Dear friends,

I am very happy to share with you the appointment of **Mrs Duyen Au as our new Parish Engagement Officer**, effective Monday 16 June 2025. Duyen and her husband Bergil and their family would be well known to many of us for they are already active members of our parish community. Duyen brings with her much experience as an insurance claims manager, café owner and operator, and events manager. She is passionate about meeting and welcoming new people and connecting them. We look forward to having Duyen supporting the many events and activities that are in front of us. The primary purpose of the Parish Engagement Officer is to drive a culture of welcome within our parish, helping to create a sense of belonging for all and fostering a vibrant and inclusive parish community, where everyone feels accepted, valued and known. With both Kristha and Duyen with us, along with Diana, we will also now have three full time staff. This enables us to build our parish team more intently as we move forward. Please join with me in welcoming Duyen to our team!

As Catholic Schools Broken Bay reflects on its Towards 2025 Strategy and the opportunities that lay ahead, it has become clear it needs to establish new senior roles to assist its leaders in the delivery of key system wide initiatives and improvements to teaching and learning. It has been announced that Brenda Timp, Principal at Mercy College, has been appointed as a Senior Executive: Strategic Delivery, with a particular focus on new initiatives in the North Shore. In this new Senior Executive role, Brenda will continue to serve as a member of the CSBB System Leadership team working closely with its Director, Workstream Leads and CSBB Principals on the delivery of key system initiatives that add value to the educational provision of CSBB and give life to the Vision and Purpose of CSBB within the community of the Church of Broken Bay. Brenda will ensure plans respond to feedback from the community about strengthening the CSBB Catholic educational pathway from Baptism to Post-School across the North Shore. While the work will be part time for the balance of Term 2 as we finalise the Post Towards 2025 Plans, it has been agreed that a full-time commitment is required from the beginning of Term 3 until the end of Term 2 in 2026. During the time Brenda is undertaking this new role, Mellissa Murray has been appointed into the Acting Principal role at Mercy College until the end of Term 2 next year. Mellissa is an experienced Assistant Principal: Evangelisation & Catechesis within Mercy College who will step up and continue to lead the Mercy College School community during this time. Please join me in congratulating Brenda and Mellissa on these new temporary appointments in System Leadership at CSBB.

As it may be recalled, Bishop Anthony had given our parish permission to extend the presbytery on 100 Archer Street. The concept and design of the extension had been circulated through the parish during 2024. Regrettably, though there had been extensive consultation with Willoughby Council personnel during 2024 such as to submit the Development Application with confidence, the outcome has been a **recent notification by Council of a rejection of the proposal,** primarily given apparent heritage constraints of the corner block occupied by the residence. This is very disappointing given the extent of collaboration engaged with the Council in the preliminary stages of design. However, we now need to consider our options. These range from various appeals, through to a redesign of the extension, through to more lateral possibilities. Our Parish Finance Committee is now working with our diocesan property personnel and with our project manager, Project Strategies Australia about what our most constructive options might be. Once these have been determined, we will certainly share with the parish community. In the meantime, disappointedly, it is unlikely that there will be any movement on construction in the coming year.

Please keep our clergy in your prayer through this coming week when we will all be at our annual diocesan conference. This is always an important time of formation and fraternity along with Bishop Anthony. We will need to have an adjusted Mass schedule for the days during the week as outlined on the previous page. We are very grateful to Fr Matt Bloomer and Fr John Watson from the Opus Dei Prelature and to Fr Andrew Murray, a Marist priest, who will enable us to have Mass at least once each day Tuesday to Thursday.

Be sure not to forget our farewell of Deacon Kevin with a Mass at 6.30pm and Supper on Wednesday 18 June.

Lastly do keep Tuesday 1 July at 7.00pm free to meet the engineers who are assisting us with the future upgrade to our church's possibilities.

The following is the step-by-step guideline for the Broken Bay Pilgrim Passports

1. Jubilee Passports can be stamped at each Shrine and the Cathedral to acknowledge visit and time of prayer within. A special downloadable <u>Broken Bay Jubilee Passport for Kids</u> for children to use when visiting the Shrines with their families/caregivers.

2. Once all three Shrines and Cathedral, with respective stamps, have been visited a Pilgrim's passport is "complete".

3. Pilgrims then have their passports verified at their own Parish office.

4. Each Parish will notify Mission Broken Bay with the names of those pilgrims who have completed their passports so that they may receive a special commemorative certificate signed by Bishop Anthony. This is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the Jubilee by presenting these certificates at the end of a Sunday Mass.







