Reflection on the Gospel this Sunday

The story of the prodigal son in Luke's Gospel is familiar to most of us. But how many of us also think of the father as prodigal? *Prodigal* means "recklessly wasteful" or "extremely generous." The son is prodigal because he wastes his inheritance. The father is prodigal because he lavishes his love on both his sons.

Let's examine the younger son's actions. He asks for his inheritance while his father is still living, and surprisingly his father accommodates him. At the time of Jesus, fathers were discouraged from distributing their inheritances while they were alive (see Sirach 33:20–24). According to Jewish tradition, the younger son is severing his connection to his family by demanding his share of the inheritance before the father's death. With no regrets, the younger spends his money in a far-off Gentile place. When his money is gone, he looks for an employer so he can earn a living to survive. In desperation, he takes a job feeding pigs.

Luke tells us that the younger son has no food, yet he cannot eat the pigs he is tending. He also cannot eat the feed he gives the pigs because the bitter carob pods cause nausea in human beings. Destitute, the younger son realizes that even the servants on his father's farm have something to eat. Upon his return, the younger son admits that he had publicly denounced his father, his family, and his community. Now humbled, he is willing to face the consequences of his earlier actions.

Even though the younger son seeks only his father's forgiveness and treatment as a hired hand, his father restores the son to his previous dignity. In this way, the father demonstrates to the community that he has welcomed his younger son back into the family. Then the father bestows the ultimate honor on his son—a community celebration in the son's honor. The story's focus then turns to the oldest son and his relationship with his father. Instead of honoring his father by hosting the celebration with him, the oldest son stays away. His action insults and humiliates his father. When the father leaves the celebration to plead with him, the oldest son speaks of himself as a slave. Then, in a self-righteous tone, he says: "I have never disobeyed your command. . . . But when this son of yours comes back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes; you killed the fatted calf for him!" (15:29–30).

The oldest brother's words indicate that he does not recognize the returning son as his brother. The selfish side of the older son emerges. The father tells the oldest son that "you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; was lost and has been found" (15:31–32). The father guarantees his love but also challenges the older son to recognize the dignity of his younger brother.

The story ends abruptly. We do not know what the oldest brother does. The question lingers for the Pharisees and the scribes who question Jesus about his relationship with sinners, and it lingers for us today.





Supporting our parishioner, Stephanie Ho in a wonderful initiative


20 year old Stephanie Ho (one of the senior altar servers) is preparing to run 320km from Canberra to Sydney this July - the equivalent of a marathon every day for a week - to raise funds for a school in rural Nepal. She taught English at this school in 2019 and saw with her own eyes the lack of resources available to the students. She noticed that even though the students enjoyed learning, there was much room for improvement. Over the past few months, she has collaborated with the school and identified its priorities to facilitate its improvement. Her Canberra to Sydney run will raise funds to:

- 1. Build a mini science lab equipped with beakers, crucibles, bunsen burners, test tubes etc.
- 2. Install some computers and a projector
- 3. Provide more cookery to allow for a larger variety of meals (meals were provided to the students during school time)

Every cent raised through the fundraiser will go towards acquiring equipment for the school. After the run, Stephanie will fly over to Nepal to buy the equipment to deliver to the school, while also assisting in its installation. Act of Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary by Pope Francis on 25 March 2022

O Mary, Mother of God and our Mother, in this time of trial we turn to you. As our Mother, you love us and know us: no concern of our hearts is hidden from you. Mother of mercy, how often we have experienced your watchful care and your peaceful presence! You never cease to guide us to Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

Yet we have strayed from that path of peace. We have forgotten the lesson learned from the tragedies of the last century, the sacrifice of the millions who fell in two world wars. We have disregarded the commitments we made as a community of nations. We have betrayed peoples' dreams of peace and the hopes of the young. We grew sick with greed, we thought only of our own nations and their interests, we grew indifferent and caught up in our selfish needs and concerns. We chose to ignore God, to be satisfied with our illusions, to grow arrogant and aggressive, to suppress innocent lives and to stockpile weapons. We stopped being our neighbour's keepers and stewards of our common home. We have ravaged the garden of the earth with war and by our sins we have broken the heart of our heavenly Father, who desires us to be brothers and sisters. We grew indifferent to everyone and everything except ourselves. Now with shame we cry out: Forgive us, Lord!

