This Sunday's Gospel - Matthew 11:25-30

I remember when I was still growing up, whenever one of my siblings got sick or my family was faced with a serious problem, my parents would always go to the Carmelite nuns to ask for their prayers. We did not know the nuns personally since they were a contemplative community which means that they were cloistered within the walls of their monastery. When we visited them on special occasions, we had to go to a room where a wooden grill separated us from them.

Cloistered and contemplative nuns do not leave the monastery not unless they need to go and see a doctor. They depend on donations from their

benefactors for their day-to-day needs. And since they cannot leave the confines of their convent, other lay volunteers help them with their groceries, gardening, and maintenance of their buildings.

The Feast of our Lady of Mount Carmel falls on the 16th of July. In 1251, our Lady appeared to St. Simon Stock who was then the Father General of the Carmelite Order. She presented him the Brown Scapular with this promise, "Receive my beloved son, this habit of thy order: this shall be to thee and to all Carmelites a privilege, that whosoever dies clothed in this shall never suffer eternal fire It shall be a sign of salvation, a protection in danger, and a pledge of peace." Later on, Pope John XXII had a vision of our Lady of Mount Carmel and she said this to him in relation to the wearing of the Scapular: "I, the Mother of Grace, shall descend on the Saturday after their death and whomsoever I shall find in Purgatory, I shall free, so that I may lead them to the holy mountain of life everlasting." Countless miracles, protections, deliverances, and conversations are attributed to the wearing of the Scapular. A story is told that there was a priest who was called to the bedside of a man who had been away from the Sacraments for many years. The man did not want to see a priest. And so, when the priest visited him, he did not say a word. But the priest asked him to look at the little Scapular that he was holding, and said to him, "Will you wear this if I put it on you? I ask nothing more." He agreed to wear it, and within the hour he wanted to go to confession and make his peace with God. The priest later said, "This did not surprise me, because for over 700 years Our Lady has been working in this way through her Scapular." [2]

Among the saints who had great devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel and her Scapular are St. Alphonsus of Liguori, St. John Bosco, St. Peter Claver, and St. John Paul II.



Next Sunday we will have the blessing of the Brown Scapulars and will be distributed after the 9:00 AM and 10:30 AM Masses.

"I am gentle and humble of heart..."

Servant of God, Laureana Franco, was a Filipino member of the Legion of Mary, who was bothered that the children in her parish were not being taught about the beauty of the Catholic faith through the catechism. In 1996 Laureana finally responded to the desire to see this formation of children in her parish by resigning from her work, and taking up a full time volunteering role as a catechist and teacher in her parish.

This meant no stable income and a much more simple life of poverty. However, instead of mourning what she had lost, Laureana rejoiced that she was fully and truly free now to spread the message of God's love to children.

Laureana found great success as a catechist. Parents and her fellow parishioners admired the strength of her gentleness in the way she taught young children. Above all however, they remembered her humility. Laureana never spoke to anyone about her decision to leave her work, it was others that noticed her new life and spread news of her humility and trust in God.

Reflecting on Laureana's life we can ask ourselves: What about our lives makes it challenging to remain gentle and humble of heart? What would stop us from giving up the security of our jobs to go and spread God's love to others?

From last Sunday's reading at the end of chapter 10 we have leapt to the end of the next. The prayer of Jesus that opens today's gospel reading begins like many biblical prayers, but it has much in common with Daniel 2:23. Daniel's Aramaic text has a two verb construction, usually translated as give thanks and praise, but Matthew's account has only one verb, the same as the Septuagint's translation for Daniel's first verb, but the Greek version translates variously to confess, profess and praise. Daniel's prayer (2:20-23) is in the first part of the first story of king Nebuchadnezzar's dreams, but this section with Daniel's prayer is not employed anywhere in our Lectionary although it might better accompany today's gospel reading than Zechariah 9:9-10, the source for Palm Sunday's image of the humble king riding a donkey. Daniel's context is important: Nebuchadnezzar was troubled by incomprehensible dreams, but he set an impossible task for his "wise men" (astrologers, magicians, sorcerers, etc.); they were both to tell him his dream and explain it without him telling them what he had dreamed. They could not do so, and they told him "no man" could, so he ordered their execution. Daniel, the wise Hebrew youth and interpreter of dreams, and his three friends (famous for their hymn of praise while in the furnace) were caught up by this edict. They sought God's mercy in prayer; the mystery was revealed to Daniel, who cries out: "Blessed be the name of God forever, for wisdom and majesty are his ... he confers wisdom on the wise and knowledge on the discerning, revealing deep and hidden things ... to you, God of my fathers, I give thanks and praise for giving me wisdom and understanding, and making known to me what we asked..." This saved Daniel, his friends, and all the witless men.

