Jesus dreaded the prospect of death for sins he had not personally committed but that others deserved to expiate themselves. Most mysterious of all, because he foresaw the future, he saw that not all he would suffer and die for would profit from his Passion.

These inspired words further tell us that Jesus suffered intensely, and that is why he prayed. Two words that never should have been separated since Gethsemane are suffering and prayer. The one for all times should evoke the other, should be almost a condition for the other.