Holy Mother, amid the misery of our sinfulness, amid our struggles and weaknesses, amid the mystery of iniquity that is evil and war, you remind us that God never abandons us, but continues to look upon us with love, ever ready to forgive us and raise us up to new life. He has given you to us and made your Immaculate Heart a refuge for the Church and for all humanity. By God's gracious will, you are ever with us; even in the most troubled moments of our history, you are there to guide us with tender love.

We now turn to you and knock at the door of your heart. We are your beloved children. In every age you make yourself known to us, calling us to conversion. At this dark hour, help us and grant us your comfort. Say to us once more: "Am I not here, I who am your Mother?" You are able to untie the knots of our hearts and of our times. In you we place our trust. We are confident that, especially in moments of trial, you will not be deaf to our supplication and will come to our aid.

That is what you did at Cana in Galilee, when you interceded with Jesus and he worked the first of his signs. To preserve the joy of the wedding feast, you said to him: "They have no wine" (*Jn* 2:3). Now, O Mother, repeat those words and that prayer, for in our own day we have run out of the wine of hope, joy has fled, fraternity has faded. We have forgotten our humanity and squandered the gift of peace. We opened our hearts to violence and destructiveness. How greatly we need your maternal help!

Therefore, O Mother, hear our prayer.

Star of the Sea, do not let us be shipwrecked in the tempest of war.

Ark of the New Covenant, inspire projects and paths of reconciliation.

Queen of Heaven, restore God's peace to the world.

Eliminate hatred and the thirst for revenge, and teach us forgiveness.

Free us from war, protect our world from the menace of nuclear weapons.

Queen of the Rosary, make us realize our need to pray and to love.

Queen of the Human Family, show people the path of fraternity.

Queen of Peace, obtain peace for our world.

O Mother, may your sorrowful plea stir our hardened hearts. May the tears you shed for us make this valley parched by our hatred blossom anew. Amid the thunder of weapons, may your prayer turn our thoughts to peace. May your maternal touch soothe those who suffer and flee from the rain of bombs. May your motherly embrace comfort those forced to leave their homes and their native land. May your Sorrowful Heart move us to compassion and inspire us to open our doors and to care for our brothers and sisters who are injured and cast aside.

Holy Mother of God, as you stood beneath the cross, Jesus, seeing the disciple at your side, said: "Behold your son" (Jn 19:26). In this way he entrusted each of us to you. To the disciple, and to each of us, he said: "Behold, your Mother" (v. 27). Mother Mary, we now desire to welcome you into our lives and our history. At this hour, a weary and distraught humanity stands with you beneath the cross, needing to entrust itself to you and, through you, to consecrate itself to Christ. The people of Ukraine and Russia, who venerate you with great love, now turn to you, even as your heart beats with compassion for them and for all those peoples decimated by war, hunger, injustice and poverty.

Therefore, Mother of God and our Mother, to your Immaculate Heart we solemnly entrust and consecrate ourselves, the Church and all humanity, especially Russia and Ukraine. Accept this act that we carry out with confidence and love. Grant that war may end and peace spread throughout the world. The "Fiat" that arose from your heart opened the doors of history to the Prince of Peace. We trust that, through your heart, peace will dawn once more. To you we consecrate the future of the whole human family, the needs and expectations of every people, the anxieties and hopes of the world.

Through your intercession, may God's mercy be poured out on the earth and the gentle rhythm of peace return to mark our days. Our Lady of the "Fiat", on whom the Holy Spirit descended, restore among us the harmony that comes from God. May you, our "living fountain of hope", water the dryness of our hearts. In your womb Jesus took flesh; help us to foster the growth of communion. You once trod the streets of our world; lead us now on the paths of peace. Amen.


Fifteen years of the Filipino Chaplaincy Chatswood Parish (FCCP)

FCCP was formed in response to a need to support local Filipinos in assimilating into Australian life. It is a faith-based community that aims to maintain Filipino values and culture, grow spiritually in the Catholic Faith amidst a secular society and provide advice to newly arrived Filipino migrants who may need information about the Australian way of life.

On the 1st of April 2007, FCCP was launched at an Inaugural Mass at Our Lady of Dolours attended by 420 people from Sydney and surrounds. The first ten years saw the FCCP grow from a small group of dedicated volunteers to a community involved in the parish.

