Dear friends,

One of the beautiful ways by which our parish enters into Advent is through the annual Simbang Gabi. Simbang Gabi (Tagalog: [sɪmˌbaŋ geˈbi]; Filipino for "Night Mass") is a devotional, nine-day series of Masses in anticipation of Christmas. It is similar to the nine dawn Masses leading to Christmas Eve practiced in Puerto Rico called *Misa de Aguinaldo*. Originally intended as a practical solution for farmers that started working in the fields before sunrise, this cherished Christmas custom eventually became a distinct feature of Philippine culture and became a symbol of sharing. On the last day of the Simbang Gabi, which is Christmas Eve, the service is called Misa de Gallo (Spanish for "Rooster's Mass"). In our Parish we will have our Simbang Gabi Masses at 5.30am each morning in our church from Tuesday 16 December to Wednesday 24 December.

There is a great deal happening in the weeks preparing for Christmas as we will see in our bulletin. A very significant occasion will be our second Carols on the Concourse, being staged on the steps of the Performing Arts Centre from 7.00pm. We pray for fine weather and that it will be very enjoyable evening. A very special thank you to Titus and our parish choir who will be joined by other members of our fellow Christian Churches.

One of the other activities we are undertaking is carol singing at our local aged care facilities: Our next occasion is Saturday 20 December 2:30pm at KOPWA Aged Care (Archibald House), 12-16 Trafalgar Avenue, Roseville Everyone is invited to join with our choir members in the carol singing Titus has prepared booklets for the choir, and we can prepare a few extra booklets in the hope that other parishioners will join us. Parishioners can either meet us outside the church at 2pm on the day (and we can travel together), or otherwise go directly to the aged care facility and meet there.

Then on Tuesday 23 December at 1.30pm our choristers will sing in Chatswood Chase on Level 2! Do come along whilst shopping and enjoy the beauty of our parish choir singing,

Preparing for Mass

In preparing to receive Christ in the Eucharist, you should consider:

- Have I interiorly prepared through prayer?
- Would the Sacrament of Reconciliation assist my preparation?
- Have I maintained the Eucharistic fast for one hour before receiving, except for water and medicine?*

*The elderly and infirm, along with those who care for them, are not bound to the Eucharistic fast.

Communion Procession

The act of processing forward to receive the Body and Blood of Christ is an important symbolic action, reminding us that we are a pilgrim people, while also uniting us as the one Body of Christ, journeying together. It is important, therefore, to remember that receiving the Body and Blood of Christ is not an isolated action, but rather part of a unifying ritual. In this regard, you should consider.

- Ensuring your actions allow the dignified and unifying pilgrimage as the Body of Christ, toward the Body of Christ. This includes singing the Communion Hymn, while processing.
- Being aware of your personal and valid choices as a communicant, that they do not disrupt the flow of the procession, or the ability of others to make their own choices.
- Leaving enough space between yourself and the person in front of you.
- As a sign of reverence to the Blessed Sacrament, gently bow not genuflect as you approach the Minster of Holy Communion.

Receiving the Body of Christ

When receiving the Body of Christ, the common posture in Australia is to stand; however, the communicant can choose to kneel, as long as they are aware of their surroundings and do not impact the reverence and safety of others. As you come forward to receive and gently bow, the Minister holds the host up to your eye level and says the words, "The Body of Christ", allowing you to reply "Amen" before receiving.

It is the communicant's choice whether to receive on the hand or on the tongue. Both are acceptable, and both should be done with reverence, respect and care.

Receiving on the hand

Place your hands out in front of you, with your dominant hand under your less dominant hand. Hold your hands still and open. Keep your fingers out of the way, allowing the Minister of Communion to place the host on your hand. Do not pluck or grab the host.

Once you receive on the hand, step to the side and consume the host while in the presence of the Minister.

Receiving on the tongue

After responding "Amen", open your mouth and gently extend your tongue out towards the Minister of Communion, so that they may place the host on your tongue. Please do not lower or bow your head while receiving on the tongue.

Once the host has been placed on your tongue, slowly draw your tongue back into your mouth to consume the Body of Christ.





Receiving the Blood of Christ

If the chalice is being offered at Mass, a communicant can choose if they wish to receive the Blood of Christ.


In the same manner which you approach the Body of Christ, bow gently as you approach the Minister, who will say "The Blood of Christ", and you respond "Amen." Take the Chalice in your hands as you would normally take a cup, and raise the Chalice to drink as normal, one sip is sufficient. Then carefully hand the Chalice back to the Minister.



PARISH-IN-COUNCIL VIII

Finding Hope & Belonging in our City

On 25 October 2025, we gathered for our eighth Chatswood Parish-in-Council (PiC VIII), bringing together 157 participants, including observers from parishes near and far who came to experience synodality in action - encountering, listening, and discerning.

With 'Serving the Community' as one of our five parish mission priorities, PiC VIII centred on the theme Finding Hope and Belonging in our City.

From the moment the day began, Harrington Hall was alive with conversation and connection.

Participants settled in over an icebreaker, a shared buffet lunch, and a beautiful Liturgy that gently prepared our hearts for what lay ahead.

