Worshipping Together

Welcome to Evening Prayer (Vespers)

This year, we are expanding our parish liturgies to include a **monthly service of Vespers**, known as evening prayer. Vespers will take place on the last Saturday of every month at 4:45pm, before the 5:30pm vigil mass, with the first service being on **Saturday 22 February**.

Vespers comprises the singing of hymns, psalms, canticles, readings, and prayers, and will be led by a new choir called the Parish Schola. Those wishing to attend are welcome to sing or simply listen and pray through the music.



Occasionally I travel to Canberra for meetings with different church agencies. I remember one such trip with particular fondness. At the end of a long day's discussion I was invited to the Ainslea Football Club to celebrate Ronnie's 55th birthday. Ronnie was an intellectually disabled member of one of the several L'Arche Christian communities in Canberra. These are communities founded by the French Canadian Jean Vanier – communities in which those who live with disability live others in the spirit of the gospel's hospitality. There were about twelve of us invading the Club's restaurant, a mixture of disabled and less manifestly handicapped people, and must have made quite a sight. We certainly made quite a noise singing 'happy birthday' to Ronnie as he was presented with a cake, aglow with sparkles and has he was given the gift of some gardening tools, for gardening was Ronnie's great love. Ronnie's delight and gratitude were very powerful. His acceptance of me as a complete stranger was also very powerful. At the end of the night, he very simply put his arm around me as a way of thanking me for being there with him on his birthday.' Moments like these are one of power: they are moments which change one's perspective on life, on the truth of what it means to be human. The power of the experience of meeting and celebrating with Ronnie stays with me still. It is an experience of power. Of course, Canberra is also known for another kind of power: the power of politics which operates on a very different logic than that of hospitality. Political power works is adversarial in character, on the logic of competition and manipulation. Weakness is no virtue in the power of politics; strength is. Whilst not undermining the significance of the issues involved in the national parliament and in which I as rather a political junkie take a great personal interest, I could not but be struck on that particular visit to Canberra with the comparison between the power Ronnie possessed and the power displayed in the Parliament. Here, in fact, are the two forms of power with which we are presented in the gospel: on the one hand, power as domination, as appropriation, a kind of taking possession; and power as gratitude and welcome, the capacity for suffering and sympathy, grief and tenderness. At the outset of the gospel's proclamation is this distinction between our instinct to dominate and control, and this capacity to receive and participate. For Jesus teaches that the power of life does not come to us through our strength, but ironically through our weakness. The power that humanises us does not come through what we have achieved, or by what we have consumed or acquired. The power that most fully humanises us resides, rather, in our openness, in our need to be in relationship, and in our dissatisfaction with the present. It is a paradox we never quite seem to understand. But Ronnie understood it quite clearly. Ronnie for me was living text of the gospel of the Nazarene. In the end, whose power do you think endures . . . the politicians' or Ronnie's? (Fr David)

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

'BLESSED' ARE YOU ...

Like Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, Luke has Jesus teach his disciples. It occurs on a plain with the teacher surrounded by a great crowd of his disciples and others. We learn that his audience comes from around Judea, even from ancient Syria (Tyre and Sidon, in present-day Lebanon). In Luke, Jesus teaches about the primary qualities of discipleship and warns of the subtle attractions or seductions that compromise that discipleship.

Wealthy and poorer Greco-Romans make up Luke's late first-century Gospel audience, and Luke directs Jesus' words deliberately at them. The first half of his teaching is to those who are economically poor, hungry and grieving. Those are the members of Luke's world who do not have the power or status to respond to their social, economic or personal situation. They are utterly powerless and live, perhaps, on the margins of Luke's Gospel household. God will reverse their status. Luke reminds them that they are 'blessed' by God.

The translation, 'happy are you...' doesn't capture the powerful sense of Jesus' teaching. To be happy is a personal emotive response to good fortune. To be 'blessed' comes from above. This is God's act, God's gift, independent of one's emotional state. Blessedness places one in the realm of the holy. The second half of Jesus' teaching is addressed to those in the Lukan household who are wealthy, have all they need and are dismissively laughing, perhaps at others' misfortune. Their situation will also be reversed. Jesus' words are insightful and sobering. They invite us, contemporary disciples, to identify what we struggle with and what seduces us.

