

Dear friends,

Bishop Anthony Randazzo has written a letter to the clergy and people of Broken Bay, for the Solemnity of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (*Corpus Christi*) which we celebrate this weekend, along with a number of our children who are receiving the Eucharist for the very first time. As he recounts in his letter, each Sunday, we gather at the altar as one Body in Christ, drawn into the divine mystery where heaven touches earth. We hear the Word proclaimed, we offer our prayers, and we receive the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Yet amid the sacredness of the liturgy, a question stirs our hearts: Are we truly participating in the Eucharist, or merely present? Saint Jerome, one of the greatest biblical scholars of the Church, offers us a striking reflection that pierce through routine and indifference. In his Commentary on the Psalms, he writes: "For me, the Gospel is the Body of Christ; for me, the holy Scriptures are his teaching. And when he says: whoever does not eat my flesh and drink my blood (Jn 6:53), even though these words can also be understood of the [Eucharistic] Mystery, Christ's body and blood are really the word of Scripture, God's teaching. When we approach the [Eucharistic] Mystery, if a crumb falls to the ground we are troubled. Yet when we are listening to the word of God, and God's Word and Christ's flesh and blood are being poured into our ears yet we pay no heed, what great peril should we not feel?" (cf. Homily 74 on Psalm 147)

Saint Jerome's words bring us face to face with the gravity and beauty of the Eucharist, not only as a sacrament received at the altar but also as a mystery proclaimed in the Word of God. At the celebration of the Mass, both the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist are essential to our communion with Christ. Together, they form one act of worship that draws us into the Paschal Mystery. Saint Jerome's exhortation is as timely today as it was in the early Church. We are always at risk of becoming too comfortable, too casual, with the sacred. Yet the Eucharist is no ordinary meal, and the Scriptures are no ordinary words. They are Jesus Christ himself, speaking and giving himself to us.

Let us approach every Mass with renewed reverence, not only for the consecrated bread and wine, but for the Word that is Christ's own flesh poured into our ears. May we never treat casually what God offers so lovingly. And may our participation in the Eucharist, in both Word and Sacrament, be fully conscious, and life-changing.

With monies we received as a grant from the NSW Government we have now upgraded various locks in our church to electronic ones. They are simple to use but may require a demonstration! With the same monies we are able to install a new electronic gate into the Parish Office Carpark. This will be installed this coming Monday 23 June. The carpark will be closed during the morning at least. This installation will enable us to keep the gate closed at times, though it will always be opened at the times of Masses. However, access will always be available for those parishioners who use the carpark with regularity. If you are one form whom the access code will be very important and useful do let our parish office know. The closure of the gate especially during an afternoon will limit the unauthorized use of the carpark such that there is no room for parishioners!

Our new Piety Store will soon be completed! Some further shelving is being installed, and then there will be some touch up, and religious goods will become available once more!

Next Sunday, 29 January we enjoy the seventh session of Parish-in-Council! Registrations will close in the coming days so do be sure to sign up. These are always very significant gatherings that help us deepen our sense of shared mission as a community of faith.

Through the first weeks of July we will also conduct a parish survey similar to one we undertook when we first commenced the discernment of our mission. The survey will provide us with insight into the community's pulse and wellbeing. It will also assist us to measure our growth over the last several years. We will conduct the survey at Masses on the weekends of 6 July and 13 July.

Ken had a good, rewarding and long life, never retiring and working to the very end. A good and faithful servant of the Lord. We will never forget his laughter, his smile, his firm handshake, and his pat on the back.

Our Farewell to Deacon Kevin last Wednesday



Seventeen years ago, I met Dcn Kevin Hale just as he was beginning his ordained ministry as a deacon. You see, on that evening in April 2008, both he and my husband Roberto were ordained deacons by Bishop David Walker. Even then, there was something unmistakable about Dcn Kevin—steady, sincere, quietly committed and with a dry wicked sense of humour. Today, I'm deeply grateful for the privilege of offering a few words of thanks for someone whose life of service has touched many. Over the years, his pastoral journey took him to three parishes – Hornsby Cathedral in Waitara, his home parish of Kuring-gai Chase and the last eight years in Chatswood at Our Lady of Dolours. In each, he offered not just his time, but his heart. He didn't simply join parish initiatives -- he helped shape them, often working behind the scenes with a quiet diligence that made things happen. He carved a unique and lasting place in the RCIA ministry, walking patiently with those preparing to enter the Catholic Church. So many found in him not just a catechist, but a companion and a guide—someone who welcomed them warmly, listened attentively and gently helped them grow in faith. He ministered tirelessly to individuals and families, officiating baptisms, weddings and funerals.

And whether it was in planning parish events, supporting Parish-in-Council gatherings, or building friendships within the community, he brought consistency, care and a touch of humour that made people feel at ease. His contributions were always thoughtful, his follow-through reliable. You always knew that if he said he would do something, it would be done and done well. Among the parish staff and community, he has become a trusted friend. He sees people—really sees them—and takes the time to make them feel included. There's a kindness in him that doesn't seek attention, but that leaves a lasting impression. And yes, there's also that well-known wit, that light remark delivered with near-perfect timing and always with heart. Now, as Dcn Kevin steps away from active ministry—whatever that might look like for someone as active as he's always been—we pause to honour not only what he has done, but who he is. His service has always been more than duty. It has been a deep expression of love for the Church and for the parish community. Thank you to his wife Lois, who has very supportively walked this journey with him with strength and grace, and to his children and grandchildren who bring him such joy. They have so generously shared him with us, and we are better for it. Dcn Kevin, you have been a steady presence, a consistent guiding hand, a quiet inspiration. You've shown us that faithfulness doesn't need fanfare to make an impact—it simply needs love.

