

Reflection from Fr David on the Gospel this Sunday

Lent, as we know, is a time of examination, a time of review and evaluation. It's the time in the year, in preparation for the celebration of Easter, where we re-focus and regain our single-mindedness. As we examine our life with renewed depth, and walk forward, our gaze is on the Christ ahead of us who invites us, who beckons us, who waits with arms open to receive us. Our gaze must be firmly on him, full of invitation and full of possibility. This is critical because if we take our gaze off him, then our self-examination can become a gaze simply on our self. And to the extent that the gaze is simply on our self, on our own efforts rather than the invitation of the Lord who beckons us forward, then we can slide simply into a relentless type of self-criticism. Today's gospel, in which we hear the story of an accused woman brought before Jesus confronts this tendency in each of us.

In this story the voice of accusation dominates. The woman is accused. Her accusers demand satisfaction. The characters portray the destructive dynamic of accusation: how it perpetuates shame, how it leads to despair, how it works toward the isolation of the person. The voice of accusation shames; it isolates. Strangely our own shame almost requires accusation; it instinctively looks for accusation. It expects accusation for its validation. That is why people who carry within them a great reservoir of shame, albeit unknown to themselves, project a great deal of accusation onto others. Another's silence for example is interpreted as accusation. Another's delay is interpreted as punishment, and so forth. Shame needs accusation for its validation. In this story the voice of accusation has taken the upper hand. But Jesus refuses to enter it. When the accusers bring the shamed woman before him, demanding that he too accuse her, he remains silent. He simply plays in the sand. We do not need, I believe, to interpret too much into what is written in the sand. He simply bends down and doodles, perhaps. Yet in so doing, he silences the voice of accusation. He neutralizes it, disempowers it. He does not accuse. He does not collude to deepen the woman's shame. And therefore he creates a space for change to take place within her. But by not colluding with the voice of accusation, Jesus reveals to us something new of God. In God, there is no accusation. In God, there is no accusation. This is something deeply confusing to our shame. Our shame, as mentioned, instinctively, almost perversely, needs accusation for its validation. It seeks out accusation. It projects accusation. And it all so often projects accusation onto 'God' who, trapped in the web of our shame, becomes the eternal accuser. But Jesus breaks the cycle of shame by breaking the cycle of accusation. In God, there is no accusation.

On this Sunday, too, our Filipino Chaplaincy Chatswood Parish (FCCP) celebrates its 15th anniversary of establishment. What a blessing our Filipino community is to us in a multicultural fabric! We join with them in thanksgiving for the vitality of their association but also for the presence of this rich and vibrant culture in our midst. Do read the account of FCCP in the bulletin and come along for the festivity on the Forecourt following the special 12pm Mass on Sunday.

The practice of offering Mass for our deceased is a time-honored one and we welcome requests for Mass intentions for our departed, and indeed Mass intentions for other reasons too. It is important to be aware that we cannot offer the Mass, however, necessarily at the time requested. This is because a priest can only receive one intention per Mass, and he may have the Mass that is being requested already allocated to an intention. If we would like a Mass offered at a particular occasion it is important to approach one of the priests individually with the intention and discuss with him what is possible Otherwise, be assured that the Mass requested will be offered as soon as it is possible for one of the priests to do so, given his existing schedule of Mass intentions.


You will notice that we have installed some new art in the church in the niches at the head of the nave. We have been given two wooden panels of Filipino carvings: one of our Lady and one of the Infant Child of Prague. These are 19th century pieces of similar style. Fr Marek has been working very hard engaging his brilliant engineering and carpentry skill to mount this in an attractive manner in keeping the architecture of the niche. Fr Marek has hung now the first panel. The second panel, of Madonna della Leche, will go on the northern side niche. They have been mounted in a way that they can be removed easily when it comes to the re-painting of the church. However, I believe they add character and warmth to our church and honor the remarkable devotion of faith of our Filipino community.

