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

This Sunday's Gospel - Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Dear friends,



This weekend and next we celebrate the very special event of the Reception of Holy Communion for the first time for nearly 90 of our children. We welcome them and their families to our Vigil Mass, 9.00am and 10.30am Mass this weekend, and our Vigil and 10.30am next weekend. We do so on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ by which we celebrate the mystery of the Eucharist in and by which the Risen Christ gives us his very life. This is a great milestone in our children's journey of faith, bringing to completion their initiation into our Catholic Church, occasioned by their Baptism, Confirmation and now by their reception of Eucharist. It is also a special occasion of great joy for us as a community of Catholic faith! We give thanks for our children who have long prepared for this moment, and share in their joy.

A very special thank you to their families who have supported them along the way and particularly to our Children's Ministry team, Angela Hague and Mona Souama who have facilitated the programs of preparation.

Over the month of June, we stage our final Broken Bay Pastoral Works Fund appeal for this financial year. This is the fund that supports the marvellous work of our parish catechists who every week visit the five public schools in our parish and the 700 Catholic children there. Our parish is committed, this year, to achieve \$64,730 for this fund. We are almost there! We have to date raised \$51,352.18, and so are just \$13 377.82 short of our target! Please help us to achieve our obligations. All contributions above \$2.00 to the Fund are tax-deductible. Donations can be made through the envelopes or through the Parish Office.



Through this last week we learnt that our recent application for funding from the NSW Safer Community Grant Scheme was successful! We will be in receipt of \$21,000 to be used for improvement to the security of our church, parish office and environs. This is a great bonus to us! A very special thank you to Olivia Lee, our Parish Operations Manager and our parish team for their work preparing and submitting our application.

Two very special occasions ahead of us are the feast day of St Anthony of Padua on 13 June and our Feast for Freedom on Saturday 22 June. To celebrate St Anthony of Padua we are going to have a bilingual Mass at 10.30am on Sunday 16 June. This Mass will be celebrated in both English and Italian. It will be a special celebration of the Italian heritage in our community. Do spread the word and invite those with Italian background, especially, to join our Mass and the celebration on the Forecourt afterwards. On Saturday 22 June, following the Vigil Mass our Community Action parish group will sponsor a wonderful meal in Harrington Hall to raise awareness of the plight of asylum seekers in general, but to support a family in particular needing assistance to settle in Australia. Details will all be in our bulletin, and all are welcome.

We continue to support our annual food drive for Jesuit Refugee Services. Non-perishable foodstuffs and toiletries may be left on the table in our church foyer over these weeks. This is a very effective way of supporting those who are in such desperate circumstances, given that those in our country as refugees are not eligible for social services and are not allowed to work.

Just a note that in the week of 10-14 June all of our clergy will be at our annual clergy conference on the Central Coast. During that week there will be but one Mass celebrated each day – at 12.30pm, courtesy of Fr Matt Bloomer and Fr Joe Martin to whom we are very grateful. There will be no daily 9am Mass or Wednesday 6pm Mass that week.

However, do keep in mind that we are now routinely celebrating our Wednesday 6pm Mass with a special focus for all those suffering anxiety, depression and loneliness and their carers. All of us know those who struggle in this way. It is a powerful way of coming together and as a community entrusting them to the care of Our Lady of Sorrows (Dolours). Often enough we do not know how to assist someone with anxiety or in depression. However, we can, at least, pray for them trusting that the Risen Christ can whisper peace deep within their hearts. Following our Wednesday Mass we now also offer the Sacrament of Anointing. We are exploring other ways, too, by which we can be a community which offers peace to those struggling.



GOSPEL REFLECTION



Have you ever had the experience of recalling a past event, or a person whom you once knew, and having that memory be so vivid that it's as if you were reliving the event, or encountering that person all over again?

This is how powerful our capacity for memory can be, and it gives us a glimpse into what can happen whenever we celebrate the Eucharist.

Since the beginning of creation, God has longed for us to come to him and be fed by him. At the Last Supper, this longing of God's finally became a reality.

At every Mass, Jesus is present to us in a powerful way, inviting us to be transformed as we eat and drink of him.

