FROM FR DAVID





I write this on the eve of our 24 Hours of the Lord. I pray that this day be one of much grace for all our parish. May that grace touch every part of our community life and bring forth new life. Thank you to all those who have been able to participate, and in particular to our many priests who have joined us throughout the entire 24 hours. Yes, Confession was available at 3am on Saturday morning!

As many of us may be aware, Chatswood Chase is undergoing significant development. We have now been advised of commencement of the development works at Chatswood Chase Shopping Centre affecting the Ground Level and Levels 1 and 2. From 15 March the multideck carpark will be temporarily closed with no access to the carpark via the Archer Street speed ramp or the Malvern Avenue ramp. Access to the carpark will be via Victoria Avenue only. Vicinity and Multiplex are in the process of investigating opportunities to open up additional levels in the multideck later this year so we'll keep you informed as that progresses. In addition, work along Archer Street will occur in late March. These works will include the demolition of the

existing awnings and erection of B-Class hoardings along the Archer Street frontage. These works will be completed during a night shift and will require Council out of hours permits, footpath closures and pedestrian and traffic control. Multiplex are continuing to work through the details with Council to secure exact dates and times, so we'll continue to keep you informed as we have more exact information ahead of commencing the works. Similarly, Multiplex are working towards commencing the B-Class hoarding install along Victoria Avenue in early April, which will involve the same process as Archer S. So, much development on the horizon. It is expected that the main body of the shopping centre will not re-open until the end of 2025.

Some very good news: with the settlement of all our accounts for our recent Lunar New Year celebrations, we have been able to contribute the amount of \$5,109.18 towards the Pastoral Works Fund. This is a mighty achievement and is a very significant help to us meeting our obligations towards the Fund.

Many will appreciate the historical link our parish has enjoyed with an orphanage in Maboura, Timor-Leste. Our support, over the years, has enabled a number of young women to receive an education. To underscore our continuing commitment and to provide us with a sustainable framework by which to keep supporting young women in Timor-Leste in this way, our Parish has recently entered a Memorandum of Understanding with the Australia Timor-Leste Advancement Society (ATLAS) based here in Sydney. Through this partnership we will be able to ensure that our support is well directed, transfer funds securely and receive regular reports on the effect that our contribution is making. We are very grateful to Carla Gageler who has agreed to be our Parish Project Leader in this regard. Carla will provide us now with occasional updates on how our contributions are making a difference in young people's lives.

This year we have an extraordinary number of people being baptised on our Easter weekend: 46 in total! This is a sure sign of the Holy Spirit in our midst. Our catechumens have been prayerfully preparing for this most important occasion in their journey of faith and life through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. As part of this Rite, on the 4th and 5th Sundays in Lent there is a prayer of blessing, called the Scrutinies, that takes place after the Homily for those preparing for Baptism. We will pray this Rite with our catechumens at our 10.30am Mass on the following two Sundays.

Praying that our Lenten journey is a time of grace for us all.

By willingly abstaining from certain comforts, we refocus our attention on what truly matters —our relationship with God and our journey towards holiness. It's a deliberate choice to resist the pull of immediate gratification and instead pursue the higher calling of spiritual growth and self-discipline. Through fasting, we learn to navigate life's temptations with clarity and purpose, keeping our eyes fixed on the eternal rewards of faithfulness and obedience to God.

In this week's Gospel Jesus said to Nicodemus: "The Son of Man must be lifted up...so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him".

GOSPEL REFLECTION

In considering the Scriptures today, we delve into the lessons of loss, redemption, and divine promise. The First Reading from Chronicles recounts the tragedy of the Hebrews' defeat and exile by the Babylonians. Here, we can see that Jerusalem's fall, the desecration of Solomon's temple, and the people's enslavement in Babylon serve as a sombre backdrop to a deeper, spiritual narrative that echoes through time to the story of Christ Himself.

This historical moment, though marked by loss and despair, is interpreted not as a consequence of Babylonian might but as a reflection of the Hebrews' own departure from their covenant with God. It serves as a moving comparison to Christ's own path. While the Hebrews faced the consequences of their actions, Christ willingly embraced human frailty and the weight of sin, which, by its very nature, erodes and destroys our capacity for love, joy, and communion with others and with God, leading us into isolation and despair. Jesus opens for us the complete opposite: a life of fullness and

unity with God and each other.

