

GOSPEL REFLECTION

What is the meaning behind today's perplexing first Reading of God testing Abraham's faith by commanding him to sacrifice his innocent son, Isaac? Does it imply that moral principles hold no sway over us? This notion conflicts with the teachings throughout the Bible. Does it suggest that God is capricious, dictating actions solely to satisfy His whims? Such a portrayal contradicts the God depicted throughout scripture—a God of reason and justice. And is God testing Abraham because he doubts the strength of Abraham's faith and needs confirmation? This notion also contradicts the character of God portrayed elsewhere in the Bible. All these interpretations diverge from the overarching narrative of scripture. So, what, then, is the essence of this Reading?

The lesson isn't merely about God's unlimited power or authority. While God is indeed all-powerful, our reverence for Him stems from His inherent goodness. His power serves His goodness; it's not a case of "might makes right." This principle applies not only to God but also to us—our actions are measured against a higher moral standard, as emphasised by the prophets.

Nor is this a test for God to ascertain Abraham's faithfulness. God, with complete understanding and all-knowing, requires no such tests. Rather, it's Abraham who undergoes a journey of self-discovery, coming to understand both himself and the nature of God.

So, what then is the lesson? There are two facets to consider. The apparent lesson centres on unwavering trust and obedience. Abraham's faith is tested and proven, as he exhibits complete submission to God's will. However, this interpretation leaves unanswered questions about the nature of God and the broader implications for morality.

Contrary to first impressions, this Reading reveals God's abhorrence of human sacrifice, contrasting sharply with pagan practices of the time. It underscores the sanctity of human life—a revolutionary concept in an era when many cultures sanctioned human sacrifice. The idea that humanity is created in the image of God, with inherent dignity and worth, originates from this narrative.

In the Christian tradition, this story takes on an added layer of significance. The ram provided by God symbolizes the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who would atone for humanity's sins. Abraham's obedience anticipates Mary's "yes" to God's will, paving the way for our salvation.

Faith, then, transcends mere belief; it opens the door for divine intervention in our lives. Abraham's trust initiated the Jewish preparation for salvation, mirrored in the sacrificial lamb. Similarly, Mary's consent ushered in the fulfilment of salvation through the birth of Christ. Faith aligns us with God's will, leading to our redemption.

In conclusion, the story of Abraham and Isaac invites us to contemplate the depths of faith and obedience, while also revealing profound truths about the character of God and the sanctity of human life. It serves as a testament to the transformative power of faith and its pivotal role in our journey of salvation.

The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith.

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham' he called. 'Here I am' he replied. 'Take your son', God said 'your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

When they arrived at the place God had pointed out to him, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood. Then he stretched out his hand and seized the knife to kill his son.

But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven. 'Abraham, Abraham' he said. 'I am here' he replied. 'Do not raise your hand against the boy' the angel said. 'Do not harm him, for now I know you fear God. You have not refused me your son, your only son.' Then looking up, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. Abraham took the ram and offered it as a burnt-offering in place of his son.

The angel of the Lord called Abraham a second time from heaven. 'I swear by my own self – it is the Lord who speaks – because you have done this, because you have not refused me your son, your only son, I will shower blessings on you, I will make your descendants as many as the stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore. Your descendants shall gain possession of the

of their enemies. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'



This is my Son, the beloved; listen to him. Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes

became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi', he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah'. He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him'. Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what

'rising

from the dead' could mean. The Gospel of the Lord.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

THE GIFT OF **GOD'S OWN SON**

In the second week of Lent, we are taken to an encounter of God with Abraham where he is asked to sacrifice his son. This seems incomprehensible to us. Is this the ultimate sign of commitment or faithfulness to God? If it is a test, Abraham shows his fidelity but the sacrificing of Isaac doesn't happen. God spares Abraham's son. This reading is in direct confrontation with the second reading from Romans where "God did not spare God's own son." These words are stark and a testament to the faithfulness and compassion of God.

This invites our attention to the enormity of God's gift echoed in the words of Jesus: "God loved the world so much, he gave his only Son" (John 3:16). It is in this context that we embrace the transfiguration. This is the second occasion in Mark's Gospel where Jesus is revealed to be God's son.

In

light of the dazzling appearance of Jesus with Moses and Elijah and the voice from heaven, we see these disciples in fear. Occurring shortly after Jesus has revealed his fate, these leaders, Peter, James and John, witness this event and when it subsides and they go down the mountain, they are told not to say anything till the Son of Man has risen from the dead. This is baffling. They are distressed about what "rising from the dead" could mean. This insight into the community of Mark may also intersect with our own searchings. How do we understand God's gift in the death and resurrection of God's own son?

OLOD MEN, WE NEED YOU!

I joined our Vinnie's chapter at Chatswood this month and went to my first meeting. I was surprised that there were only 7 of us, 5 women and 2 men. I heard at the meeting how wonderfully generous our parish is in giving money to Vinnie's, especially at Christmas when a record amount was donated by parishioners. I listened to the stories of the people who are currently needing help from us and realised again how easily a person or a family's life can fall apart when they are living on the margins of society. I am keen to make my first visit soon with another member, Teresa, to a mother with a young boy who needs furniture and other help. But there was a snag. It seems there is a fellow who often stays with her and it is possible he will be there when we visit. As he has served time in prison, it was clear that a man would need to come along. Problem! One of the two male Vinnie's members is having to take leave for this year and the other is about to have knee surgery and will be unavailable for a few months. That will make it very difficult to help the people who depend on us. Sometimes it is not enough to give money, it seems. Sometimes Jesus asks more of us and this Lent is one of those times. One man, or two men, willing to join Vinnie's and support us women in the occasional necessary home visit is all that's needed for us to continue our support of Chatswood's desperate families. A LENTEN FAST

As Fr David announced last week, Our Lady of Dolours is now a registered Earthcare Parish, committed to 'hearing the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor' and changing our practices to better care for our common home, in accordance with Pope Francis's encyclical Laudato Si' and the call of the Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference. While we are getting started on an audit of where our parish currently sits in relation to our shared ecological responsibility, this Lent is an opportunity for us to join other parishes in observing a special Laudato Si' fast. The elements of a Laudato Si' fast as described by Pope Francis are to reconnect with Creation, become more aware of our environmental footprint, fast from those things which are damaging our common home and examine our attitudes and the way we live our lives for opportunities to simplify and to tread more lightly on the earth we share with all God's creatures. Each week of Lent, the Bulletin will have a different suggestion. For the week ahead, the theme is 'the interconnectedness of creation'. In Laudato si', Pope Francis writes that 'human life is grounded in three fundamental and closely intertwined relationships: with God, with our neighbour and with the earth itself'. The Bible's creation stories in the Book of Genesis describe the earth as a shared inheritance whose fruits are meant to benefit every person and every organism. In this first full week of Lent, we reconnect with nature by seeking opportunities to marvel at the unfurling of a fern frond or the skill of a spider making its web. Instead of using the car, we make time to walk with our children on their way to school or stop off at a park on our trip home from the supermarket.
