Dear friends,

Last week we had a phenomenal 537 responses to our engagement for the development of our Parish Mission. Thank you to everyone who participated, and a special word of gratitude to Brendan Tertini who led us through the reflection. It is not too late for us to contribute! Do see later in the bulletin a good deal more information as we journey towards Pentecost at which time we will 'launch' our Mission.

With regret I share with you the resignation of our parish Director of Music, Patrick Harrison. Patrick joined us in October 2022 with much promise. I think all will agree that the standard and presentation of our music have been greatly improved over these months, and the formation of a parish choir especially for significant events has been a great achievement and shown us all what is possible for our parish. For

this we are greatly indebted to Patrick. However, as Patrick outlined to his, his music career has assumed a momentum not expected last year, and he has discerned that he has come to a point now from which he needs to dedicate himself more fully to the music industry and its possibilities for his career. Patrick's last day with us will be Friday 28 April. It will be great to acknowledge him in this weekend's bulletin and for him to lead our choir for ANZAC Day next Tuesday. Notwithstanding, it is our hope that Patrick may continue his association with us in the future, particularly for parish social events. Given that we have known of this possibility for some weeks, we have had the advantage already to seek a replacement for Patrick. The process of selection is unfolding, but I will b e able to make an announcement about a new appointment in the coming week.Please join me in thanking Patrick for his time with us and wishing him every blessing as his career takes a new turn.

Recently we were able to provide our World Youth Day cohort of pilgrims the fruit of their fundraising efforts, some \$18,700. This has been a marvellous achievement and effectively has halved the cost of the adventure for our pilgrims. On their behalf thank you so much to everyone's generosity and support. We look forward to commissioning our pilgrims towards the end of July. So, it is not too late to contribute to further fundraising efforts that may occur over the next couple of months.

Tuesday is ANZAC Day. I will represent our Parish at the Chatswood cenotaph for the Dawn Service and then we will celebrate Mass at 10.00am. Please note, that this will be the only Mass celebrated in our church on Tuesday. This weekend we have a book of remembrance available to record those who have died in war, and we will remember them at our Mass. Please join us on Tuesday.

Welcome back this week to all our school students, teachers and their families! WE hope you have had a great holiday and that the term ahead is a great one!

And lastly, bon voyage our dear friend Chris Robbins! We will farewell Chris with a special blessing at our 10.30am Mass this Sunday, being celebrated by Bishop Danny Meagher. We are going to miss Chris and his family immensely. He has been such a vital member of our parish family these last years as a Welcomer, a Reader, a Catechist and so much more. We pray God's richest blessings on him and his family as they return to the United States, but we hope that one day they will rejoin us here at Chatwsood!

GOSPEL REFLECTION

We all know today's gospel passage as the story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. It all sounds fairly bland; it's as though it is the story of two people out for a Sunday stroll. But it is not so simple. The clue comes from when the storyteller informs us that their faces were downcast. This is not the story of two disciples: it is the story of two ex-disciples. It is not the story of two heading to Emmaus, but of two running away from Jerusalem.

They had been followers of Jesus, they had seen what he could do and they had believed. But they believed in what they wanted to believe in, not in what God was offering them. They wanted a prophet who would set Israel free. For them that meant one thing: get rid of the Romans and restore the old kingdom of David. They wanted a future that met their expectations. Instead, the God of surprises gave them something different. God had given them someone handed over to be sentenced to death and crucified. As far as they were concerned it was game over; there was nothing positive in that. God had failed them and they were going home. Even when some of their group told them they had seen the risen Lord, these two did not believe them. Dying, let alone rising again, was not part of the plan; it was not what they had signed up for. They were out of there, their minds were closed. Their minds were so closed that even when the risen Lord himself came and walked beside them they failed to recognise him.

Augustine of Hippo was aware of this, when he said in one of his homilies, 'These two, even when the Lord was talking to them, did not have faith, because they didn't believe he had risen, nor had they any hope that he could rise again. They had lost faith, lost hope. They were walking along, dead, with Christ alive, they were walking along, dead, with life itself. Life was walking along with them, yet in their hearts life had not yet been restored' (Sermo 235).

How many of us, or how many members of our families or people we know, are like this? We have given Christianity a go and it has not worked out for us. We wanted God to do something for us, and it did not happen. We put God to the test, and God let us down. The message of today's gospel is that when life is getting us down, when we feel all alone and just want to run away and hide, there is the risen Lord walking along side us. As the psalmist says, if we know and see that the Lord is at our right hand, then we can stand firm. We look around us and we see nothing, lo! he is here with us. Here is the reality we proclaim: we do not have to find God: God has already found us. All we have to do is see the grace of God that surrounds us.