Moving through the readings, we see God does not leave us in the shadows of sin's consequences. The Gospel, according to John, offers this radiant contrast, revealing the boundless scope of divine grace. Christ's dialogue with Nicodemus opens a window to the heart of God's plan for humanity—a plan not for condemnation but for salvation. Through the lifting up of the Son of Man, we see not the finality of death but the dawn of a new promise, a testament to God's unfailing love and mercy.

Jesus assures Nicodemus, and all of us, of God's unwavering presence and the fulfilment of ancient promises. In the light of Christ's resurrection, we are invited to see beyond the immediacy of human weakness and failure to a horizon where grace triumphs. The message is clear: divine love and salvation are within reach for all who embrace God's design for our lives, choosing the path of grace over the solitude of our own destruction.

Reflecting on these truths and knowing that while the journey may be marked by trials and moments of doubt, we may see that the promise of God's love and salvation is eternal and unshakeable. In embracing this promise, we step into the light of Christ, allowing His grace to transform our lives, guiding us from the shadows of human destruction into the fullness of life in God's presence.

Fourth Sunday in Lent

GOD LOVED THE WORLD SO MUCH. During the season of Lent we humbly acknowledge the ways in which we have failed to respond to our Christian vocation. We do this before a God who is infinitely rich in mercy and grace, who sent the Son into the world not to condemn it but to be its saviour. Acknowledging our failings and accepting healing and forgiveness from Christ prepares us to celebrate the feast of Easter with great joy.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING 2 Chron 36: 14-16, 19-23 A reading from the second book of Chronicles.

The wrath and the mercy of the Lord are revealed in the exile and liberation of his All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity,

copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed

everything

of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up." '

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

GOD'S LOVE, GIFT AND GRACE

On this *Laetare* Sunday (so called for the first word of the liturgy is "rejoice") we find in the Letter to the Ephesians: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" (2:8). To contemplate this statement is to begin to understand the generous mercy and love of God for each of us.

This reading follows 2 Chronicles that recounts the fall of Jerusalem, despite the compassion of God for the people, but then King Cyrus of Persia liberating the exiles. So as the passage begins in Ephesians we see the continuity with God, who is rich in mercy. Three times "grace" is repeated: "by grace you have been saved," "the immeasurable riches of God's grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus" and "for by grace you have been saved through faith." This reiteration accentuates the love of God and invites us to know that "we are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus for good works."

John's Gospel reminds us "God so loved the world that he gave his only son so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (3:16). With his clear illumination of light and darkness, John affirms that "those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

How will we respond to God's love, gift and grace?

Each act of **giving**, whether it be through monetary donations, acts of service, or charitable deeds, teaches us the valuable lesson that **we can let go of things for the betterment of others**. In giving, we learn to prioritise the needs of others above our own desires, cultivating a spirit of generosity and compassion. This journey of selflessness not only enriches the lives of those we help but also deepens our connection to the divine. Through almsgiving, we emulate the self-sacrificial love of Christ, embodying His teachings and drawing closer to the essence of our faith – love.

Here's some easy ways you can practice almsgiving:

- Charitable Gift Registry: Create a charitable gift registry for special occasions like birthdays or weddings, allowing friends and family to donate to charity in your name instead of giving traditional gifts.
- Donate a Meal: Instead of eating out or ordering takeout, calculate the cost of a meal and donate that amount to a local food bank or charity, such as the Jesuit Refugee Services or Vinnies that provides meals and support for those in need.



THE ALFRESCO KITCHEN

If you joined us at last month's Lunar New Year celebrations and visited the Chinese food stall, you likely met the lovely Amy, who was busy preparing her signature noodles! Amy's passion for both food and people shines through her work as part of The Alfresco Community Kitchen (TACK), a dedicated group of volunteers who cook and serve meals to the homeless and vulnerable at Martin Place every Tuesday and alternate Saturday.

In Amy's own words, "Our aim is to cook and provide healthy, homecooked meals to the street community to ensure they do not go without. We also extend our support to those facing vulnerability – low income individuals, victims of domestic violence, halfway houses, and more. Many in our community don't know where their next meal will come from, so we also make takeaway dinners from leftovers from our service."

During regular sessions, TACK serves approximately 150-200 meals, with their Christmas service seeing close to 300 meals served last year. Additionally, they distribute necessity hampers to help the vulnerable through the Christmas and New Year break.

None of this would be possible without the kindness and generosity of volunteers and businesses who donate their time or resources to support this vital cause.

Currently, the kitchen is seeking more volunteers to assist with serving and cooking, as well as businesses willing to provide healthy food. **Can you lend a hand?** If so, please reach out to Olivia.Lee@bbcatholic.org.au who can connect you with Amy and the team.
