

The joy and the peace of the Risen Christ be with you all!

Our celebration of Easter this year has been rather extraordinary with so many contributing to make our parish celebrations as rich and as meaningful. We have been blessed by very great numbers of people at every stage. Our deepest gratitude to those who have worked as hard decorating our sanctuary, organizing our ministries, and leading us in music. A particular word of thanks to Sienna Klarica, our Youth Ministry Officer, who brought together a truly wonderful enactment of the Stations of the Cross with the young people of our Parish on the Chatswood Concourse on Good Friday morning. Special thanks, too, to Hamish Lavery for ensuring our quality of sound and to Ashleigh Wan for leading the music for the occasion. This was a very significant way of bringing the light of Christ to our city.

In this bulletin I share with you to the outcomes of our recent session of Parish-in-Council on Saturday 5 April 2025. This is the fruit of the rich conversation that took place. Through this we have now been able to identify the key principles upon which we can go forward in our planning for the refreshment of our church. We look forward to the next step now which will occur in May: on evening conversation with our architects John O'Brien and Miguel Parades at which they will be able to share further the principles of sound liturgician architecture.

We are not sure that the problem can be fixed, and we may need to wait until we have a new means for online circulation that will come about with our new parish database to which we are migrating in the coming month. Thank you for your patience.

Next Sunday, 27 April 2025, Blessed Carlo Acutus will be canonized in Rome! Do join us at our Sunday 5.30pm Mass when this great event will be celebrated. We will be joined by Cardinal Mafi, Bishop of Tonga and Bishop Randazzo or our own Diocese with many guests and a 20 piece orchestra drawn from our students from Mercy College and Pius X College. Following Mass, we will join online direct to Rome for the actual ceremony of canonization. It will be a week of great celebration. Do see the bulletin further for all the detail.

More Copies of the Diocesan Shrines of Hope Passports have arrived!

The following is the step-by-step guideline for the Broken Bay Pilgrim Passports

- 1. Jubilee Passports can be stamped at each Shrine and the Cathedral to acknowledge visit and time of prayer within. A special downloadable <u>Broken Bay Jubilee Passport for Kids</u> for children to use when visiting the Shrines with their families/caregivers.
- 2. Once all three Shrines and Cathedral, with respective stamps, have been visited a Pilgrim's passport is "complete".
- 3. Pilgrims then have their passports verified at their own Parish office.
- 4. Each Parish will notify Mission Broken Bay with the names of those pilgrims who have completed their passports so that they may receive a special commemorative certificate signed by Bishop Anthony. This is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the Jubilee by presenting these certificates at the end of a Sunday Mass.

A live Tally on the <u>www.bbjubilee.com.au</u> website will add a further joyful essence, noting how many pilgrims have completed the Jubilee Shrines of Hope Pilgrimage and which parishes they are from.

Renewing our church building for future generations

Dear Friends,

On the afternoon of Saturday 5 April, 146 of us came together for our sixth Parish-in-Council, beginning a journey to think through how we might best renew our church building, not only for ourselves but for the generations to follow us.

The afternoon began with an icebreaker to get to know one another better, followed by lunch and the opening liturgy. During our first table conversation, we then each reflected on the question...

Q. What does our beautiful church building mean to me?



Recalling our parish Mission Statement: "Bringing the Light of Christ to the city: We love, we grow, we serve", our second table conversation invited us to reflect on the questions...

Q. Which aspect of our church building's interior most helps us to live out our parish mission?



Animating our Future

Q. Which aspect of our church building's interior most hinders us to live out our parish mission?



Renewing our Church Building - United in Mission, Guided by Principles

Before we bring forth any ideas or make any decision on renewing our church building, we need first to discern the principles that will guide these ideas and decisions so we can be sure to go forward in the best way, and importantly go forward together.

And so, our Parish-in-Council VI Conversation in the Spirit reflected on what key <u>principles</u> might guide the renewal of our church's interior, ensuring it reflects our mission of bringing the light of Christ to the city for generations to come.

Principles are consistent guiding ideas that serve as anchors for decision-making. They help us stay focused on what matters most, especially when faced with many options.

Unlike personal preferences or specific design features, principles provide a consistent framework for making choices. They help ensure that decisions align with our overall vision, mission and values.

Without principles, decision-making can become scattered, driven by personal opinions rather than a shared vision.

Our discernment was focused on...

- The interior space of our church only everything within the walls, from floor to ceiling. External areas like the
 forecourt, the community garden and the PEW area at the side of the church were not part of the discussion.
- Renewing our church building not rebuilding, nor aiming for anything grand or extravagant. Instead, we are seeking to renew our church's interior to make it:
 - More Beautiful inspiring awe and reverence.
 - More Functional supporting prayer, worship, and community life.
 - More Practical meeting the needs of our parish for the decades to come.
- Discerning and defining guiding principles, not choosing design details like carpet colours or lighting styles.
 - Principles are guiding ideas that serve as anchors for our decision-making.
 - Principles last they ensure today's changes will still make sense in the future.
 - Preferences change individual tastes vary, but principles anchor us in what truly matters.