St John told us that Jesus promised that anyone who eats his flesh and drinks his blood abides in him, just as he abides in them. But this "abiding" isn't automatic. It comes as we remember at Mass, bringing to the forefront of our minds who Jesus is and all he did for us on the cross. But to remember in this way is not just an activity of the mind it is an act of the will and of the heart.

the mind, it is an act of the will and of the heart.

So what are we to remember? First and foremost, we are to recall the great love Jesus has for us. It's a personal love, a love in which he sees all our strengths and weaknesses—all our goodness and failures—and treasures us as his very own. We remember that this is the same Jesus who was with the Father from the beginning, the exact representation of the Father's being who sustains all things by his word.

We remember that he was sent by the Father to rescue us and to bring us the precious gift of salvation.

We remember that in his death he has destroyed the power of sin forever.

We also remember that in Christ, there is no condemnation, because through him we have been set free from the law of sin and death.

And we remember that as we eat of his body and drink his blood, we are healed, transformed, strengthened, comforted, and united with the entire body of Christ, throughout the world—and even in heaven itself.

The Eucharist deepens our relationship with Jesus.

At the Last Supper, Jesus said, "I have called you friends" and "No one has greater love than . . . to lay down one's life for one's friends". Every time we receive the Eucharist, Jesus reminds us that he gave up his life for us because he loves us. The Eucharist helps us to see him more clearly. Isn't that what happened when Jesus broke bread with the two disciples on the road to Emmaus? Or when he multiplied the loaves of bread for the people?

Every time we receive the Eucharist, we grow a little bit closer to the Lord. The Eucharist not only opens our eyes to Jesus, it opens our eyes to one another. Jesus told us that when we give to the hungry, the thirsty, the homeless, and anyone else in need, we are doing it to him. We are meeting him in the poor, just as we meet him in the Eucharist. Truly, our God has given us a precious gift in his own body and blood!

As you come to receive Jesus this week, try to be like St. Peter. He had doubts and so do we sometimes. We may even have some areas of resistance to Jesus. But in the final analysis, we can all echo Peter's proclamation of faith and surrender: "Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God".

Trust that when you eat the Bread of Life, Jesus will fulfill his promise and raise you up on the last day.

With your whole heart, treasure this spiritual food from heaven every time you receive it. Make sure that you are right with the Lord and promise yourself that you will be completely open to whatever Jesus wants to say to you and whatever he wants to do in your heart. Come to Jesus with a pure and humble heart, and you will find yourself lifted up to God's presence and be transformed.

So as we celebrate the feast of Corpus Christi today, take a moment to reflect on all the blessings Jesus gives you every time you eat his Body and drink his Blood.



FEAST DAY 5 JUNE

St. Boniface, known as the Apostle of the Germans, for his missionary work in Germany during the early 8th century.

Boniface is often depicted with an axe, because according to tradition, he felled the sacred oak tree of Thor (also known as Donar's Oak) at Geismar. This tree was a significant symbol of the pagan religion among the Germanic tribes. By cutting down the oak, Boniface aimed to demonstrate the powerlessness of the pagan gods and the supremacy of the Christian God.

The act was not just a bold confrontation with paganism but a profound act of faith. The felling of the tree reportedly led to many conversions as the people saw that Boniface was not struck down by Thor's wrath, as they had expected. Instead, the event became a powerful testimony to the might of the Christian God and Boniface's unshakeable faith.

The axe, therefore, symbolizes his courage, his willingness to challenge deeply ingrained beliefs, and his role in transforming the spiritual landscape of Germany.

OUR SUNDAY CELEBRATION

THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST / B

2 June 2024

THIS IS MY BODY. During the Passover meal the Jewish people remember God's saving deeds in the past. In this act of remembering, God's saving power is experienced in the present. Through the ritual meal of the last supper Jesus points to a future event, his crucifixion, in which his body will be broken and his blood shed to inaugurate a new covenant between God and humankind. In the Eucharist we remember Christ's saving action and participate in its fruits.

P. You are seated at the right hand of the Father to intercede for us: Lord have mercy.

Ex 24: 3-8

A reading from the book of Exodus

This is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you.

