

FROM FR DAVID



Dear friends

On behalf of Fr Joey, Fr Marek, Deacon Kevin and our wonderful parish team, Happy Easter to all!

Easter is such a special time. The flurry of the start of the year gives way to a moment where we can pause and reflect on the deepest meaning of life.

We come to the heart of our Christian experience and draw fresh hope and encouragement. We find the wellspring of life from which to set out into the year that stretches ahead.

Our deepest gratitude to all those who have worked as hard in the background to make our ceremonies as beautiful. Our special welcome to all those who have been received this Easter into our family of faith. We give God thanks for the gift that each of you are and pray that you will experience, through our support and friendship, all that the Risen Lord wishes for you. May the Spirit of Christ Risen bless each of us, touch our hearts, and open them anew with freshness and possibility.

Once again we light the Easter Candle and proclaim Christ Risen. We proclaim how the power of his life shatters the confines of death, and radiates its possibility across time and space, so that we too, now, can encounter him, hear his voice, be touched by him, enjoy his friendship and follow his invitation.

And yet, the extraordinary feature about this faith is that it is permeated with questions. The women come to the tomb asking, who will roll away the stone for us? Mary Magdala inquires of the apostles, where have they taken the body? The disciples themselves are confronted with the question of a tomb that is empty. The angel asks of the women, why look among the dead for the living? And does not the proclamation of the Resurrection of Jesus raise a question in us, too? How can someone come back to life? And what is the nature of the life that is resurrected?

All these questions are vital to the Resurrection experience. For they raise, too, other questions: the question about the identity of Jesus, the question about the meaning of his ministry and teaching.

The Easter experience begins and ends with a question, and the question is intrinsic to the event that we proclaim. It is the question that prises open our complacency. If there were no question we might simply accept a fact, like any other event, and move on. To live with a question, however, is to be goaded constantly to search. Alive to a question, the road ahead becomes not a pathway worn with familiarity, but rather an avenue into always fresh possibility. A question speaks of a future, not just a past. Indeed, the future greets us precisely through our questions, rather than through our memories. To live with a question is to discover the future.

Who will roll away the stone for us? Where have they taken the body? How is the tomb empty? Where are you? Who are you?

Who will roll away the stone that we place across the possibility of our life? The stone of our resentment? The stone of our fear? The stone of our hurts? How can we break free from the tomb in which we have enclosed the future: the tomb of our passivity, the tomb of missed opportunity, the tomb of our mistakes and failures? In places that cannot bring life, we search for love, for

dignity, for acceptance, for worth, for understanding. We become trapped in the tomb of our hurts, in the darkness of our addictions, in the ghosts of our illusions and fantasies. Why do we search among the dead for life?

What we proclaim this day brings all these questions to the fore. Lest it be relegated to the realm of mere mythology and make-believe, the proclamation of Easter makes these questions unavoidable. Our questions seek their resolution. They bring us to this place, the place that houses the body of Jesus, and our memory of him.

And what do we find? The stone has already been rolled away, the tomb is empty. All we thought blocked our future has been removed. The tomb of our disillusionment and grief is empty. The decay we anticipated has no power. The darkness we expected has turned into light. What deadened us is no more. We are brought back to life; the future is given to us again.

We see, and we believe.

Happy Easter everyone!

GOSPEL REFLECTION

The great Easter Proclamation, the Exsultet, the hymn of praise for Christ the light, tells us that this is the night. When we come together in darkness on this, the most important, the most holy night of the year, we come not to remember events that took place long ago: we come together to celebrate realities that are taking place here and now once again in our lives. The fasting, almsgiving, and praying in Lent come to fruition this night, for the Lord is risen, we are reconciled to the Father through him, and we are united as one people by the indwelling Spirit. New members are added to our company. Fasting has ended and feasting has begun. So holy and rich in meaning is this night that we continue to celebrate it for the next fifty days.

