From Fr David

Dear friends,

We are now on our Lenten Journey with our shared prayer that these weeks be ones of grace and renewal for us all. As from this Friday morning we will celebrate one early morning Mass at 7am on each of the forthcoming Fridays of Lent. All are welcome to take up this extra opportunity of prayer as a personal and communal exercise during the period of Lent.

Mission Broken Bay has provided us with a great resource: <u>2025 Lenten Resource</u> | <u>A Promise of Hope</u>. The resource is designed to be used individually and within a group setting. After some delay, the Lenten booklets are now available.

Please note that our **Parish Office will be closed on Tuesday 18 March** as our parish staff will be attending a diocesan Parish Staff Lenten Retreat Day at Pymble. Please keep all our staff in our prayer for they do so much for us all.

On this Wednesday, our Diocese celebrates the very special event of the Ordination to the Priesthood of Deacon Rosan Mathew. We extend our blessings to Deacon Rosan with great gratitude to God for raising for us another priest. The Ordination will take place at Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral, Waitara at 7.30pm. Therefore, please note that we will **not be able to offer our usual Wednesday 6.30pm Mass this Wednesday 19 March** as all our clergy will be at the Ordination. However, Mass will be offered at the other usual times of 9.00am and 12.30pm for the Solemnity of St Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

On **Wednesday morning we will be sponsoring as a parish our second Youth in Council.** This follows the method of our larger, well-established Parish in Council sessions. Ninety students from Years 10-12 from Mercy College and St Pius X College will join us for the morning, reflecting and conversing together on the theme of Hope: What does hope mean to me? Why is it important? What is one bold action that we students can take to spread hope in this Year of Jubilee. The conduct of these forums is a very significant contribution our parish is able to make to our young leaders.

We celebrate Lent this time, in a Year of Jubilee—a year that invites us to focus on Hope. Again, Mission Broken Bay has produced a beautiful resource for the Year. There is so much wonderful information and ideas in the booklet, including a Pilgrim's Passport that can be used in visiting the two other shrines of Hope in our diocese: St Patricks, East Gosford, a Shrine of Hope for Families, and St Mary Immaculate, Manly, a Shrine of Hope for clergy and vocations. However, the arrival of further copies of the booklet has been delayed. We are working to secure more copies for all those who wish. However, do not let the delay stop us visiting the other shrines. Let's make a passport book of our own and have this stamped at each shrine. The instructions for this are on our Jubilee page in the bulletin.

We now have over 70 **children preparing for the Sacrament of Reconciliation** for the first time. Over the next three weekends they will continue to learn about Jesus' invitation to love more fully in our lives, yet how we often do not love as we might. Then, we have the need to seek forgiveness and to begin again. We come to the Sacrament of Reconciliation with a desire to live in the way Jesus invites us. We hear his word of forgiveness and mercy which become for us our inspiration to sin no more. Our children's example of these coming weeks is an inspiration to us to examine our own lives, and to engage the Sacrament of Reconciliation ourselves in a new and deeper way this Lent. All of us sin; all of us fail to love as we might; all of us need forgiveness from others and from God.

For this occasion we will be joined by Cardinal Soane Patita Paini Mafi, Archbishop of Tonga.



The Diocesan Shrines of Hope Passport

The following is the step-by-step guideline for the Broken Bay Pilgrim Passports

1. Jubilee Passports can be stamped at each Shrine and the Cathedral to acknowledge visit and time of prayer within.

A special downloadable **Broken Bay Jubilee Passport for Kids** for children to use when visiting the Shrines with their families/caregivers.

- 2. Once all three Shrines and Cathedral, with respective stamps, have been visited a Pilgrim's passport is "complete".
- 3. Pilgrims then have their passports verified at their own Parish office.
- 4. Each Parish will notify Mission Broken Bay with the names of those pilgrims who have completed their passports so that they may receive a special commemorative certificate signed by Bishop Anthony. This is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the Jubilee by presenting these certificates at the end of a Sunday Mass.

A live Tally on the <u>www.bbjubilee.com.au</u> website will add a further joyful essence, noting how many pilgrims have completed the Jubilee Shrines of Hope Pilgrimage and which parishes they are from.



Our Caring for Our World Ministry Circle



The 36-page booklet "Why We're Pro-life" is freely available in our church. Please take a copy home and read it. "Why We're Pro-Life" serves two functions.

First, it provides the words, ideas, and confidence to talk to others about abortion.

Second, it's a compelling pro-life resource that you can give away to anyone. "Why We're Pro-Life" is perfect for this important moment in the fight for life It addresses the legal and cultural landscape of the new post-Roe world.

