Honouring the Santo Niño this Sunday

The Feast of the Santo Niño—Spanish for “Holy Child”—is one of the most beloved devotions in the Filipino Catholic tradition. At its heart is a simple yet profound truth: God chose to come among us not with power or grandeur, but as a child—vulnerable, trusting, and full of promise. The devotion to the Santo Niño dates back to **1521**, when Portuguese explorer **Ferdinand Magellan** presented an image of the Child Jesus to **Queen Juana of Cebu** at her baptism. This gift marked the beginning of Christianity in the Philippines. More than forty years later, in **1565**, the same image was rediscovered intact amid the ruins of a burned village. This remarkable event became a powerful sign of God’s abiding presence among the people. To this day, the Santo Niño holds a cherished place in the faith and spiritual life of Filipino Catholics.

Each year, the feast is celebrated on the **third Sunday of January**, not only in the Philippines but also in many parishes across our diocese and around the world. These celebrations are marked by joyful expressions of faith, including processions, shared food and drink, and vibrant performances of song and dance, reflecting a faith that is both deeply prayerful and joyfully lived in community. The most famous of these celebrations is the **Sinulog Festival in Cebu**, where colourful street dances follow a distinctive rhythm of two steps forward and one step back, symbolising life’s journey with God. Other major festivals include **Ati-Atihan** in Aklan and **Dinagyang** in Iloilo. During these celebrations, devotees often carry their own Santo Niño statues, lovingly dressed in royal attire, and joyfully chant “*Pit Señor!*” (“**Call out to the Lord**”) —a prayer of praise, trust, and heartfelt supplication. At its core, devotion to the Santo Niño invites us to approach Jesus with childlike trust and open hearts. Families often enthroned images of the Holy Child in their homes, offering candles, flowers, and written intentions. The Santo Niño is invoked especially for guidance, healing, and hope.

On **Sunday, 18 January 2026**, we join our hearts and prayers with all those celebrating the **Feast of the Santo Niño**. A statue of the Santo Niño will be placed in the sanctuary from **16 January 2026**. Parishioners are warmly invited to write their prayer intentions and place them, along with a candle, before the statue. As we honour the Santo Niño, may we rediscover the joy of our faith and entrust ourselves anew to God’s loving care. *Pit Señor! Viva Santo Niño!*

And Fr Hien is safely back in Vietnam for his annual leave, reunited with his family.





Father Robert Rieger from Medjugorje will be visiting Our Lady of Dolours Chatswood parish on 23 February. Come along and hear Father Robert's Lenten reflection on Eucharistic Adoration.

Father Robert is a Kiwi priest who first visited Medjugorje some 36 years ago – and it changed his life forever. Father Robert now welcomes thousands of pilgrims to Medjugorje every year from all around the world – including our own pilgrims from across the Broken Bay Diocese. Father Robert leads the Oasis of Peace community in Medjugorje, and their chapel offers Adoration around the clock, 24 hours a day. But as Father Robert will tell us, Adoration is not about the hours. It's about opening our hearts to the Lord and letting Him do something within us and for us – rather than just assuming that it's all about us doing something for him. It's His work within us that will truly change our lives.



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE LAMB OF GOD

The historical memory between John the Baptist and Jesus identified in last Sunday's Gospel from Matthew continues in today's Gospel from John. Themes from last week continue: John the Baptist declares Jesus' pre-existence (1:30), a central theological motif in the Gospel, as God's chosen one, and as the bearer of God's Spirit (1:33). The Baptist also publicly attests to Jesus' holiness using Jewish expressions drawn out of the Passover and Exodus story. Jesus is called 'the lamb of God' (1:29). This evokes the memory of the Passover lamb. This was the lamb sacrificed in the Exodus event (Exodus 12:1-13) whose blood daubed the lintels of the doors identifying its Jewish residents as God's protected ones as the Angel of Death passed over them.

In John's Gospel, Jesus' blood will also become the life-giving and liberating agent that creates the new community formed around the Mother of Jesus and the Beloved Disciple at Jesus' death (19:26-35). At the beginning of this Gospel and in today's reading, John the Baptist becomes the Gospel's witness to the holy and elevated status of Jesus as God's representative who can 'take away the sin of the world' (1:29). In other words and again drawing on a Jewish atonement ritual performed on one of the holiest days in the Jewish Calendar, *Yom Kippur* (literally, 'the Day of Atonement'), Jesus becomes the scapegoat for people's sins to release them from the burdens they carry and bring them to life and freedom—another theme of John's Gospel. All these insights associated with today's Gospel are key for us: we look to one who can represent us before God, release us of sins that weigh us down, and offer us life and spiritual agency.

Vinnies good works

Vinnies December 2025 Report

Chatswood Vinnies received 12 calls for help in December

Five of these did not require a lot of time or resources. Either they did not respond to our return calls or only required advice. Two others needed food assistance. An old client, who had suffered an amputation and had been moved into more user friendly public accommodation sought help with white-goods; we provided information on our No Interest Loans scheme. Two others, one off the streets and the other an aged pensioner with limited English, sought help with setting up in new public housing digs.

We received a most unusual and urgent request from a South American couple on temporary visas who had been hoping to start a new life in Aust. After managing for 9 months both working to their visa conditions, the husband was diagnosed with an aggressive but controllable cancer, which required immediate treatment and which precluded his working or travelling. Treatment is expected to last several months. We have maintained them afloat whilst referring them to agencies/ people who may be able to help. We are trying to establish a budget and time frame for our essential help.

We have expended to date some \$3000 in covering some limited rent, medical and sustenance needs. More on this case will be covered in future reports.

Overall we expended some \$5000 in December.

On a lighter note we held a Xmas function at one of the large public housing complexes and distributed, with the help of parishioners, and some 50 Xmas hampers to those we had assisted during the year.

Ornella Byak is the granddaughter of our beloved parishioner Sandra Byak - and at only 26 years old, Ornella has already established a school in Timor-Leste. Ornella will be visiting us in the last week of February to tell us more about this wonderful work.

Ornella Byak founded BETTER Timor to respond to the urgent need for quality education in Timor-Leste. It is one of our closest neighbours, yet many children and young people lack basic learning opportunities. Ornella has established a school in the regional area of Same, Manufahi, where she lives full-time and leads local teams delivering free, high-quality schooling and English education. The school now serves around 200 students

with 21+ local staff, and it achieves over 90% attendance (compared to a national average near 36%). The school provides thousands of meals to students each year, since Timor-Leste has one of the highest rates of severe child malnutrition in the world. Ornella has also opened the Bakhita English Institute to provide youth and adults with English skills that will equip them for employment, mobility, and new opportunities.


