A Christmas Letter to our Parish Fr David Ranson PP

There is a magic in every beginning, wrote the German philosopher Herman Hesse. How true this is when we experience the birth of our children, when we hold a newborn baby in our arms, when we delight in the pure wonder and sense of play evidence in young children, as we observe our children growing so quickly. When we gaze upon a child we are caught intensely between an immediate experience of the present and a heightened expectation of the future, between a "fulfilled moment and the beginning of a new day." (Quotes are taken from Jurgen Motlmann, *In the End, the Beginning—The Life of hope*). In every child God waits for us to stir again within us the sense of new beginnings, of fresh possibilities, of awakening hopes.

At Christmas, we dare to proclaim that God has become a child. We celebrate that God has not only emptied himself of divinity to become one of us so to share our humanity, but that God has become a child. Childhood remains in God eternally. For God is an eternal beginning, an infinite possibility, an unquenchable awakening, pure presence. And if this be so, then, as we gaze upon the Divine Child at Bethlehem, we can celebrate how we are always at a new beginning. Indeed, many centuries ago, the Church Father, Irenaeus wrote that the Christian life is a beginning, moving through beginnings, to a beginning.

All of this makes Christian life both exciting and alive! It is exciting and alive even during the inevitable difficulties that we experience, even during all that, at times, threatens to overwhelm us, even in the midst of the darkness through which we journey on occasions. It is exciting and alive because as Christians who proclaim that Jesus cannot be found in a tomb, we are those who live a life in constant watchfulness and expectation. In the apparent absence of Christ from our midst, we live our life in watchfulness. Our watchfulness leads us, as the writer Moltmann suggests, to "expect the presence of God in everybody I meet and everything I do." This means we live with constancy the questions, "What does God have in mind for me? What does God expect of me? What is he saying to me through the things that are happening in my world, and what is my response?"

Therefore, as Moltmann writes, we are those who can no longer "pray with closed eyes, but [now rather], messianically, with eyes wide open for God's future in the world. Christian faith is not blind trust. It is the wakeful expectation of God which draws us in all our senses." He goes on to illustrate that this was how the first Christians prayed,

standing, looking up, with arms outstretched, and eyes wide open, ready to walk or to leap forward. We can see this from the pictures in the catacombs in Rome. Their posture reflects tense expectation, not quiet heart searching. It says . . . We are on the watch, in expectation of the One who is coming . . .

This, too, then should be the way in which we, ourselves, live because of our acclamation that God has become one with us as a child, that Christ lives. We are those who are to keep stretching out into new horizons, "stretching out to what is ahead, [always with] a readiness for a fresh start."

We are the people of Christmas faith. The future is given us as pure gift. However, the future is also given to us a relentless invitation. It seems to me that this is especially true for us as a community of faith here in Chatswood. We are emerging from COVID precisely at the same time as we enter our second century of Catholic life in our neighbourhood. Yet, how the neighbourhood has changed over those decades! It is fascinating to see the photos of our suburb when our Parish was established 111 years ago on 8 December 1910. We now find ourselves in the middle of a busy residential and commercial urban hub. Our community has been enriched to become such a diverse multicultural family. Our educational precinct has developed to draw in some 2000 students every day from wide and far. The future is given to us as the most remarkable opportunity!

At Pentecost last May, I wrote my first letter to you sharing some of my initial observations after arriving in your midst in January of this year. I concluded by saying, "I invite you to dream with me about all manner of creative and constructive possibilities. For this, we will go on a journey together over the time ahead." Though we were slightly interrupted by an extended pandemic lockdown, in the celebration of Christmas, with its acclamation of new beginnings, I put the invitation before us again.

What does it mean to be Church in the City? What are our unique location and assets inviting us to think of ourselves as a community of Catholic Faith entering our second century? Where would we like to see our community in the next 10 years, 50 years? What are our hopes for Our Lady of Dolours Chatswood? How do we enable the life of Christ to be birthed more deeply in our own time and in our own place? At this new beginning, let us walk together in discernment and alive to possibility! As the prophet Isaiah writes, "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19)

When the work of the new year starts in February 2022, our Parish Pastoral and Missionary Council would like to outline a journey to extend to Pentecost 2023. It is a journey inviting us to come together in different ways over the course of the following 18 months to reflect on our mission and its future. We will encourage everyone to share their dreams, to imagine anew, to breathe in the fresh possibility with which the Divine Child gifts us.

My friends, having celebrated our first centenary, having journeyed through the challenges of the past year, we are at a new threshold. The future comes to us as gift. However, the gift is wrapped up in the remarkable people who know Our Lady of Dolours as their spiritual home. And what a most astounding gift it is. I express my deep admiration for you all, and for the extraordinary generosity of time and expertise that so many have given over this last year. I find it both humbling and inspiring. There are too many to thank by name. However, I want you to know that I treasure each of you in my heart and in my prayer. My gift in return is to hold each of you with your myriad contribution before the Lord and his Mother, Our Lady of Sorrows, with a heart brimming over with gratitude for you.