On Thursday our Community Gardeners (Maryanne, Lyn, Katy, Chris, Jo and Carole) planted the pew gardens with lettuce, kale, capsicum, chilli, spinach, Italian herbs, carrots and a papaya. In the afternoon some St Pius X College students added a selection of herbs and vegetables. The remaining two pew gardens are for Pius X College students to plant coffee in reference to the Edmund Rice Foundation in Kenya which teachers Ryan Balbao and Daniel Petrie visited last year. Some of the plants were raised from seed by a couple of community gardeners, the rest were planted as seedlings. Harvesting time will vary for each type of vegetable, the fastest growing being the carrots which are a special kind meant to be eaten when small and sweet. The garden beds have been shrouded with netting to keep off the local possums and other wildlife. Most of us are fairly new at gardening and we are therefore very grateful for the oversight from professional gardener and volunteer, Pick yourself a handful of herbs hen you come to Mass as regular trimming is good for herbs. The herb gardens are against the fence. St Pius X College Social Justice Action Group, the Edmund Rice Society, will be holding their meetings at the Community Garden area and will water the plants each week during Friday Lunchtime.





Summary of Fr David's online Presentation on the Year of Jubilee

Year of Jubilee Celebration Plans

Fr David led a seminar discussing the upcoming year of jubilee, emphasizing the importance of faith, prayer, and witness. He explained the concept of jubilee, its biblical background, and its significance in Christianity. The parish is designated as a shrine of hope for young people, and David outlined plans for its celebration throughout the year. The meeting also touched on the topic of indulgences and how they can be received as gifts of grace. The overall goal was to inspire hope and encourage community participation in the jubilee year.

Year of Jubilee Celebration

Fr David discussed the year of jubilee, an event that occurs every 25 years, following the 25-year cycle since the ordinary jubilee of the year 2000. He mentioned that Pope Francis proclaimed an extraordinary jubilee in 2015 for the sake of making known and encouraging an encounter with the merciful face of God. The current year marks a new jubilee, with only the four holy doors in Rome marking the occasion, as per the Pope's request. The next major jubilee celebration is expected in 2033. David also touched upon the historical basis of these years of jubilee, drawing from the Leviticus scripture, where every 50th year was to be a special year of proclamation and celebration, with the sounding of horns and the declaration of liberty to all inhabitants.

Biblical Jubilee Practices: Freedom & Debt

In the seminar, Fr David discussed the significance of the biblical concept of Jubilee in relation to social structures and community dynamics. He highlighted the practice of leaving land fallow every 7th year to ensure the poor had enough to eat, and the remission of debt to prevent further impoverishment. This practice ensured that those in need were brought back into the community. He also noted the freedom of captives and the release of debtors every 7th year. Fr David emphasized that Jubilee is a time to remember, listen, and dream of a better future. He concluded by drawing a parallel between the Biblical Jubilee and Jesus, who is the ultimate fulfillment of these practices.

Christian Hope and Social Covenant

In the seminar, David discussed the importance of hope and its connection to the future. He explained that Christian hope is linked to faith, and its affirmation of the possibility of the future, even in uncertain circumstances. Fr David emphasized that the future is given to us as a gift in Jesus and his resurrection, and that it's a relentless invitation. He also highlighted the need for a social covenant to foster hope, using the example of the parish being designated as a place of hope. Fr David introduced two patrons, Carlo Acutis and Piergiorgio Frassati, whose relics will be with the parish. He announced plans for a week-long festival to celebrate Carlo Acutis' canonization by Pope Francis on April 27th, and the visit of Cardinal Mafi from Tonga. For Piergiorgio Frassati, Fr David hopes that Cardinal David from the Philippines will be with us on August 3rd.

Year of Jubilee Church Festivities


In the meeting, David discussed the upcoming year of jubilee for their church, which will be celebrated through a series of festivals and events. The festivities will be centered around two patrons, with a third festival added to celebrate the beauty of sacred music and art. A new festival, Inaugural Festival of Beauty, will be held in September. A new sculpture of the Lady of Sorrows will be commissioned, and efforts will be made to renovate the church. The church may also apply for the status of a minor basilica. David also touched on the concept of indulgences, how they can sanctify lives, and the various activities planned for the jubilee year. The conversation ended with a prayer and an invitation for any questions or comments.