Jesus' prayer draws from Daniel's text. Its place in Matthew is of interest, for it follows directly after the lament over Chorazin, Bethsaida and Capernaum, which had not repented even after the miracles worked in them, unlike Nebuchadnezzar, who repented at each turn and whose last words in Daniel are in praise to God. Matthew presents Jesus as another but greater Daniel; to him is revealed a greater mystery, made clear in the next verse (v.27): the mutual and reciprocal knowing of the Father and Son is unique, so Jesus knows God the Father's hidden mysteries, and in him God knows by direct experience humanity's trials. God's response is mercy. The invitation that follows (v.28-30), "Come to me..." is unique to Matthew. It is related to Sirach (Ecclesiasticus) 51:23-30, the second part of the poem to Wisdom in that book's appendix which incorporates an element from Jeremiah 6:16 where the reward for returning to the true way of the covenant is finding rest for your souls. Jesus is the true way; to come to him is to walk in the way of true wisdom, understanding and surrendering oneself to God's rule, submitting to the gentle yoke of God's law of love and mercy. The two Sabbath day stories that immediately follow (Matt 12:1-14, but which are not in our Sunday Lectionary), the picking of grain and the healing of a man's withered hand, are directly linked to today's pericope. In them Jesus challenges the Pharisees' strict but unmerciful interpretation of the Sabbath law of rest. He reminds them of Hosea 6:6, "I want mercy, not sacrifice". Thus today's passage is a critical point in Matthew, for when application of its merciful teaching violates the Pharisees' understanding of the Sabbath law of rest, they begin to plot to destroy Jesus. The question for our communities is: Do we embody the teachings of Jesus, who himself embodies the mercy of God? If not, then why should anyone come and abide with us in whom we say the Spirit of God and of Christ has made a home (cf. Rom 8:9)?

New Organ:

I am delighted to announce that we have acquired a new organ for the church. It is a reed organ, built by Danish company Joh. P. Andresen & Co. Not much is known about the company, but it seems that the organ was probably built in the early to mid-20th century.

A reed organ differs from a pipe organ in that its sound is produced using small metal reeds. It has no pedalboard, but instead has two pedals for pumping air. Reed organs require constant pedalling to maintain a steady airflow while playing, similar to bagpipes. Much like a pipe organ, it uses stop knobs to create different sounds, and it also has knee levers for more expressive capabilities. This allows a reed organ to go from very soft to very loud instantly, giving the performer great versatility.

I am excited to find possible uses for this instrument in the liturgy, particularly for Holy Hour, as its warm tone lends itself well to devotional services.

Life In the Early Church: presentations to High School students.

High School Catechists Deacon Roberto, Gillian Hawkins and Catechist Co-ordinator Karen Forbes conducted presentations to Chatswood High School students on June 28.

Students from Years 7 to 10 at Chatswood High School attended presentations on Life in the Early Church. The aim was for students to develop a realistic understanding of what it meant to be a follower of the risen Jesus in the first century of the Christian era, and to imagine what it would've been like living during that time as an early Christian.

The Pentecost event was reviewed and selected passages from the Acts of the Apostles were explored. Discussions explored that while many Early Christians struggled with minimal financial and social resources,

what mattered was they actively sought opportunities for doing good: caring for the sick and the poor and having faith and fellowship. Early Christians embraced a new way of living with confidence that the risen Jesus was guiding their daily lives. This had tremendous impact in laying a Christian foundation for Western civilisation.

A worthwhile day of reflection with the students!

VINNIES CHATSWOOD WINTER APPEAL

The St Vincent de Paul Statewide Winter Appeal 2023 began in May and will last until the end of August.