The keynote presentation by Marte Tagle challenged us to build relationships that foster hope, to offer practical support and advocacy, and to stand in solidarity with those who feel marginalised in our local community.

This led us into the heart of the afternoon: the Conversation in the Spirit. Around each table, participants listened deeply and discerned how God may be calling our parish to grow as a place of hope and belonging in our city.

At the same time, our children were gathered in the Magnificat Room for a fun Kids-in-Council, where a thoughtfully selected movie, crafts, stories and games helped them explore the same theme as PiC, in their own engaging and creative way.

As the day drew to a close, the sense of shared purpose was palpable. We ended with gratitude, and a renewed commitment to serve with courage and compassion.

Open our Hearts: Where is Christ waiting for us in the marginalised?

1. Solidarity starts with me

Solidarity with those who feel marginalised is not optional, it's at the very heart of what it means to follow Jesus.

I will...

- Pray for an open heart, eyes, ears and hands to be attentive and present - noticing and responding to those who may feel marginalised around me, in our parish and the local community.
- Invite and encourage people to come along to our monthly community BBQ lunches and Morning Teas after Mass.
- Make eye contact, smile and say hello to people I don't know in our parish.
- Take opportunities to mingle, start conversations and genuinely connect with others.
- Wear my name badge and get to know the names of other parishioners.
- Be open to opportunities to be of service, reflecting on my charisms and connecting them to ministries.
- Join our Parish Welcoming Ministry Team.

2. Build Relationships

Building on all the good things we are already doing to create a true sense of belonging for all.

We will...

- Grow our monthly Community BBQ's and Morning Teas after Mass, reaching out further and inviting the local community.
- Strengthen our Welcoming Ministry Team, including Welcomers at each church entrance.
- Consider how we might form a Social Ministry to further develop our parish social activities.
- Host a Community Dinner in 2026, inviting people from our local area to come, get to know one another, and build new friendships.
- Create and promote more opportunities for companionship, conversation and connection, such as in the PEW Garden after Mass and over coffee on weekdays.
- Launch a bi-annual Welcome Morning Tea for newcomers to our parish community.











3. Offer a 'hand up'

More than personal relationships, solidarity also means standing with the marginalised, equipping ourselves with knowledge, offering practical support and advocating for those without a voice.

We will...

- Inform and educate on fostering hope and belonging through solidarity not just charity - with regular articles in our parish bulletin and website.
- Develop a directory of services and resources, connecting those in need with care and support e.g., Catholic Care, Vinnies, crisis hotlines.
- Work within each of our Ministry Circles to identity and eliminate any barriers to belonging that those feeling marginalised may experience.
- Consider how we might develop a Ministry of Accompaniment for those who are housebound or isolated.
- Encourage the formation of a Support Group for families who have children with special needs and offer sensory friendly sacramental programs.
- Continue to advocate on hard social issues via existing and new parish groups such as our Community Action Group, Marian Catholic Action Group, Legion of Mary and Dignity Pro-Life Alliance.







We are called to act now

In standing with those who feel marginalised, we will find ourselves standing with Christ.

Let us rise to His calling - not tomorrow, not someday, but now.

The kingdom of God is breaking in, and the Spirit is already at work among "the least of these."



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE ONE WHO IS TO COME

Today's Gospel focus continues with John the Baptist, introduced to us last Sunday. From prison he sends his followers to Jesus to find out if he is the 'one who is to come or have we to wait for someone else?' This question picks up an early memory that some thought John might have been the Messiah. Jesus explicates his Messianic credentials to John's enquirers: the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear and the dead raised to life. In other words, Jesus affirms that he is the one who brings restoration, community and healing. Jesus' self-identification further affirms the blessedness of those who remain faithful to him.

In the biblical world, 'faith' was another way of affirming fidelity and commitment to another. This leads Jesus to attest, in this spirit of fidelity and commitment, John's prophetic mission of desert ascetism and preparation for the coming of the Messiah. As we come into these final days before Christmas, our role becomes like John: we align ourselves in fidelity and faith to the one who is to be born, who will bring healing and hope to our world that struggles to know this.

But we also hear Jesus' affirming words – the final sentence in today's Gospel passage addressed to us. Despite John's greatness as the one who prepares for the coming of Jesus, 'yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he'. The Gospel's audience, including us, are affirmed. We have unique status in the eyes of God. This divine promise accompanies us in the days ahead.






Chatswood Parish St Vincent de Paul Society November Report

Chatswood OLD Vinnies received 10 calls for help in November. Most of the calls resulted from impacts of bills /energy costs on the limited incomes, particularly Job Seeker, on people who may have particular difficulties with budgeting resulting in requests for food, and furniture and other essentials.

Some we refer for budget counselling. Several suffer from mental disorders as well as DV and illness. We have a number of particularly difficult cases, concerning families who have no regular income except from casual work such as cleaning.

We are keeping these afloat in expectation of improvements to their circumstances. Catholic Care asked for assistance in setting up a homeless single parent family in accommodation they had arranged. Another family, thrust into sudden unemployment and need for relocation, asked for help in setting up in a barely affordable rental. Resources expended were \$2400.

We hope with help from parishioners to distribute some 50 donated hampers and to hold a party for residents at a major public housing complex before Christmas