"When Did the Church Divorce Itself from Aesthetics?" A Reflection on Beauty, Tradition, and the Role of Architecture in the Life of the Church Presentation to our Parish during "Meet the Architects" on Thursday 29 June 2025 **Harington Hall**

The question I want to explore is a bold one: "When did the Church divorce itself from aesthetics?" It's a question that implies rupture—between the sacred and the beautiful, between our buildings and our beliefs. But behind that question lies a deeper longing: a longing for beauty in our churches—not as decoration, but as testimony. Because in the Christian tradition, beauty is not optional. It is the language of transcendence.

Part 1: Beauty as a Source of Truth

In Catholic theology, beauty is not merely cosmetic. It is a bearer of truth.

Misinterpretation of "Beauty is in the eye of the beholder". Not subjective - but God has given us the ability to abstract beauty.

St. Thomas Aquinas said that beauty flows from three things: clarity, proportion, and integrity. But beauty is not just a technical matter—it's a theological reality. Beauty reveals something of God Himself.

This is why a beautiful church can move a person to tears, even if they don't yet believe. It touches something deeper than words.

And this is why Fyodor Dostoevsky, the great Russian novelist, could write: "Beauty will save the world." That wasn't just a romantic sentiment. He meant that in beauty, we encounter the eternal. The transcendent. A whisper of heaven.

And if we lose that beauty—especially in our sacred architecture—we risk losing one of the Church's most powerful ways of evangelizing.

Part 2: Tradition Is a Living Thing

Now, let me be clear: when I speak of "aesthetics," I'm not calling for nostalgia. Tradition is not repetition.

Tradition is a living stream. It's something we receive and renew—not just preserve. The best sacred architecture doesn't copy the past—it converses with it.

Think of Antoni Gaudí, architect of the Sagrada Família. His work is deeply traditional—drawing on Gothic forms, Scripture, nature—and yet also radically original.

Gaudí once said, "Originality consists in returning to the origin." He believed that beauty is not a luxury—it is evangelization.

Every curve, every vault, every ray of light in his churches points to Christ. That's what sacred architecture must do: make the invisible visible.

That is the power of beauty.

Part 3: A Crisis of Aesthetic Imagination

But in recent decades, something changed.

Many newly built churches lack the richness that once defined sacred spaces.

There was a time when the Church led the world in architecture—Gothic cathedrals, Renaissance basilicas, even radical 20th-century chapels. Today, many new church buildings look indistinguishable from secular spaces: multipurpose halls, generic façades, stripped interiors.

This is not a rejection of modernism or new materials. It is a call for intentionality.

Too often, what we see is not modern sacred architecture, but simply minimalist construction.

The danger is not only aesthetic—it's theological. When we build without beauty, we forget the incarnational nature of our faith.

God took on flesh. Christ touched the material world. How can our architecture do less?

Part 4: Reclaiming the Sacred Through Beauty

The Church must reclaim its vocation as a patron of beauty. A church is not just a gathering space. It is a portal. A threshold between heaven and earth.

A beautiful church doesn't distract from the liturgy—it draws people deeper into it. It awakens reverence. It teaches without words.

It invites the soul to rest in **mystery.**

As architects, designers, pastors, and faithful, we must ask:

Are we building for convenience—or for encounter? Are we creating spaces that point to the divine?

If we want to renew the Church's voice in the world, we must also renew its visual witness. Because as Dostoevsky wrote: "Beauty will save the world." It might just save our churches, too.

Closing

So: when did the Church divorce itself from aesthetics? Maybe it didn't happen all at once. Just a separation.

Maybe it was a quiet drifting away—a preference for function over form, utility over transcendence. But the good news is: this relationship can be restored.

We can build again—not just with brick and mortar, but with vision. Keeping in mind the future generations. We can create churches that lift the heart, educate the eye, and reflect the glory of God.

Because beauty is not about luxury. It's about truth. And the Church should be the one place in the world where beauty is never an afterthought—but always an act of worship.




Planned Giving Envelopes July 2025 - June 2026

For many years it has been an aspiration of our parish community to have an external grotto to Our Lady. We are committed to realizing this aspiration as a project of the Year of Jubilee of Hope, even though its completion would not occur until 2026.