FCCP is one of several Filipino communities in the Diocese of Broken Bay. Under the guidance of Fr David Ranson, a Charter for the FILIPINO CHAPLAINCY in the Diocese of Broken Bay was drafted in 2019 with the aim of providing a framework for the different Filipino communities as they operate in their respective parishes. Deacon Roberto Corpuz is the current Broken Bay Filipino Chaplaincy (BBFC) Pastoral Coordinator. The Charter was approved by Bishop Anthony Randazzo in June 2020.

Over the years, FCCP has introduced traditional Filipino religious practices like the Living Rosary, Flores de Mayo, Lenten programs, Simbang Gabi (Novena Dawn Mass), and Christmas Carols into the parish. FCCP also actively participates in various parish activities through the kids' ministry, faith formation, music, liturgy, community outreach and cultural events like international food fairs and multicultural days.





This coming April 3, 2022, FCCP is celebrating 15 years of "Faith in Action" at Our Lady of Dolours Parish in Chatswood on April 3, 2022 after the 12:00pm Filipino Mass. We invite you all to come and celebrate with us!

The past two years have been challenging for all due to COVID but that didn't stop FCCP from staying in touch and finding solutions to what may otherwise be challenges! In 2020, most activities – meetings, praying the Rosary, following a Lenten Program, even celebrating its 13th anniversary – were done via Zoom. Thank God for technology! A few of FCCP's recent highlights include the celebration for the commemoration of 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines held on March 2021; participation in the Ordination to the Diaconate of two Filipino seminarians and the subsequent Ordination into priesthood of Fr Aldrin and Fr Roger, together with Fr Sam, in October 2021. Lastly, the annual Novena Dawn Mass (Simbang Gabi) launch which is normally held at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral in Waitara was held in Chatswood to allow for a larger attendee capacity.

Preparing for Easter



The Chrism Mass will be celebrated at 7.30pm on Tuesday, 12 April at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral, Waitara. The priests of our Diocese gather for this celebration with Most Rev Bishop Anthony Randazzo to renew their priestly commitment. During Mass, the oils of Catechumens and the Sick are blessed, and the Chrism is consecrated and then taken back to each parish for use in various Sacramental liturgies throughout the year.

Parishioners are warmly invited to join together in this celebration. Please contact the parish office before Monday 4 April should you wish to attend.

Last Saturday 19 March we celebrated the Feast of St Joseph.

Since the 17th century it has been a custom on this day, celebrated in Italy as Fathers' Day, to create a table of bread. It commemorates the delivery of the people from a great famine through the intercession of St Joseph. Today, a table of bread is created, the bread is blessed, and given to those who are needy. Our blessing of the table of bread after our 5.30pm Saturday Vigil Mass preceded our great forecourt concert in honour of both St Joseph and St Patrick whose feast day occurred several days earlier.



The Five First Saturdays Devotion

Jesus and His Mother Made a Special Request for the Five First Saturdays

The First Saturdays Devotion, also known as the "Five First Saturdays" is a special request by Our Lord and Our Lady to make reparation for all the sins against the Immaculate Heart of Mary. We should continue to fulfill them every month to console the Hearts of Jesus and Mary and make reparation for the sins of others. The continued practice of the First Saturdays will help bring about a period of peace and the salvation of many souls as Our Lady promised (Fatima, July 13, 1917). On December 10th, 1925, The Child Jesus and Mary came to Sister Lucia. The Child Jesus spoke first saying: "Have compassion on the Heart of your Most Holy Mother covered with the thorns with which ungrateful men pierce it at every moment, and there is no one to remove them with an act of reparation". What does the Child Jesus mean by "compassion"? Compassion is another word for "mercy". In fact, the practice of mercy begins with having mercy on the Sacred Heart of Jesus who beheld our every act during His Passion and is in need of being consoled too.

Four Practices in Reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary

We now know that in order to make reparation for these sins, we are asked to receive the Holy Communion of Reparation, but we should not forget that Our Lady ALSO asked for other practices to be done to fulfill her request. The four practices that have to be fulfilled on the First Saturday, each with the intention of making reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, as Our Lady asked in 1925, are the following:

Confession*
Receive Holy Communion*
Pray the Rosary*
Keep her company for 15 minutes while meditating on the mysteries of the Rosary*




