Congratulations Rosan!

This Saturday evening at the 5pm Vigil Mass our Seminarian Rosan Mathew will be ordained as a Deacon by Bishop Anthony Randazzo.

Following his study at the seminary, Rosan was called to holy orders by the bishop. For most deacons, this time is a pastoral, liturgical and educational preparation for transition to the priesthood. When considering the sacrament of holy orders, there are three degrees of the sacrament: deacon, priest, bishop.

Entering the first level of holy orders as a deacon, the bishop authorises the following faculties, or permissions. Rosan will assist the presider at Mass, and celebrate Baptisms, Weddings and Funerals.

There are three promises made by the transitional deacon: to pray the Liturgy of the Hours, Obedience and Celibacy. The Liturgy of the Hours is also known as the Breviary. This prayer, consisting of three psalms, a reading from Scripture and petitions, is a participation in the Perpetual Liturgy going on in Heaven. At the same time, through the Breviary, the ordained sanctify the secular hours of the day and night on earth.

Both permanent and transitional deacons make a promise to obey their bishop and his successors. We pray for Rosan on this important step of his priestly journey. (*Photos next week*)

Who is the Greatest?

s they return to their headquarters in Capernaum, the disciples argue who among them is the greatest. The expected answer is Peter because he gave the correct answer when asked about the identity of Jesus. He is also the spokesman of the group, and Jesus pays attention to him.

But Jesus gives an unexpected answer. The greatest among them is the last of all and the servant of all. The greatest does not think he is God's favourite. He is unassuming. He does not expect he should be the leader. He serves everyone in the group. Jesus redefines the meaning of greatness, presenting different criteria.

We can expand the qualifications of being the greatest through the other readings. From the First Reading, we learn that the greatest can be the just one who counteracts the evildoers. He disturbs them. He does not allow them to spread evil. Without fear, he confronts them. For this they try to destroy him, but God takes care of him.

The Second Reading describes the greatest disciple as one who has conquered his passion, his greed and anger. He has self-mastery. He is not ruled by likes and dislikes. So any person, not just one, can be the greatest if the person serves the community and has high moral values. He does not compromise with evil.

For the greatest the world looks at the strongest, the richest, the most powerful, and the most influential. The greatest dictates what others should do and suppresses those who attempt to resist.

Christians must not be self-conscious of their blessedness. They should never think they are better than others. They should rather follow Jesus, the greatest leader who comes not "to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many" ($Mk \ 10:45$).

A Teaching Session

Jesus didn't need to boast about his abilities and identity, which shone through all that he said and did. Neither was he bragging about courage when he told his companions about his forthcoming horrific death. A true hero is often silent about his or her bravery in a situation where other people are too afraid to act.

Jesus used the situation as a teaching session on leadership and greatness. The best guide shows the way by their example and the greatest person leads by their service of others. Jesus illustrated his words with a child, one of the world's most defenseless, insignificant people: those who protect and defend our society's "least, last and lost" will be the greatest in the kingdom of heaven.

We criticise the disciples for their insensitivity and self-interest as they argued over who was the greatest amongst them rather than supporting Jesus after he had told them of his impending death. Yet we can all look back and wish that we had said or done things differently in one situation or another. We are all concerned with our own interests and want to be recognised by others for our good qualities. As St John would later write in his Gospel, "The truth is a heavy burden that few care to carry."
