Peace for Our World

If we look deeply into today's Gospel, the focus seems to be on peace as a key to healing, and our acceptance of peace as a way of knowing the nearness of the kingdom of God. In fact, to get his message across, Luke asserts twice that the kingdom of God is very near to you! Paul reiterates the same theme to the Galatians. In your being healed, you will become altogether a new creation peace and mercy to all!

This peace though is a peace that does not ignore the marks of Jesus' crucifixion. It is a peace that embraces the cross, that does not shy away from those times in our lives when our commitment to following the rule of love is put to the test. It is then that we will know the grace of this peace. God's love will not be withheld, says the psalmist.

The prophet Isaiah too portrays this so beautifully in the images of peace flowing like a river, and the suckling infant consoled at the mother's breast. So, might we be comforted this week in the lap of our God, carried by peace, nourished by peace, becoming peace for our world.

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Trappings of Life

In a famous story Groucho Marx, the comedian, against his better judgement, was persuaded to join an elite social club. He came to regret it and wrote resigning his membership, "I don't want to belong to any club that would have me as a member".

Most people like to feel that they are special in some way, and it's the custom in advertising, whatever the organisation or product, to persuade people that they are somehow part of the chosen few, the elite, who alone will get access to what they are paying for. Things are "handpicked", "exclusive products", "for members only". It's part of human nature to like feeling that we are in a superior category to others, but there is no room for such thinking in the Kingdom of God.

It's dangerous when we apply such thoughts of privilege and possession to God. We frequently see Jesus opposing this way of thinking among his disciples, when they want to be the first, the greatest, the elite in his kingdom. He persists in reminding them that the kingdom belongs to the little ones: the poor, the outcast, to those who, for whatever reason, are on the peripheries. He welcomes children, women, tax collectors and even soldiers of the Roman oppressor. We can understand where the disciples are coming from in their longing to be among God's favourites: for so many years of oppression the people of Israel had clung to their identity as God's chosen people. It was their greatest hope, but also the source of their greatest illusion. God's thoughts are not our thoughts and God's criteria for greatness are not the same as those of this world, based on military power or wealth or social status. Religious history is sadly full of examples of people legitimising their oppression of others by claiming God's approval.

Jesus sends his disciples out to proclaim the kingdom without any of the trappings of power or wealth or privilege. He tries to convince them to rely on God alone and to trust in God's power, shining through their human weakness, but they take a lot of persuading.

Jesus sends his disciples out not as conquerors but as messengers of peace who bring reassurance and announce that God's reign is being fulfilled on earth. All today's readings bear the same message. It is God's grace, at work in us, not our own power or superiority, that will bring about the fulfilment of the kingdom. If we are to boast or take pride in being Christian, it is boasting in the power of Christ over sin and death. Being forgiven sinners is the root of any claim to greatness. Rejoicing

It may seem rather strange to us that Jesus should send these co-workers ahead of him with so little sustenance for their labours. But Jesus was teaching them, and those who received them, a powerful lesson about God's kingdom. To live according to the kingdom of God means less of a concern for the material things of the world and a greater concern for living the essence of the Gospel. These seventy-two disciples were not abandoned to chance by Jesus. They were sent out on a survival mission, sent out relying on the Spirit of God.