Let us begin a sustained conversation through which the stepping-stones into our future will become known. Let us take a step at a time, but also with commitment and purpose. Let us celebrate all that makes us a unique community of faith in all its diverse features, and now let us lay the foundations for the second 100 years of our life. And throughout, may the life of Christ the Lord be birthed anew not only for us, but for all those who encounter Our Lady of Dolours Chatswood.

This time last year I wrote to you saying "It is hard to believe that we have reached the end of another year, especially a year like this one." And here we are after experiencing a year worse than 2020.

Last year my wife and I coped with the lockdown reasonably well but the 4 months we were locked down this year was much harder. We were drained, we didn't know what to do and if we did we didn't want to do it. We missed not being able to see our families. But were not alone. I know many of you experienced the same sort of feelings. At the start of the lockdown, I had people say to me "They (the government) are trying to shut down our church. I usually replied "They may have closed the building but the church is alive and well and growing." Chatswood Parish showed this to be a true statement as you (the parishioner) rose to the occasion.

Fr David placed messages and his homilies on You Tube for you to listen to. We had some Masses, especially our Parish Feast Day Mass, recorded and also on You Tube. We had Zoom meetings for things like Finance Committee and Pastoral & Missionary Council. We had many Zoom meetings of prayer groups meeting and in some cases daily. These actually caused people to become aware of other parishioner's names and this created a sense of community

The parish was alive not dead, or closed. We experienced the joy of the Ordination of Fr Aldrin and his Thanksgiving Mass. We also experienced sadness when he was transferred to the Lakes Parish but joy when we welcomed Fr Marek. As we come to the end of the year the restrictions are being removed.

Our State and Country has experienced a great uptake of people receiving 2 doses of the Covid vaccine so there is hope that 2022 may be better than 2021, though we are now dealing with a new strain of the disease.

It is my wish, and prayer, that the Lord will bless each and every one of you at this time when we remember, and celebrate, the great mystery of God becoming man to live amongst us. May all have a very Happy and Blessed Christmas and if you are going away please come back safely.

A Reflection on the Christmas Crib by Pope Francis

The enchanting image of the Christmas crèche, so dear to the Christian people, never ceases to arouse amazement and wonder. The depiction of Jesus' birth is itself a simple and joyful proclamation of the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son of God. The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of sacred Scripture. As we contemplate the Christmas story, we are invited to set out on a spiritual journey, drawn by the humility of the God who became man in order to encounter every man and woman. We come to realize that so great is his love for us that he became one of us, so that we in turn might become one with him.

... Why does the Christmas crèche arouse such wonder and move us so deeply? First, because it shows God's tender love: the Creator of the universe lowered himself to take up our littleness. The gift of life, in all its mystery, becomes all the more wondrous as we realize that the Son of Mary is the source and sustenance of all life. In Jesus, the Father has given us a brother who comes to seek us out whenever we are confused or lost, a loyal friend ever at our side. He gave us his Son who forgives us and frees us from our sins.

Setting up the Christmas crèche in our homes helps us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem. Naturally, the Gospels remain our source for understanding and reflecting on that event. At the same time, its portrayal in the crèche helps us to imagine the scene. It touches our hearts and makes us enter into salvation history as contemporaries of an event that is living and real in a broad gamut of historical and cultural contexts.

In a particular way, from the time of its Franciscan origins, the nativity scene has invited us to "feel" and "touch" the poverty that God's Son took upon himself in the Incarnation. Implicitly, it summons us to follow him along the path of humility, poverty and self-denial that leads from the manger of Bethlehem to the cross. It asks us to meet him and serve him by showing mercy to those of our brothers and sisters in greatest need (cf. *Mt* 25:31-46).

. . . When, at Christmas, we place the statue of the Infant Jesus in the manger, the nativity scene suddenly comes alive. God appears as a child, for us to take into our arms. Beneath weakness and frailty, he conceals his power that creates and transforms all things. It seems impossible, yet it is true: in Jesus, God was a child, and in this way he wished to reveal the greatness of his love: by smiling and opening his arms to all. The birth of a child awakens joy and wonder; it sets before us the great mystery of life. Seeing the bright eyes of a young couple gazing at their newborn child, we can understand the feelings of Mary and Joseph who, as they looked at the Infant Jesus, sensed God's presence in their lives." Life was made manifest" (1 Jn 1:2). In these words, the Apostle John sums up the mystery of the Incarnation. The crèche allows us to see and touch this unique and unparalleled event that changed the course of history, so that time would thereafter be reckoned either before or after the birth of Christ.

God's ways are astonishing, for it seems impossible that he should forsake his glory to become a man like us. To our astonishment, we see God acting exactly as we do: he sleeps, takes milk from his mother, cries and plays like every other child! As always, God baffles us. He is unpredictable, constantly doing what we least expect. The nativity scene shows God as he came into our world, but it also makes us reflect on how our life is part of God's own life. It invites us to become his disciples if we want to attain ultimate meaning in life. (From *Admirabile Signum*, On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, 1 Dec 2019)