It avoids the charge that abortion is a church-state issue in that it appeals only to up-to-date science and to broadly shared beliefs about human rights. It strikes a tone of peaceful dialogue, much needed during a time of rising temperatures in the divisive debate over abortion.

International Day of the Unborn Child

The International Day of the Unborn Child is observed annually on March 25. It serves as a commemoration of unborn fetuses and stands as a day of opposition to abortion. This significant date was established by Pope John Paul II to coincide with the Feast of the Annunciation. The Pope viewed this day as a positive option in favour of life and the spread of a culture for life to guarantee respect for human dignity in every situation.

Social Justice truly begins in the womb as it pertains to people, and people start in the womb. The preborn are most vulnerable at the beginning stages of life and it is here that they require our greatest attention and efforts. However sadly today many babies will die at the hands of an abortionist before they come to birth.

The Day of the Unborn Child Procession – Sunday 23 March 2025

As Catholics we need to stand up for the life of unborn children. We recognise that abortion is a tragedy for both the child and the parent. On Sunday 23 March parishioners will have the opportunity to participate in a procession to mark the Day of the Unborn Child. Join us and others from across Sydney at the forecourt of St Mary's Cathedral at 12.00 noon as we prepare to process through the streets of Sydney. The procession is aligned to the Feast of the Annunciation which commemorates the day in history where Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ became Incarnate. On this day "the Word became flesh and dwelt amongst us." What better day than this to remember the plight of the unborn child in the modern world.

For those who have had an abortion experience or have encouraged someone to do so, God's mercy and love is available through the sacrament of reconciliation. *Rachel's Vineyard Ministries Sydney* offers retreats and other resources/assistance which bring spiritual and emotional healing. A powerful story – a young woman who carried two pregnancies to term even though she was told her child would not have long to live (they both died within one hour after birth). February Report of our Chatswood St Vincent de Paul Conference

We had 10 requests for help were received by OLOS Vinnies in Feb. Only one was new, a refugee family needing basic gear to move into new public housing -we provided this and info on our no interest loans scheme to obtain other needed household items. One of the others is in a precarious financial situation facing rent increases. We provided additional furniture to another. One family is having difficulties coping with a number of issues (legal, health, employment, difficult neighbours) - we helped out with food; two others appear to be battling with instability issues and we will assist if and where we can. Some \$1000 of assistance was provided. We gave moral and pantry support to the others of our needy neighbours.

OLOS Vinnies keeps a pantry at the store in Victoria Avenue where food assistance can be provided to itinerants and those living on the streets and others with temporary lack of necessities..



BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

PRAYER IS KEY

On this Sunday we accompany Jesus up a mountain with three of his first-called disciples, Peter, John and James. The intention of Jesus' mountain-ascent, as Luke notes, is 'to pray'.

Luke locates this event at the beginning of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, where suffering and death await. This journey will occupy almost half the Gospel. The journey is one of instruction. Jesus instructs his disciples, Luke's audience and us on how to be authentic in a culture where status and materialism seduce. Prayer is key. Like the prophets of the First Testament, Jesus, the prophet, speaks truth and confronts compromised leadership. This will come at a high cost. Luke's Jesus knows this. The mountain is sacred, perceived as closer to the Heavens and God's abode. Jesus prays to God seeking discernment in what will unfold. This prayer, in which the disciples are also caught up, brings him into communion with two First Testament figures, Moses and Elijah, representatives of the Torah (Moses, whom Israelites believed inspired the first five books of the Bible) and the Prophets (Elijah). Their presence is Luke's reminder that God's loving accompaniment of and revelation to the Israelites continued through Jesus into Luke's day. This scene is helpful for our Lenten journey. Prayer, especially in times of struggle and the search for discernment, is key.

On Thursday night, 9 parishioners and friends of Our Lady of Sorrows joined Fr David in an Assembly of nearly 1000 people from churches and organisations all over Sydney urging political leaders to do more to address the current housing crisis in Sydney and the impacts of climate change.

The Assembly was organised by the Sydney Alliance of which our parish is a founding member. We heard people tell their stories which were so similar to those we hear from our Vinnies clients each week of how they can't afford to pay their energy bills and also buy the prescribed medications they need, or how they don't turn on the air conditioning in sweltering heat because they need the money for groceries.

Political leaders present were urged to do more for people on low incomes to help them avoid falling into homelessness, to ensure rental properties are insulated and damp-proof, to enable all to access solar energy and other protections against rising energy costs.

There was great energy in the Hall and an inspiring sense of solidarity between the many organisations and churches present.