Please keep Richard Fitzgerald in your prayer. Richard had joined us in February as an aspirant in our diocesan program of formation for the Diaconate. However, Richard has discerned now not to continue in the program and therefore his placement with us comes to its conclusion. We thank him for his contribution over the last couple of months which we truly appreciated.



I cannot thank you enough for your extraordinary efforts to make our Feast for Freedom the great success that it was. The joyous feeling in the Hall, the warmth of hospitality that you all gave, the incredible array of exotic dishes that you slaved over, the impossible crush in the kitchen that the chefs navigated with such patience, care and mutuality, and the welcoming appearance of the Hall and its cleanliness that so many laboured over during the day – all these things and more added up to a wonderful evening. I have so many happy pictures circling in my mind. There is Binnie, damp from the heat and steam, desperately trying to save her Pratha Roti; Nasrin's husband squeezing a corner to set out her Qabili Palaw; Nermine's beautiful daughter Maria persuading guests to buy raffle tickets, Gillian ferociously attacking the washing up, Ditas tut-tutting as she swept up rubbish hidden behind the dividers, John Russell mending a divider with hammer and nail, Marty Thomas heroically trying to draw out bids from the crowd, Helen rescuing me when I lost my voice, Anshu and Mariza and Nermine lending colour in their national costumes, the tables looking so charming after Helen ironed them and Fr Joey rushed out and bought the blue and yellow plastic undercovers to improve their look. I could write for a day and not have told of all the happy images that keep flashing through my mind of each one of you. It was a huge job, preparing the Hall for 100 people after it has been unused by the church throughout COVID and there were so many unknowns, and it was an amazing achievement to feed them such an array of delicious dishes, and an exhausting task to take everything down and clean away at the end of the night.

I hope over the coming days to contact each of you individually to tell you what your contribution meant to the evening. For now let me tell you what I believe you achieved. First of all, you raised \$6000 on the night. In addition, our fundraising page raised another \$2000, making a total of \$8000 that we will give to ASRC and to JRS to support them in their work for refugees. Secondly, you had a huge impact on both Nish Rego and Idrissa Dumbuya who were blown away by the mood in the Hall and the fact that so many everyday Australians would turn out to support them. They both encounter much negativity and push-back against the cause of refugees in Australia and the kindness and goodwill everyone showed to them lifted their spirits greatly. Thirdly, we brought together all sorts of people from the Parish to enjoy being together again and to celebrate being community. And hopefully we made 100 people and their friends and families more open to learning about Australia's asylum seekers and refugees.

Thank you so very much to you all. Thank you also to Fr David for your help before the event, to Fr Joey for contributions during the set up and during the dinner and to Fr Marek for providing the prayer of Grace before the meal. I am still smiling over this great thing that we achieved.

What's Happeníng ín our Parísh



Supporting our parishioner, Stephanie Ho in a wonderful initiative

20 year old Stephanie Ho (one of the senior altar servers) is preparing to run 320km from Canberra to Sydney this July - the equivalent of a marathon every day for a week - to raise funds for a school in rural Nepal. She taught English at this school in 2019 and saw with her own eyes the lack of resources available to the students. She noticed that even though the students enjoyed learning, there was much room for improvement. Over the past few months, she has collaborated with the school and identified its priorities to facilitate its improvement. Her Canberra to Sydney run will raise funds to:

1. Build a mini science lab equipped with beakers, crucibles, bunsen burners, test tubes etc.

2. Install some computers and a projector

3. Provide more cookery to allow for a larger variety of meals (meals were provided to the students during school time)

Every cent raised through the fundraiser will go towards acquiring equipment for the school. After the run, Stephanie will fly over to Nepal to buy the equipment to deliver to the school, while also assisting in its installation. - Accurate syntheses that truly captures the range of critical and appreciative perspectives of all responses, including views that are expressed only by a minority of participants.
- Transparency, ensuring that processes of invitation, involvement, inclusion, and aggregation of input are clear and well communicated.
- Fairness, ensuring that participation in the listening process treats each person equally, so that every voice can be duly heard.