I close with a quote from St. Teresa of Calcutta:

"Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love."

You, Deacon Kevin, have done both. On behalf of the Chatswood Parish, thank you, and may this next season of your life be filled with the same grace you've so generously given to others.

Our Year of Jubilee



As many of us would have heard, Pope Leo XIV has now determined Sunday 7 September as the date of the canonization of both Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati. **We will be the only church in Australia with a chapel with a relic of both saints**. This will be quite a remarkable legacy of our parish's celebration of the 2025 Year of Jubilee. Our Eucharistic Chapel continues to draw towards completion with every expectation now that it will be complete by early September. The confirmation of the date has now assisted us with confidence in our planning of a number of events associated with the Jubilee.

Visit of Cardinal Pablo David on the first weekend of August

we have invited Cardinal Pablo David from the Philippines to be with us on the weekend of 1-4 August. This weekend will be a special parish Jubilee event focusing on the Jubilee theme of Hope. The program of the weekend (subject to confirmation by the Bishop) will be:

Sunday 4 August 7.00pm Dinner with Bishop.

Canonisation of Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati Sunday 7 September

We will have a large Mass for this at 5.30pm on Sunday 7 September (with student orchestra and parish choir), followed by telecast to St Peter's Rome.

This may be the opportunity for Bishop Anthony to bless our finalised chapel which will by that stage also host a relic of Pier Giorgio Frassati.

We are considering a 'novena' leading up to this on the forecourt each night with a bonfire for young people to gather?



This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which



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is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming his death.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'GIVE THEM YOURSELVES TO EAT!'

For today's Feast we return to the Gospel of Luke. It is about food. The evangelist frequently presents Jesus eating and feasting. In fact, one scholar (Robert Karris) has said that Jesus got himself killed by the way he ate! This is not about the quantity of food or the menu, but the kind of people with whom Jesus ate. The scurrilous and social pariahs were his meal guests, frowned upon by the religious officials.

Today's Gospel is about food, so appropriate for our Feast. While space prevents a full exposé of the story, the disciples see a pastoral problem: they have a hungry crowd before them and want Jesus to deal with it. Jesus responds, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' This could also be translated 'You give them *yourselves* to eat!'

The disciples lament that they are incapable and have only five loaves and two fish-the average daily size of a meal for a family-for such a large crowd. And how many? 5000 males. Each male representing the head of a household in the Greco-Roman world which would (according to some scholars) have around 50 members. Luke is imagining 250,000 people present, the size of an ancient city! Jesus gets the disciples to form the crowd into household groups and then, after a eucharistic act of blessing, has the food distributed. It satisfies. This symbolically loaded story affirms the power of the Eucharist for a household-gathering of those seeking nourishment, including ourselves.


What is Vespers?

On the last Saturday of each month, the Parish Schola (comprising members of the Parish Choir) sings the office of Vespers, also known as Evening Prayer, at 4:45pm.

Vespers is a very ancient Office, with origins dating back to the first century, though it was more formally defined around the sixth century through the Rule of St Benedict. The Schola sings in alternatim – left side (cantoris) and right side (decani) alternating – as is the norm in monastic settings.

The service, in essence, is simple. It begins with an invitation to prayer, followed by a hymn. Then, the choir leads the singing of psalms. Then, the priest reads from the Bible, and there is a short responsory. The choir then sings the Magnificat – the canticle of the Blessed Virgin Mary – typically as a composed work in four-part harmony. The service concludes with prayers, a blessing, and the singing of the Marian Antiphon (during our current time of year, the Salve Regina).

All are welcome to attend Vespers, and also join in the singing, especially of the hymn and chanted psalms. The texts are displayed on Powerpoint slides, but can also be downloaded on your phone using the Universalis app and navigating to Vespers on the day.



JOIN THE FIGHT TO PROTECT LIFE!

"....That night, atrocities were being committed by civilised Germans all over Leipzig, all over the country. Nearly every Jewish home and business in my city was vandalised, burned or otherwise destroyed, as were our synagogues. As were our people . . .; When I think of those Germans relishing our pain, I want to ask them, 'Have you got a soul? Have you got a heart?' It was madness, in the true sense of the word – otherwise civilised people lost all ability to tell right from wrong. They committed terrible atrocities, and worse, they enjoyed it. They thought they were doing the right thing. And even those who could not fool themselves that we Jews were the enemy did nothing to stop the mob. If enough people had stood up then, on Kristallnacht, and said, 'Enough! What are you doing? What is wrong with you?' then the course of history would have been different. But they did not. They were scared. They were weak".

Our Vinnies Conference May Report

OLOS Vinnies received 10 calls for help in May, mercifully still down in number from recent months.

Two were new to us. One had experienced homelessness from a recent DV episode; we helped her to re-establish in some new digs and get help from relevant DV support agencies. The other, suffering depression, was referred to sources of help appropriate to his circumstances. Seven of the other eight calls were for assistance with food arising from ongoing issues and one was for pharmaceuticals help. Some \$500 was expended.

As mentioned last report our financial position is precarious (\$17000 in the red and relying on external help) and we are hopeful that our coming Winter Appeal on 19/20 July will help ease that situation.
