From Fr David: The Spirituality of Ordinary Time

"A Time to Come Inside"

What if we could be liberated from the traditional European seasonal categories and see the liturgical cycle in the context of the seasonal pattern that is actually occurring around us? Then, perhaps, we could recognise an abundance of natural symbols that are most appropriate for enfleshing the Mystery being celebrated in the liturgical cycle.

We might recognise in fact that at no better time of the year could we celebrate the festival of Easter in south east Australia than when we do. The landscape burnt and bleached by the intense summer sun is revitalised into verdancy. The landscape celebrates rejuvenation and restoration as we celebrate new life in Christ dead and now risen. It is also the time in which the two principal elements in the Australian landscape, fire and water, change in their symbolism. During summer fire was destructive, purifying; water cleansing and refreshing. In mid March through to April, fire becomes the welcome source of warmth and water the unwelcome source of mist, damp and flood. As these principal elements of the landscape change in their significance for us, so do we begin to shift in liturgical season - from Easter time to the season known as Ordinary Time.

For the original inhabitants of this area of Australia it was the most sacred duty of the women of the tribe at this time to protect the hot coals of the tribe's fire within shells bartered from seaside clans. In analogous fashion, from Pentecost onwards we become the enspirited people who carry the light of Christ within the grey ordinariness of our lives. At Pentecost the Spirit is welcomed as fire which consoles and protects against the immanent bitterness of the damp clouds of our own mediocrity. The Spirit enflames our dreams.

The dreams we carry in our own hearts are a little like hot coals within shells. It is the time to ask what burning coal do we carry within our heart? And how do we keep breathing life into this glowing coal so that from it many fires may be sparked. Is the dream of faith aglow, present in our hearts in such way to give warmth and sustenance to our world? Or are we simply carrying charcoal? We are to be guardians of a dream burning within us: the dream of Jesus of Nazareth – fire for our world.

To paraphrase Patrick White, the Easter fire which we carry within the shell of our journey licks, up and swallows our loneliness which the diminishment of light seems to inevitably invoke at this time of the year just as it seems to console us "against the distance between aspiration and human nature." (*Voss* 191). The dampness which marks the bulk of Ordinary Time for us begins to remind us of our transitoriness and insignificance. In another of his works, *Tree of Man*, White speaks of how in the dissolved world of flowing water . . . it was obvious that solidity is not. Against the mist and dampness we lose the spontaneity and reassurance of the summer sun. Our "spirits grumble . . . over [the summer warmth and freedom] which must end." And the rain continues to fall, seemingly incessantly at times, "lifting fears and resentments, setting [us] floating on the grey waters of sleep."

Indeed, exteriorly it is a season of grey somnolency - and liturgically we journey on without a great deal occurring. We find ourselves 'midway' - sustained by the memory of the light of the Christ event celebrated through the Easter Season and looking forward n home to that time when the "sky [moves] in an extravagance of recovered blue" in the dawn of Advent By September, just over half way through Ordinary Time we tire of the greyness, the somnolency around us, the mediocrity within us. We long for the light and the sun and the rescinding of the waters once again. We look forward to the birth of the Son yet again

It can, however, be a season of either sleep or reflection. As all transitional phases in our life, it can be a time of interiority and reflection. The *lectio continua* of the cycle of gospel readings invites us deeper into consideration of the journey of Christ's own life and of how he himself preserved the fire of the Father's love burning in his heart through all the vicissitudes of his ministry.

Subsequently, it might also be a time when the possibility of the transcendent in its ordinary immanence might surprise us. Just as it did for Stan and Amy Parker in *The Tree of Man*, "arrested at their window [but who] seemed also to move for a moment, to sway on the stems of their bodies, as their souls stirred and recognised familiar countries. For a moment they were limitless." We too are invited to recognise eternity weaving itself through the finitude of our own experience, never losing hope in the divine promise which has been given us but which we must cultivate in and through the humanness of our lives.

