Producing Fruit

In today's Gospel, Jesus is told about the tragic death of a number of Galileans at the hands of Pilate's soldiers while on a pilgrimage to the temple of Jerusalem. We do not know what motives the people had for telling Jesus about this. They certainly must have concluded that these Galileans were great sinners for having suffered such a misfortune. Jesus bluntly denies a cause-effect connection between guilt and punishment here on earth. God is not an avenging God, ready to pounce on anyone who violates his law. Instead, he is a compassionate and forgiving God who seeks out sinners. However, Jesus uses the story to drive home the lesson that all of us, without exception, are sinners and in real need of repentance. The Galileans killed by Pilate are not more deserving of their gruesome fate than other Galileans, including those listening to Jesus. They were not more sinful than others. Their untimely death should serve as a warning of what can happen to us unless we turn to God and change our sinful ways. We cannot and should not remain unaffected by the disasters and misfortunes that strike others. When such disasters happen to others we need to turn to God through a life of conversion, for an unexpected disaster can strike us on the last day when God calls us to render an account of our life.

To further emphasise the point, Jesus tells us the parable of the fig tree. In the Old Testament Israel is frequently likened to God's vineyard, which makes this parable a pointed reference to his immediate listeners. Just as the fig tree is given a final chance, a period of grace to bear fruit, so the people are given time - present time to repent and reform. Seen in the light of the period of persecution during which Luke is writing, these passages of his Gospel are reminders to us Christians, that we must persevere in living lives of faith and repentance. There is no room for self-complacency. The time of grace given us must be used fruitfully. As the owner of the fig tree allows the unfruitful tree yet another year to produce fruits, so God gives sinners time and opportunity to bear the "fruit of repentance". His goal is not judgement but fullness of life which he prepares for those who return to him.

Human Freedom

Jesus wants his fellow Jews to recognise the educative value of tragedies as wake-up calls and warnings against living unexamined lives and settling down comfortably with old sinful ways and habits. The time of reckoning is unavoidable, and repentance is the only means by which one can be delivered from the accumulated negative effects of sinfulness. These effects, which are misconceived as "divine punishment," are really the fruit of the wrong use of human freedom- something that we bring upon ourselves and not imposed on us from the outside - definitely not by our loving God.

Jesus tells the parable of the barren fig tree to shed light on divine forbearance and at the same time to call people to responsibility. In essence, the parable implies that our earthly existence has a purpose that is up to us to discover and pursue.

This weekend we welcome the children who are participating in the First Reconciliation Programme, to be presented to the parish, and to ask parishioners to pray for them on their faith journey.

One great advantage of receiving Reconciliation at a young age is that it develops a habit of asking for and receiving forgiveness. How important this may be at ages 13, 16, 19 - as your child starts to explore the adult world and perhaps makes some serious mistakes - to know that he/she can be forgiven. With youth suicide rates so high, it is essential that our children grow up knowing that no failure is so bad that there can be no way out. Likewise, how important it is that children see their parents receiving this sacrament. Otherwise they will see it as 'kids' stuff and may not turn to this source of grace when they most need it in their adult lives.