We have sat in vigil and listened and waited. We have listened to the story of how, since the beginning of time, our God has brought us light and life, love and liberty. This is the night when darkness passes over to light, this is the night when the chaos of emptiness passes over to the beauty of creation, this is the night when the Spirit renews the face of the earth, this is the night when blessings are showered down upon us, this is the night when the people of Israel passed over from slavery to freedom, this is the night when we pass over from being forsaken to being redeemed, this is the night when we pass through the waters of new birth, this is the night when we cross from exile into our homeland, this is the night when we pass over from defilement to cleanliness, this is the night when Jesus passes from death to life.

We celebrate the victory of light over darkness, of hope over despair, of love over hurt, of reconciliation over sin, of life over death. On the first day of the week, even as dawn lifted the nightly veil of darkness, the women went to the tomb. They knew what to expect. Death and disappointment and sorrow were all too familiar to them, as they are to us.

The brokenness of the world is too much with us. There is still mistrust between East and West, injustice between North and South, disregard for the dignity of all human life; racial prejudice still divides, tyranny still imprisons, violence still disables, ethnic differences still kill. In our world wealth is hoarded, food is unequally distributed, refugees are homeless, the environment is despoiled, the elderly are treated as redundant, the young are exploited; people feel insignificant, worthless, and unloved.

As the women trudged their weary and sorrowful way to the garden of tombs, we walk with our sisters in the deathly gardens of our own lives. Yet, what they expected to find was not there. The tomb is empty, the body is gone, the women are perplexed and afraid. We often stand in the midst of the pain of life, puzzled and paralysed, don't we?

'He is not here, for he has risen, as he said he would.' Praise to the God of the living for these women. They believed and ran to share this news with the others who remained in their despair. These women show us what it is to be Christian, they show us what we are celebrating tonight. The mission we all receive in baptism is to run and share the good news of the victory of life over death with others.

In the fifth century the Christians of North Africa gathered in Hippo around Augustine, their bishop. Their Easter Vigil lasted all night, from sundown to sunup. They listened to God's Word, they sang, they waited. As the sun came up they initiated new members in the waters of baptism and the oil of confirmation and the body and blood of the risen Lord. Augustine preached to them. He said, 'Accordingly, the one whose rising again we serenade by keeping watch a little longer will surely grant us the privilege of reigning with him by living forever ... because he slept so that we might keep awake, just as he died so that we might live' (Sermo 221). We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song.



COMMUNITY ACTION GROUP UPDATE




On Friday 31st March, a gathering of parishioners watched the film The Letter together. This film was authorised by Pope Francis as a way of getting the passionate message of Laudate Si' to more people, including non-Catholics. The documentary plots the Pope's invitation to four representatives of groups already being seriously affected by climate change. They were an indigenous chieftain from Brazil's rapidly disappearing Amazon forests; a 13 year old campaigner against climate change from India speaking for youth; a climate refugee from Senegal who is among the world's poorest climate refugees and a couple of Hawaiian scientists speaking for all the endangered wildlife of our planet. The film followed their journey from their widespread homes to Rome as well as their meeting with the Pope and their visit to St Francis's memorial in Assisi. There was amazing footage that captured the extraordinary variety of God's creation and left one in awe at the path mankind has taken to destroy it as a result of unbounded greed and hubris. The film is described as a message of hope: a hope that concerned people all round the world will join together to call a stop to the worst excesses of untrammelled consumerism. In discussion after the film, a group from the Social Justice committee spoke about their wish to see our parish draw up its own Laudato Si' action plan. Expect to see more about this in future Bulletins. Meanwhile, if you weren't able to come to the showing on Friday, you can see the film on YouTube. Just browse 'theletterfilm.org' and you will also find very useful resources and information.

PRO LIFE AND CENACLE GROUP


The 36-page booklet "Why We're Pro-life" is now freely available in the church. Please take a copy home and read it. "Why We're Pro-Life" serves two functions.

SENIORS MORNING TEA


