ENTERING INTO THE LITURGICAL SEASON OF ORDINARY TIME AFTER THE SEASON OF CHRISTMAS A Reflection by Fr David

As the Sundays of Ordinary Time now follow the Christmas Season we are immersed into the story of Jesus. The Spirit reminds us of his story and makes the story present now. We cannot tire of hearing this story and of discovering its depths in new ways according to the changing circumstances of our lives.

Each Sunday we hear part of that story, we reflect on it, we wonder with it and discover ourselves in it. We are delighted, disturbed, challenged and consoled. We become moulded by the story, by the memory. Jesus' story becomes our story. Every occasion we gather for the Liturgy of the Word we enter into the power of story and memory. We are a people of memory, a people who savour and cultivate the memory of the story of Jesus of Nazareth, who remember his journey from death into life, and in that memory, out of that memory, called also to be the people who seek new possibilities for ourselves and our societies. It is one of the principal roles of the Holy Spirit to so 'remind' us. "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you." (Jn 14:26)

In our faithfulness to the story of Jesus, in the Spirit, we become both the storyteller and the story itself: the ones' who keep the memory alive and at the same time the very story of God's continuing action in our time and in our place. We are both the guardians of a sacred memory and those who create new memories, new accounts of the Spirit's work in Jesus. So significant is human memory that we have dared to affirm that it is one of the means in and through which God's revelation takes place. Not only is the mystery of God revealed in the word of Scripture but in the people's memory of that word. Tradition too is a source of God's revelation. This vital pillar of the Catholic imagination derives from the Judaic understanding of memory's power of divine revelation. For the God of the Hebrews was not a divinity attained through the horizon of speculation but the God who had acted in history. Israel knows its God through its memory. As Louis Dupre has remarked, "to the faithful Jew no act has deeper significance than the remembrance of the origins. The memory of history is a religious duty . . . Yet more than being a sacred obligation, the remembrance of Israel's past provides the Jew with a pattern for understanding and accepting the present. . ."

When the Vikings of old raided the Saxon villages the very first people that they would seek out to assassinate would be the village storytellers. They knew only too well that to take out the story tellers was to remove the story of the people. Rupturing the people's link with the stories which animated their common and personal life was to deliver a mortal blow to the memory of the village. To sever memory was to create disorientation, to render the village into a profound sense of hopelessness. When there was no memory, neither could there be a future.

In many ways, we have forgotten the need of people to gather together and listen to a story. George Miller, the famous film producer, suggests that this need is now largely met by the cinema. Certainly, the continuing popularity of the cinema and films illustrates our need for stories, the need we have to pitch our own personal story against a larger drama, to have the threads of resolution played out for us in our own personal quests for power, for love, for redemption. This resolution is definitively given us every time we listen to the story of Jesus and his own quest for truth and for love, for a life stronger than death.

Tolkein, a great storyteller, has Sam say at one stage, "... the brave things in the old tales and song, Mr. Frodo: adventures as I used to call them. I used to think that they were things the wonderful folk of the stories went out and looked for, because they wanted them, because they were exciting and life was a bit dull, a kind of sport, as you might say. But that's not they way of it with the tales that really mattered, or the ones that stay in the mind. Folk seem to have been just landed in them usually their paths were laid that way, as you put it. But I expect they had lost of chances, like us, of turning back, only they didn't. And if they had, we shouldn't know, because they'd been forgotten. We hear about those as just went on ... I wonder what sort of tale we've fallen into?"




A round and A bout

On May 12-14th 2022, JISA is offering a very special conference to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the conversion of St Ignatius Loyola. This three day conference will be an Ignatian 'murmuration'.


A 'murmuration' is a flock of birds that take flight together and, as one, change direction in swirling patterns and shifting shapes. When a murmuration turns in unison, scientists believe it's like a phase transition. One bird knows to turn when its neighbour turns since they're close together and can see each other. With each bird responding to its neighbour in three dimensions, the whole flock turns with the principles of attraction, safety and leadership.

Our Ignatian murmuration will be similar to this. We will soar and turn within the pattern of St Ignatius' conversion, creating beautiful forms where our life stories mirror his, and we will likely morph in unexpected directions together.

Deeper yet, when we share our need for healing on the front lines of our lives and community, we swoop with the Spirit into new life. Our Ignatian murmuration aims for a spiritual phase transition in our christian living and service – in other words, for conversion.

Join us in this dynamic flight of reflective patterns and spiritual consciousness over three joyful and transforming days.