How did Cleopas and his friend open their eyes? Augustine tell us in that same homily he preached, 'You too, then, if you want to have life, do what they did in order to recognise the Lord. They showed him hospitality ... Constrain the stranger, if you want to recognise the saviour. What had been lost through infidelity was restored through hospitality'. Already their hearts were burning within them and their hospitality was their response to the gift of hope that he was giving them once again. Be kind to the stranger, for that person may just be the risen Lord.

In the hospitality of the meal, they suddenly realised. Israel was indeed free, not free from the Romans but free from sin. Jesus had bought freedom not by spilling other people's blood, but by spilling his own. In the wine poured out into the cup Cleopas and his friend saw the truth of who God is. Only when bread is broken and shared are people nourished. Israel was indeed restored, not for power but for service. The broken bread we eat here each week, and the poured-out wine we drink here each week, tell us that living comes from dying and receiving comes from giving. The challenge for those of us who eat his body and drink his blood is to become him for others. Our mission is to be the risen Lord walking beside those who have lost hope and faith. Our mission is to explain the Scriptures to others, to make their hearts burn with new life. Our mission is to have our bodies broken in love and service of others, particularly the stranger; to have our blood poured out in love and service of others, particularly the downtrodden.

There are so many things to thank God for today: for the risen Lord who finds us when we run away; for the Lord who changes despair into hope; for the Lord who rekindles our hospitality; for the Lord who gave himself that we may live; for opening our eyes to see him who is no longer with us in the flesh, through his body and blood that we share. We are an Easter people and alleluia is our song.

A number of parishioners added comments to their sheets last weekend, including...

"One suggestion/comment is to change the word 'thing' to 'purpose'!"

Great suggestion. We have updated the sheet with the changed wording.

"Let's do all of them. Mission Statement could be written to cover all of the above... these are not mutually exclusive." | "These are all of equal importance and cannot be ranked because they are interconnected. All are critical to our authentic mission." | "All of the above are important for our parish community - it is a case of progressing with each or more of them and not treating the church as a 'corporate' organisation with a marketing propaganda."

Thanks so much for the feedback. Eight other parishioners discerned similarly that the five purposes were of equal importance. As you have raised, each of the five purposes are connected, important and vital to building a healthy, growing and faithful parish filled with missionary disciples.

Based on the discernment of all our parishioners, our final parish mission statement sentence could well incorporate all of these purposes, not to mention of course being key elements of our eventual parish plan! It is however worthwhile to note that our approach is not in any way 'corporate' nor 'marketing' and rather, through the prayer, reflection, discussion, discernment and fellowship of all our parishioners, is focused on together creating a new way of being a Catholic Parish, a way of Being Church in the City, that ensures we are the best possible stewards of what God has entrusted to us, and achieve His vision for our parish.

"Can I suggest that the church takes advantage of the huge foot traffic on Victoria Ave to set up a table on the street corner staffed by two volunteers advertising the church and giving away Bibles to passers-by and encouraging people to visit the church and light a candle." | "Make it clear - all are welcome! p.s. we should be videoing all masses and making them available online - when people sign in, get their name and details to minister to them!"

OUR MISSION

Parishioner responses to our Primary Purpose

As mentioned in the presentation last weekend, during Masses in November and Ministry Circle workshops, we asked parishioners, what is the primary purpose God is calling us to focus on as a parish mission? Here is a further selection of our responses...

"Enkindled by God's love, to love and serve others and welcome all to join in the faith journey i.e., Love God, love others, Make disciples."

"Our mission is to reach out to the broader community in Chatswood, to spread the Word and by way of example, help the community to live by Christian values."

"To help each other and encourage each other worship God."

"Evangelise. Bible study."

"To spread the Good News."

"To awaken all parishioners to the mission and purpose of life. To reunite the community to the mission and purpose of the church on love and service to the universe."

"To unite under His name. Preach His Good News. Tell other people about Him."

"To rebuild the Church in our area - the parish needs to be the voice of the Church and must focus on evangelising to young people as the parish and church in general is aging. Young people are struggling and are turning to other spirituality because of a practice of beige Catholicism and immature formation. The parish needs to focus on a radical living and teaching of the faith that attracts and challenges young people to stay in or come back to the Church. Our parish and church will not survive if we fail."

