Dear friends,

As I shared at our special Prayer Vigil last Tuesday, 16 December, last Sunday evening, our parish along with members of other Christian Churches in the city of Willoughby gathered on the concourse at Chatswood for a beautiful evening of Christmas Carols. The night resounded with the sense of gentleness and peace, both of which lie at the very heart of the Christian Christmas story. Our evening finished with the sense of harmony and hope. At exactly the same time, on the other side of the city, at Bondi, others, too, were gathering with festivity to mark the Festival of Lights, Hanukah, itself a narrative of memory and hope. Their finished evening with unimaginable pain and distress. How do we reconcile these two experiences occurring in the same city at the same time? Joy and grief? Harmony and severance? Gentleness and barbarity? The juxtaposition feels too great for us to bear. It confounds us; it devastates us. We are confronted with the radical nature of our vulnerability, the acknowledgement that in the end we are completely at the mercy of one another - a truth form which we shield ourselves, but which is so radically exposed in what we have experienced. In an instant, we are confronted with the reality of evil: its inherent violence and even more so, its intrinsic absurdity, characterised as it is by non -sense. Evil abhors innocence; and it is the innocent who are its victims.



It forces yet again, the question how are we to respond to evil when suddenly, dramatically, violently it manifests itself? We are reminded again that evil can never be confronted with seeking to assert a force stronger than itself. This is simply to perpetuate the ancient treadmill of oppression and submission. No, rather the only way that we can address the manifestation of evil is to assert an entirely different logic – simply not to buy into its rhythm and demand – and rather to practice the exercise of an entirely different power – the power of friendship, of hospitality, of solidarity. This is why we absolutely need to come together in the face of evil – to hold one another, to reaffirm the bonds that bring us together, to cultivate community, together to light candles – small, flickering but with a strength stronger than any darkness can extinguish. Then we discover that with this power we hold a light that alone can give the answer to the experience of evil. **Suffering love is the one answer to anxiety suffered**. In other words, only a love that holds, that embraces, that carries, that accompanies demonstrates to us that evil has no ultimate power. This is the power that alone can disarm the power of evil. It refuses to enter the logic of evil and dares to asset something entirely different. And evil is confused and ultimately is forced to recognise its powerlessness, whatever its initial presentation.

It is into our situation of pain and confusion that the Christ Child is born. This is powerfully represented by Caravaggio's 1609 *Nativity* It is not a scene of escape from the world, but a descent into it. God chooses the low place, the shadowed place, the place where fear and hope exist side by side. Nothing is resolved yet. Nothing is made safe. But everything has been changed. Because in the midst of that darkness, life has been given. And once God has entered the night, the night is never the same again.

Preparing for Mass

In preparing to receive Christ in the Eucharist, you should consider:

- Have I interiorly prepared through prayer?
- Would the Sacrament of Reconciliation assist my preparation?
- Have I maintained the Eucharistic fast for one hour before receiving, except for water and medicine?*

*The elderly and infirm, along with those who care for them, are not bound to the Eucharistic fast.



"We must never forget the sacredness of what happens at Mass. It would be unthinkable to reduce the Eucharist to mere ritual or routine. Communion Procession

The act of processing forward to receive the Body and Blood of Christ is an important symbolic action, reminding us that we are a pilgrim people, while also uniting us as the one Body of Christ, journeying together. It is important, therefore, to remember that receiving the Body and Blood of Christ is not an isolated action, but rather part of a unifying ritual. In this regard, you should consider.

- Ensuring your actions allow the dignified and unifying pilgrimage as the Body of Christ, toward the Body of Christ. This includes singing the Communion Hymn, while processing.
- Being aware of your personal and valid choices as a communicant, that they do not disrupt the flow of the procession, or the ability of others to make their own choices.
- Leaving enough space between yourself and the person in front of you.
- As a sign of reverence to the Blessed Sacrament, gently bow not genuflect as you approach the Minster of Holy Communion.

Receiving the Body of Christ

When receiving the Body of Christ, the common posture in Australia is to stand; however, the communicant can choose to kneel, as long as they are aware of their surroundings and do not impact the reverence and safety of others. As you come forward to receive and gently bow, the Minister holds the host up to your eye level and says the words, "The Body of Christ", allowing you to reply "Amen" before receiving.

It is the communicant's choice whether to receive on the hand or on the tongue. Both are acceptable, and both should be done with reverence, respect and care.

Receiving on the hand

Place your hands out in front of you, with your dominant hand under your less dominant hand. Hold your hands still and open. Keep your fingers out of the way, allowing the Minister of Communion to place the host on your hand. Do not pluck or grab the host.