This Sunday April 3, 2022, FCCP is celebrating 15 years of "Faith in Action" at Our Lady of Dolours Parish in Chatswood after the 12pm Filipino Mass

FCCP was formed in response to a need to support local Filipinos in assimilating into Australian life. It is a faith-based community that aims to maintain Filipino values and culture, grow spiritually in the Catholic Faith amidst a secular society and provide advice to newly arrived Filipino migrants who may need information about the Australian way of life.

On the 1st of April 2007, FCCP was launched at an Inaugural Mass at Our Lady of Dolours attended by 420 people from Sydney and surrounds. The first ten years saw the FCCP grow from a small group of dedicated volunteers to a community involved in the parish.

FCCP is one of several Filipino communities in the Diocese of Broken Bay. Under the guidance of Fr David Ranson, a Charter for the FILIPINO CHAPLAINCY in the Diocese of Broken Bay was drafted in 2019 with the aim of providing a framework for the different Filipino communities as they operate in their respective parishes. Deacon Roberto Corpuz is the current Broken Bay Filipino Chaplaincy (BBFC) Pastoral Coordinator. The Charter was approved by Bishop Anthony Randazzo in June 2020.

Over the years, FCCP has introduced traditional Filipino religious practices like the Living Rosary, Flores de Mayo, Lenten programs, Simbang Gabi (Novena Dawn Mass), and Christmas Carols into the parish. FCCP also actively participates in various parish activities through the kids' ministry, faith formation, music, liturgy, community outreach and cultural events like international food fairs and multicultural days.

The past two years have been challenging for all due to COVID but that didn't stop FCCP from staying in touch and finding solutions to what may otherwise be challenges! In 2020, most activities – meetings, praying the Rosary, following a Lenten Program, even celebrating its 13th anniversary – were done via Zoom. Thank God for technology! A few of FCCP's recent highlights include the celebration for the commemoration of 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines held on March 2021; participation in the Ordination to the Diaconate of two Filipino seminarians and the subsequent Ordination into priesthood of Fr Aldrin and Fr Roger, together with Fr Sam, in October 2021. Lastly, the annual Novena Dawn Mass (Simbang Gabi) launch which is normally held at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral in Waitara was held in Chatswood to allow for a larger attendee capacity.



The Five First Saturdays Devotion



From our Marian Catholic Action Group

Jesus and His Mother Made a Special Request for the Five First Saturdays The First Saturdays Devotion, also known as the "Five First Saturdays" is a special request by Our Lord and Our Lady to make reparation for all the sins against the Immaculate Heart of Mary. We should continue to fulfill them every month to console the Hearts of Jesus and Mary and make reparation for the sins of others. The continued practice of the First Saturdays will help bring about a period of peace and the salvation of many souls as Our Lady promised (Fatima, July 13, 1917). On December 10th, 1925, The Child Jesus and Mary came to Sister Lucia. The Child Jesus spoke first saying: "Have compassion on the Heart of your Most Holy Mother covered with the thorns with which ungrateful men pierce it at every moment, and there is no one to remove them with an act of reparation". What does the Child Jesus mean by "compassion"? Compassion is another word for "mercy". In fact, the practice of mercy begins with having mercy on the Sacred Heart of Jesus who beheld our every act during His Passion and is in need of being consoled too.

Four Practices in Reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary

We now know that in order to make reparation for these sins, we are asked to receive the Holy Communion of Reparation, but we should not forget that Our Lady ALSO asked for other practices to be done to fulfill her request. The four practices that have to be fulfilled on the First Saturday, each with the intention of making reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, as Our Lady asked in 1925, are the following:

Confession* Receive Holy Communion* Pray the Rosary* Keep her company for 15 minutes while meditating on the mysteries of the Rosary*

* Each of these practices need to be done with the intention of making reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Further explanation on how to make the Five First Saturdays is found in the pamphlet left in the church foyer or in the parish library.


