From Fr David

Dear friends,

Last Monday the ABC Religious Affairs department visited us at our Shrine of Hope for an interview on Carlo Acutis. The interview will be part of a larger presentation on Carlo Acutis to be aired at the time of his canonisaiton on 27 April. We are now on the 'countdown' to this important moment, and we are already preparing for the celebration. We have confirmed that **Cardinal Soane Patita Paini Mafi, Archbishop of Tonga, will join us for our Sunday 5.30pm Mass on 27 April**, along with Bishop Randazzo and many clergy. This last week, we have formed a joint school orchestra between Mercy and Pius X College students to lead us in the music for the occasion, along with our Parish Choir. And soon we will publish the full details of the week-long celebration. We pray that this will be an event that brings our whole community many blessings.

Carlo teaches us that holiness isn't about being flawless—it's about being faithful. Carlo embodied this truth. He believed everyone is called to be a saint, not by escaping the world but by transforming it through love. He made daily choices to serve God and others: helping those in need, defending the bullied, and treating everyone with kindness. His life reminds us that sanctity isn't reserved for the few—it's an invitation extended to all of us, here and now. Carlo wasn't perfect, but he was persistent. When he fell short, he didn't dwell in disappointment—he sought forgiveness in Confession and continued striving for virtue. His journey assures us that holiness remains possible even amid our failures, as long as we keep turning back to God. Sanctity seeks not those without flaws but those with the courage to begin again.. So let us ask ourselves, "What single step can I take today toward greater holiness?"

Our Parish, along with all other parishes in our Diocese of Broken Bay, are preparing to migrate to a new parish database. Our current one, called PACS, has come to the end of its life and our Diocese has engaged a partnership with the Archdiocese of Melbourne to bring each parish onto a new database called PACEM. This new database will provide our parish with much greater functionality for a range of ordinary operations such as with sacramental preparation records, and financial recording too. It will help us greatly with the support of our many pastoral associations too. As we might imagine, the task of migrating from one system to another is no small thing. However, it is a great opportunity to ensure our records are as accurate and as current as can be. To this end, we are conducting a Parish Census over the next few weeks. Please do complete the Census Card available in the pews of the church and leave it in one of the white boxes around the church. This will ensure that we are able to keep in contact with you, too. A QR code appears below if people would like to complete their details through this method.

This week, we have 72 children celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time, as part of their longer journey to celebrating the Eucharist for the first time in June. We have four liturgies for them on Tuesday and Thursday evenings this week. We keep them in our prayer with gratitude to God for their witness of the importance of this beautiful Sacrament of God's mercy.

For this occasion we will be joined by Cardinal Soane Patita Paini Mafi, Archbishop of Tonga.



The Diocesan Shrines of Hope Passport

The following is the step-by-step guideline for the *Broken Bay Pilgrim Passports*

1. Jubilee Passports can be stamped at each Shrine and the Cathedral to acknowledge visit and time of prayer within

A special downloadable <u>Broken Bay Jubilee Passport</u> <u>for Kids</u> for children to use when visiting the Shrines with their families/caregivers.

- 2. Once all three Shrines and Cathedral, with respective stamps, have been visited a Pilgrim's passport is "complete".
- 3. Pilgrims then have their passports verified at their own Parish office.
- 4. Each Parish will notify Mission Broken Bay with the names of those pilgrims who have completed their passports so that they may receive a special commemorative certificate signed by Bishop Anthony. This is a wonderful opportunity to highlight the Jubilee by presenting these certificates at the end of a Sunday Mass.

A live Tally on the www.bbjubilee.com.au website will add a further joyful essence, noting how many pilgrims have completed the Jubilee Shrines of Hope Pilgrimage and which parishes they are from.





The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. "This man' they said 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring

out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property - he and his women - you kill the calf we had been fattening."

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

GOD'S LAVISH DELIGHT

This Sunday's Gospel brings us to the very heart of Luke's teaching—forgiveness and God's delight in the return of the sinner. The Gospel's introduction sets the scene: Jesus attracts and dines with moral reprobates. Is this mirroring what's happening with Luke's householders as they gather for the Lord's Supper? Like Jesus, are they too being criticised by religious legislators?

Three parables follow. Our focus is on the third, the parable of two lost sons. Preachers often exclusively focus on the young son who demands his inheritance to leave the farm for a life of pleasure. The son is virtually treating his father as though dead when inheritances were usually bequeathed. He wants to completely cut family ties. We know what follows. The son's need to address his chronic hunger and loneliness sitting with Earth's most unclean creature, the pig, brings him to acknowledge his wrongdoing. He wants to return to his father's farm not as a son but as a hired hand.

The father's longing for his son's return is palpable and completely upturns social expectation. It reflects God's visceral response to the lost one who returns. The second older son is also lost. His adamant rejection of his younger brother's behaviour and his unwillingness to join the celebration of the brother's return flags an attitude circulating in Luke's world. The father's plea to this son for a change of heart is also a plea to the Gospel audience: Are we able to celebrate the joy of God's lavish delight over those we would prefer to exclude?







Stations of the Cross during Lent