Once you receive on the hand, step to the side and consume the host while in the presence of the Minister.

Receiving on the tongue

After responding "Amen", open your mouth and gently extend your tongue out towards the Minister of Communion, so that they may place the host on your tongue. Please do not lower or bow your head while receiving on the tongue.

Once the host has been placed on your tongue, slowly draw your tongue back into your mouth to consume the Body of Christ.





Receiving the Blood of Christ

If the chalice is being offered at Mass, a communicant can choose if they wish to receive the Blood of Christ.


In the same manner which you approach the Body of Christ, bow gently as you approach the Minister, who will say "The Blood of Christ", and you respond "Amen." Take the Chalice in your hands as you would normally take a cup, and raise the Chalice to drink as normal, one sip is sufficient. Then carefully hand the Chalice back to the Minister.



My dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

Across many lands there is a venerable and beautiful custom: at the Christmas table, a place is set but left empty.

It is a quiet sign of welcome for the unexpected guest, perhaps a stranger, perhaps someone in need. Such a simple gesture, yet it speaks profoundly of the goodness of an open heart and a willingness to receive and to share.

In the busyness that so often accompanies Christmas, we can lose sight of these small but powerful symbols. The empty chair itself draws us back to the very first Christmas, when Mary and Joseph found no room at the inn.

Into that humble setting, God chose to enter our world as a tiny child, carried by a young mother who dared to say "yes," and protected by Joseph, who trusted the message of an angel.

The place prepared for the Christ Child was nothing more than a manger, an open box where animals were fed, yet it became the cradle of our salvation.

His birth in such unassuming surroundings was not only the fulfilment of ancient prophecy; it was the dawn of a hope that shines in every darkness, a mercy that heals the wounded heart, and a love that endures beyond all telling.

Oten at this time of year, countless people feel overwhelmed by financial strain, social pressures, or the uncertainties of our times.

Year after year, we find ourselves speaking of conflict, fear, and suffering, now felt with heartbreaking clarity in recent days when the brutal Bondi massacre devastated families and shattered communities.

And yet, Christmas proclaims a hope that cannot be silenced.

So, this Christmas, as we give thanks for God's greatest gift to the whole of humanity, may our parishes, families, and communities become *living Bethlehems*, places where the tenderness, humility, and peace of Jesus Christ are encountered anew.

And may we always keep a place at our tables, and in our hearts, for those in need.


I pray that the graces poured out upon us in this Jubilee of Hope will lead us into the coming year with renewed confidence in our Saviour, who draws near to us always.


Rom 1:1

Jesus was born of Mary, the betrothed of Joseph, a son of David.

This is how Jesus Christ came to be born. His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph; but before they came to live together she was found to be with child through the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a man of honour and wanting to spare her

publicity, decided to divorce her informally. He had made up his mind to do this when the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, and said 'Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because she has conceived what is in her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name him Jesus, because he is the one who is to save his people from their sins.' Now all this took place to fulfil the words spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son

and they will call him Emmanuel,

a name which means 'God-is-with-us'. When Joseph woke up he did what the angel of the Lord had told him to do: he took his wife to his home.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

GOD WITH US

With Christmas only days away, today's Gospel announces Jesus' birth. Unlike the perhaps more familiar story from Luke's Gospel, with the annunciation by Gabriel to Mary, Matthew's focus is on Joseph, a heroic character for the Gospel's Jewish audience, reminiscent of the Old Testament patriarch, Joseph. Matthew's story is different from Luke's. In Matthew's Jewish world marriage occurred in two stages. The first was engagement; the second, cohabitation. Mary and Joseph are married according to Jewish law, though not living together. We must remember, too, that the Gospel in general and this story in particular is a theological narrative. Matthew is not concerned with gynaecology, but theology. It is about God and the Holy Spirit. Mary's pregnancy is the fruit of God's action. As this becomes known to Joseph, he wants to step out of the scene and divorce her quietly without bringing her shame—an option open to him from Jewish law.

Through an angel in a dream—reminiscent again of the Old Testament patriarch, 'the dreamer'- Joseph comes to a profound theological truth. Mary's conception is the work of God's Spirit. This is God's act. Joseph is then instructed to name the child, an important Israelite convention that incorporates the one to be born into Joseph's kinship group. Matthew concludes the scene with a second naming, now provided by the prophet Isaiah. The child will be 'Emmanuel', 'God with us', a theme that will continue throughout Matthew even to the Gospel's concluding scene on Easter day. We celebrate and affirm God 'being-with-us' this Christmas. We want this God to 'be with us' for the year ahead.