In our parish Jubilee publication we presented one concept for this from a Canadian sculptor with whom we had been working. . However, the challenges with commissioning a work from overseas are considerable. We have, therefore, sought the contribution of a local sculptor and have been introduced to the work of the Australian Linda Karfeld (https://klarfeld.com). Linda has done remarkable work throughout Australia.

Linda has now presented a concept for us. The idea is that this would sit before the silver cross on the forecourt in front of the parish office, embraced by the blue tiled wall currently in place. It is envisaged that the sculptor would be in granite.

Linda writes, 'In this piece, the Virgin Mary cradles the lifeless body of Jesus on her lap, a poignant depiction of maternal grief. Yet, her posture tells a more complex story: one arm is raised toward the heavens. This gesture embodies both sorrow and a transcendent hope, suggesting a surrender to divine will and an enduring faith amidst profound loss. By blending classical iconography with modern form, this design aims to resonate with contemporary audiences, offering a visual narrative that speaks to the timeless human experience of grief tempered by hope. In researching Our Lady of Dolours and trying to understand the depth of the Virgin Mary's sorrow and her capacity to offer solace, I was profoundly moved by a conversation with a friend who has tragically lost his child to violence. His expression of grief illuminated the universal pain of loss and the yearning for comfort. Through this sculpture, I want to convey that profound sorrow while also conveying a sense of hope and resilience. It is my hope that this piece serves as a source of comfort and reflection for those who are navigating the difficult journey of grief, much like my friend."

This would come with some expense, and it will require in the end approval by Bishop Anthony. However, might we have any reaction to the concept of design which Linda has put forward for our consideration?

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'PEACE BE WITH YOU'

We live in a world of fear. It surrounds us: the political aggression evident globally, the social issues that depress, even personal challenges that come from relationships and life choices. The fear of tumultuous unrest or personal failure dominates our hearts at times.

Today's Gospel offers us a calming voice. Pentecost is a celebration of God's Spirit present, efficacious and penetratingeven into those areas of life and our world that seem so strained, tense and violent. Jesus comes into a room of fearful disciples. They are afraid of the religious authorities—what they did to Jesus could also happen to them. Into their midst the Risen Jesus comes. He stands among them, not away from them, or outside them. But in the midst of their fears. Twice he offers them the word that they need to hear, 'Peace be with you.' It's a word that we need to hear personally, and that the world needs to know.

'Peace' comes from the gift of Jesus' own spirit. His reassurance of his presence, the evidence of his suffering before them in his wounds, and his gift of peace is a strong affirmation. 'Peace', 'shalom' in Hebrew, is a prayer for wholeness in the midst of fear and suffering. It is the gift that Jesus wants for us, and for the world. The Gospel ends with the invitation to mission, to spread this peace that brings wholeness and forgiveness of sin.





Vinnes April Report

OLOS's Vinnies received 8 calls for help in April of which 2 were new. We were grateful that the numbers were down (20 in March) and problems fairly straightforward. Five needed food assistance, one had washing machine problems, one had need of white-goods to move into new public housing whilst another is struggling with DV and living in unaffordable digs (Catholic Care is also helping this lady). Over \$1000 was expended on assistance.

Please note that our Winter Appeal will be on 19/20 July. We rely on Appeals and Poor Box donations to maintain our ability to help. While we used to be self supporting , in recent years with increasing calls for help OLOS Vinnies as been supposed by Vinnies elsewhere. Our latest budget indicates \$15000 income against \$32000 expenditure. We hope for your continuing support in the Appeal. JOIN THE FIGHT TO PROTECT LIFE!

"....That night, atrocities were being committed by civilised Germans all over Leipzig, all over the country. Nearly every Jewish home and business in my city was vandalised, burned or otherwise destroyed, as were our synagogues. As were our people . . .; When I think of those Germans relishing our pain, I want to ask them, 'Have you got a soul? Have you got a heart?' It was madness, in the true sense of the word – otherwise civilised people lost all ability to tell right from wrong. They committed terrible atrocities, and worse, they enjoyed it. They thought they were doing the right thing. And even those who could not fool themselves that we Jews were the enemy did nothing to stop the mob. If enough people had stood up then, on Kristallnacht, and said, 'Enough! What are you doing? What is wrong with you?' then the course of history would have been different. But they did not. They were scared. They were weak".