PILGRINS

A very special Guest to our Parish in the Year of Jubilee

As part of the Jubilee for Youth we have invited Cardinal Pablo David President of the Philippines Conference of Bishops to be with us on the weekend of 1-4 August 2025

Cardinal Pablo Virgilio S. David, Bishop of Kalookan, Philippines, was born in Betis, Guagua, Pampanga, in the metropolitan Archdiocese of San Fernando, on 2 March 1959. He was ordained a priest on 12 March 1983 for the metropolitan archdiocese of San Fernando. After a year as deputy parish priest, he was director of the Mother of Good Counsel Seminary until 1986. From 1986 to 1991 he studied abroad, receiving a licentiate and doctorate in Sacred Theology from the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, and attending courses at the École Biblique de Jerusalem where he received a diploma. Upon returning to the Philippines, he held several management and teaching roles in the educational team of the archdiocesan seminary. In 2002 he was director of the Department of Theology of the seminary, continuing to teach Sacred Scripture. In the same year he was elected vice president of the Catholic Biblical Association of the Philippines and vice president of the Archdiocesan Media Apostolate Networks. He is the author, at both academic and popular level, of several publications on Holy Scripture. On 27 May 2006, he was appointed titular bishop of Guardialfiera and auxiliary bishop of San Fernando by Pope Benedict XVI, and was consecrated the following 10 July. On 14 October 2015, he was appointed bishop of Kalookan.

He was created and proclaimed cardinal by Pope Francis in the Consistory of 7 December 2024 and was assigned the titular church *Trasfigurazione di Nostro Signore Gesù Cristo*.

NAIDOC WEEK MINI FILM FESTIVAL MONDAY 7 JULY IN THE MAGNIFICAT ROOM

The script was written 18 years ago by Warwick Thornton, an Aboriginal film-maker who based it on his own reaction as a child being sent to a Catholic boarding school in WA and never having been inside a church before. Today he describes it as a funny, open-hearted film about isolation, survival, community and the human search for meaning. The showing starts at 7.00 p.m. Prior to that at 5.00 p.m. we have a film for all the family called Emu Runner that is warm, wise and really takes you into the heart of life in Brewarrina which is where our sister-parish is. Between the two movies we will share a light meal and glass of wine. Do come along 5.00 p.m and 7.00 p.m. Monday evening. Magnificat Room, Our Lady of Dolours.

It is wonderful to be able to tell you that thanks to incredible generosity of heart, time and support from so many in the parish, we have achieved the target needed to sponsor our refugee family in a house in Chatswood. Including all ticket sales, raffle sales, silent auction and live auction sales plus donations, we have raised a total of \$17,839.32.

This money will be used to prepare the house for the family, to provide them with living expenses until they are able to receive government support payments and to meet their urgent medical and dental costs. The Department of Home Affairs has been notified that we are able to welcome the family from early August but we do not know when they will actually be able to travel as this depends on intermediary organisations including those in Trinidad-Tobago where they have taken refuge.

The next step for us is to make contact with the family which we hope to do by email or What's App shortly. What great news we have to share with them thanks to all you marvellous people who have contributed the money we needed. THANK YOU!

But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, that on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.'

The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said, 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

MISSIONARIES OF CHRIST

If I ever travel overseas and don't know anyone at the place to which I am going, I search the internet for accommodation. There are many apps to assist. Experiencing a welcome and a sense of hospitality when I finally arrive is such a gift.

Luke's Gospel addressees are missionaries. They are moving around the Greco-Roman world, probably around Asia Minor (today's Turkey), committed to preaching about Jesus. They would be relying on local hospitality. Today's Gospel plugs right into this situation and Jesus offers Luke's missionaries wisdom: Go with a colleague, don't be alone, there will be times when they will experience hardship even rejection and feel like 'lambs among wolves', travel lightly as their mission for the Kingdom is urgent, offer peace to households that are hospitable, receive what is offered from them, and stay present to those who are open, don't become itinerant, moving 'from house to house' and offer God's gift of healing.

While Jesus speaks this wisdom to Luke's missionary audience of the late first century CE, it applies equally to us in our faith communities and parishes today seeking to discern our futures with a synodal spirit. Today's Gospel invites us to be concerned about those around us. We, too, are called to announce: 'The kingdom of God is very near to you'!