Moses went and told the people all the commands of the Lord and all the ordinances. In answer, all the people said with one voice, We will observe all the commands that the Lord has decreed.' Moses put all the commands of the Lord into writing, and early next morning he built an altar at the foot of the mountain, with twelve standingstones for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he directed certain young Israelites to offer holocausts and to immolate bullocks to the Lord as communion sacrifices. Half of the blood Moses took up and put into basins, the other half he cast on the altar. And taking the Book of the Covenant he read it to the listening people, and they said, 'We will observe all that the Lord has decreed; we will obey.' Then Moses took the blood and cast it towards the people. 'This' he said 'is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you, containing all these rules.'


SECOND READING

Heb 9: 11-1

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

The blood of Christ will purify our inner selves.

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than one made by men's



hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives; how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God.

He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, "The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there.' The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.

And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.' After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him, says the Lord.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE NEW COVENANT

Our readings of this feast of the Body and Blood of Christ deepen our understanding of the death of Jesus as inaugurating the new covenant he makes with God and all God's people.

In the first reading Moses shares with the people all the words of God he had heard in his encounter with God on the mountain. The people answer with one voice that they will observe all that the Lord has decreed. Moses seals this covenant ritually with burnt offerings, the sacrifice of oxen, and the sprinkling of the blood of the sacrificed animals on the altar and the people.

The Hebrews' reading illuminates the difference Christ makes with the sacrifice of his own self and blood: he is the 'mediator of a new covenant'.

Mark's Gospel presents two scenes. The first occurs 'on the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover Lamb is sacrificed'. Jesus, portrayed as an observant Jew with his disciples, makes preparations for Passover. The second drops us among those gathered for that Passover meal, 'while they were eating...' Here we are invited to see Jesus take the bread, bless it and break it, saying 'Take, this is my body.' Then we see Jesus take the cup, give thanks and give it to them. They all drank from it. Jesus' words tell us that 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many'. The closing words, hymn and movement to the Mount of Olives signifies the beginning of the reality of his sacrifice and new covenant.

May these powerful images loom large in our Eucharist today, in our hearts, souls and lives.

ABOUT SAINT CHARLES LWANGA **AND COMPANIONS**





In the late 1800s, Christianity was spreading in Uganda, but it faced fierce opposition from local leaders who saw it as a threat to their authority and traditional beliefs. King Mwanga II of Buganda, in particular, perceived the new faith as a challenge to his power.

Charles Lwanga, a young catechist and leader among the Christian converts, found himself at the heart of this conflict. Charles, along with his companions, were part of the king's court.

As Christianity grew among the servants, King Mwanga's anger intensified, especially towards those who refused to renounce their faith.

Despite knowing the imminent danger, Charles Lwanga continued to catechise and baptize his fellow believers, strengthening their resolve to remain faithful to Christ.

In a dramatic and tragic culmination, Charles and his companions were arrested, tortured, and sentenced to death. On June 3, 1886, they were burned alive for their faith. Their martyrdom was not just an act of defiance but a profound testament to their unshakeable belief in the promises of Christ.

May we emulate this same courage of faith.

We pray for an end to the wars, poverty and human rights abuses that drive desperate people to become refugees in the first place.


We give thanks for people working in troubled countries and ask for more of your blessing so we can bring life, dignity and hope to those that remain.

CELEBRATING CORPUS CHRISTI

THE EUCHARISTIC MIRACLE IN LANCIANO



According to tradition, a Basilian monk who struggled with doubts about the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist was celebrating Mass. During the consecration, the bread and wine visibly changed into flesh and blood. The host, now flesh, was revealed to be cardiac tissue, while the wine, now blood, was found to be coagulated blood with characteristics of living blood. This miraculous transformation was witnessed by the monk and several others, leading to profound astonishment and conversion.

The relics of the Miracle of Lanciano are still preserved to this day in the Church of San Francesco in Lanciano. Scientific investigations conducted in the 1970s confirmed the miraculous nature of the relics, with analyses revealing that the flesh is indeed human cardiac tissue and the blood is consistent with that of a living person.

The Miracle of Lanciano serves as a powerful reminder of God's presence among us and in the Eucharist. How wonderful for us to have a God who has desires to reveal Himself in tangible ways to strengthen our faith and draw us closer to Him!

The Pharisees went out and immediately took counsel with the Herodians against him to put him to death. - Mark 3:4-6

ABOUT THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY


FEAST DAY 8 JUNE