"The primary thing to focus on as a parish purpose, our mission is to stop bad legislation from being passed with such haste! Our leaders and Elders should scrutinise important Bills and teach the congregation about what they will mean for us Catholics. Similarly, that would make our votes count in elections. We need to vote in Godly politicians NOT climate activists. Thank you for your efforts to discern God's will and to help us improve our parish community." "To bring non and lapsed Catholics to faith and Sunday mass. To not lose our young people by supporting them to be intellectually stimulated in the faith."

"To help everyone who needs it and to love everyone like God loved us!"

"To be a positive, compassionate and charitable presence in our community."

"Building strong faith and a strong church everlastingly."

"Love one another so people can feel the special gift we have."

"Be kind and caring."

"To be the shepherd and forget about being the Pharisees. Worry less about our reputation and more about each other."

"Understand God's message through the Eucharist and bring not only active parishioners closer to God but also those who have forgotten Him and those who do not know Him."

"To help each parishioner feel the spirit of God. To discern right from wrong and bring values and beliefs back to God."

"Find ways to connect to Chatswood city, so that the local community will see the church as a place of support in all forms, that can be relevant to their lives."

"Get people who may not have thought to come to church to then be inspired to come to church and stay in the church and also to appeal to lapsed Catholics to come back."

"To be living witnesses of God's love to others, in short to be another Christ."

"To be a sign of Christ's presence through reflecting Mary's love for both our community and for those searching."

"To really help the poor."

THE SACREDNESS OF ANZAC DAY



ANZAC Day can be broadly described as sacred, even though it is a human event, as are all human events sacred. Why? Because God walks in and is a present to us through every human event within our imperfect world. The birth of Christ, His taking flesh and living amongst us is enduring and transformational. Christ lives with us and is immersed within our human condition, both good and evil.

ANZAC Day is sacred because human life is sacred. Each human being is precious in God's sight. The life and fate of each soldier who died at Gallipoli matters to God. The nobility, the courage, heroism, the selfless acts and mateship of each matters to God and indeed are graced by Him. The immense grief of loved ones for the dead matters, God grieves with them as does the communal mourning of a nation stripped of so many young lives, this matters to God . This Anzac Day citizens will march with both pride and honour. This will be seen on their faces, both young and old, gathered in unity of purpose. This matters and is sacred to God. The sacredness of each human life compelled God to send his Son so that through his Death all may have life.

Each generation will find new meaning in the celebration of Anzac day. Many in our secular world focus entirely on human values which is very good in itself. The prism of faith will hopefully allow us a far deeper and richer understanding of the human condition in the person of Jesus as we ponder the significance of this Anzac event and deal resiliently with world events. In Christ's Death and Resurrection we have a source of hope that not only supports us in those catastrophic events but can aide us greatly in the challenges of every day human existence.

OLOD CHATSWOOD VINNIES MARCH REPORT



We responded to 10 calls for help during March, one is still ongoing.

Four calls were from people new to us. Two of these sought help to set up in new digs in our area. One was off the streets going into public housing, and the other was referred by Ryde Community Centre who had found rented accommodation for an Iranian lady who has been in Australia a relatively short time.

Of the other two, one was a well qualified professional who because of anxiety problems has difficulty in maintaining employment and keeping up mortgage payments. The other was a "clean for several years" ex addict who was experiencing a minor emergency (Often other organisations including Dept of Health refer their clients/patients to us for help with furnishing new accommodation. Our policy is to provide basics either new, second hand or donated and/or refer them to our No Interest Loans scheme to enable the access to funds for other wants).

Two of the other 5 persons previously known to us are perpetually struggling to make ends meet due to their particular circumstances. One, a Disability Support Pensioner, has expensive medical issues and legal complications; we provided help to get a replacement 2nd hand phone for him. The other chap on Jobseeker, is suffering from work related injuries which are not covered by compensation and which restrict his work opportunities. (Unfortunately we cannot provide income support and have to restrict ourselves to probems/emergencies)

Two other Disability Support Pensioners, both with health difficulties and who find themselves in need of a bit of assistance from time to time usually associated with paying bills and servicing loan repayments, sought help.

Our last help seeker is also a DSP who has difficulty in accessing public transport and whom we assist with transport to get to his medical providers when needed.

We expended over \$900 in food and goods, over \$1000 in furniture and white goods and \$750 in medical /pharmaceuticals.
