Congratulations First Communicants!

This weekend, were are overjoyed to welcome many children from our parish to receive their first Holy Communion! I know the kids are all excited, and we are all excited for them! They have spent weeks in preparation for this great Sacrament, with the wonderful assistance of their parents and carers, Colleen, our Sacramental Coordinator, and Tân, our Seminarian.

The pages of the Gospel show clearly how special was the love for children which Christ showed while he was on earth. It was his delight to be in their midst; he embraced them; and he blessed them. At the same time he was not pleased when they would be driven away by the disciples, whom he rebuked gravely with these words: 'Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for of such is the kingdom of God.' It is clearly seen how highly he held their innocence and the open simplicity of their souls on that occasion when he called a little child to him and said to the disciples: 'Amen, I say to you, unless you turn and become like little children, you will not enter into the kingdom of heaven. And whoever receives one such little child for my sake, receives me.'

First Communions are so important to us as a parish, not just to celebrate with these children, but to see them also reminds us of how we are called to approach the Lord in the Holy Eucharist. Sometimes the repetition of Sunday Masses can make receiving Communion feel routine, normal, or just another thing to check off the list, but the innocence, excitement, intentionality, and anticipation of these children can help inspire those same qualities in each of us!

On Pilgrimage to Jesus

Once in church our preparation intensifies as we pray silently, recalling our intentions and people we are praying for. Perhaps we may read over the scripture readings and the words of a hymn, making them our own. The Priest enters and we stand together. This is the moment we become a community. In today's Mass for Corpus Christi St Paul reminds us that "we form a single body because we all have a share in this one loaf". Together we seek forgiveness and then join the angels of Bethlehem singing "Glory to God in the highest", peace to people of goodwill. The Collect is prayed, so called because it collects our individual prayers together. Then we listen to God's word, attentively and prayerfully. If we silently pray, "What, Lord, do you want me to hear today?" he may have a personal word for us.

On Pilgrimage to Jesus (continued)

Following the Creed and our prayers, the most solemn part of the Mass begins. Bread and wine are brought in procession to the altar, and with them we offer our own work and life to God. In a moment we are bidden to lift up our hearts, for this is when, as we pray today, "all creatures of heaven and earth sing a new song in adoration, and we, with all the hosts of Angels, cry out, and without end we acclaim: Holy, Holy, Holy...". Through the words of consecration, through the power of the Holy Spirit, St Francis tells us: "The Lord of the universe, God and the Son of God, so humbles himself that for our salvation he hides himself under an ordinary piece of bread! Christ, the Son of the living God, is present on the altar in the hands of a Priest! Let everyone be struck with fear, let the whole world tremble, and let the heavens exult." And so on this feast day we can remember that every Mass is, for us, a foretaste of heaven.

Now when the priest at Mass effects the Eucharistic change what's going on? He's not speaking his own puny words, but rather, at the consecration, the Priest speaks in *Persona Christi*, in the very person of Christ. He recounts what Jesus did. But then he moves into that first person discourse, "Take this, all of you, and eat. This is my body." He speaks with the full authority of Christ, which is why his words have the power to change the elements. And see, that's why for Catholics, the only proper response, when you're in the presence of those transformed elements, is to bow down and worship."

For the Life of the World

Our digital age is having a profound effect on our culture, in ways we do not yet fully understand. Social networking, where we publish details and pictures of our lives on the internet, means that many of us live more publicly than ever before. Tweeting, where we send short messages from our mobile phones or computers about what we are doing at any particular time, is like distributing a diary to family, friends and others. When we blog, we share our thoughts on anything that takes our fancy and put them where anyone can see.

But what happens, in this electronic world when people mess up? When there are embarrassing stories, photos or movies about them on the internet? Or if stories appear about people that can harm them, whether they are true or not? The internet means people's past can be ever-present, they are not allowed to forget, not able to move on from where they were. No one yet knows how to tackle this new phenomenon.

Today we keep a memory: not one that will harm us or prevent our growth but one that gives us life and promises eternal life. It is not a memory in the sense that it reminds us of long ago - it is rather a memory that makes the past present. The self-giving of Jesus in his life and ministry, at the Last Supper, on the cross and in his Holy Spirit is as present to us as it was to the first disciples.