Animating our Future

Arising directly from the discernments of the 13 tables at Parish-in-Council VI, the following six principles have been adopted to guide all our decision making as we renew our church building for generations to come...



Enhance Beauty

We will enhance the beauty of our church building through respectful design and a unified style.

By preserving its sacred character and honouring Our Lady, we seek to lift the soul to God, inspire awe and hope, and help all who enter to grow in faith.



Act Sustainably

We will make thoughtful, long-lasting choices that care for our environment.

By utilising sustainable technologies, and choosing energy-efficient, low-maintenance solutions, we will reduce impact and ensure our parish remains a place of faith and welcome for generations to come.



Wise Stewardship

We will practise wise and responsible stewardship by choosing durable, cost-effective solutions that make the best use of parish resources.

Through careful planning and ongoing, transparent communication, we will ensure that every decision is intentional, avoids waste, and supports the long-term wellbeing of our parish.



Honour our History

We will honour the rich history and heritage of our church building by preserving its architectural style.

With deep respect for the faith and generosity of our past stewards, we will maintain and highlight the beauty they entrusted to us, ensuring our sacred spiritual home continues to inspire for years to come.



We will ensure that our parish is a place where everyone feels welcome, included, and at home.

By improving accessibility, rethinking the flow of spaces, and providing thoughtful fixtures and signage, we will foster a sense of comfort and belonging for all.



Improve Functionality

We will improve the functionality of our church building to better support worship, prayer, and community life.

By upgrading our lighting, climate, and audio visual technology, and reorganising spaces with clear purpose, we will create a space where everyone can engage more deeply with the sacraments and feel connected in faith and community.



10:34, 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea: about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself; and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'

So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

Replaces the Profession of Faith.

Dear brethren (brothers and sisters), through the Paschal Mystery we have been buried with Christ in Baptism, so that we may walk with him in newness of life. And so, now that our Lenten observance is concluded, let us renew the promises of Holy Baptism, by which we once renounced Satan and his works and promised to serve God in the holy Catholic Church. And so I ask you:

P. Do you renounce Satan?

All: I do.

P. And all his works?

All: I do.

P And all his empty show?

All: I do.

P. Do you believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth? All: I do.

P. Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead and is seated at the right hand of the Father?

P. Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

All: I do.

P. And may almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us new birth by water and the Holy Spirit and bestowed on us forgiveness of our sins, keep us by his grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord, for eternal life.

All: Amen.

PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

Our greatest natural resource

Australia is blessed with many great natural resources like minerals, land, flora and fauna, great beaches and much more. But our greatest resource is our people whose skills, work and social involvement provide a standard of living and basis for enjoyment of life which we all value. No other resource can duplicate the role of people. No farmer or orchardist would willingly destroy a substantial portion of his crop and thereby forfeit much of his produce but anyone who destroyed any part of our national parks or native animals would feel the full weight of the law. Yet as a country, we eliminate a sizeable proportion of our population in the form of the unborn babies who are killed by abortion. Their potential is unrealized, the contribution they would make to our society is lost and yet we maintain a double standard of lauding the achievements of those in our society who contribute greatly in business, arts, sports, culture and other ways.

Women

Women contribute greatly to our society putting their professional abilities and services to greatly benefit our community. But today our society is directed to promoting women in areas that place them on par with men and make no distinction between male and female. Society pays little regard to the greatest contribution that women can make, namely those things which are particular to their own gender, that is motherhood and that of nurturing of children. Their bodies are designed by God in a most marvelous way to nourish a baby in its most fragile and formative months and to nourish and care for it after birth.

Equal before the Law

Our laws insist on equal opportunity and equal treatment under the Law regardless of race, creed, gender etc. The one great exception is the unborn who are denied recognition that the rest of the population receives. Although we have an extensive body of laws that protect children, this does not extend to the unborn as if the unborn and the born were two separate individuals, which of course they are not.

Helping the disadvantaged and marginalised

We give much attention to those in poverty, burdened by chronic illness, unemployment, homelessness, poverty and other disadvantages. Yet the unborn, who lack everything and are totally dependent for everything, do not receive the same consideration. And the consequences for them are far worse than other disadvantaged groups as their very existence is in jeopardy.




At Easter we celebrate the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus who won for us the possibility of eternal life in heaven. Our Lord died not for some, but for all, including the unborn. In the eyes of God the souls of all persons, born or unborn, were the reasons for His death and resurrection. And he made no distinction between the unborn and the born.
