Dear friends.

Our special thoughts go to Angela Estaban this weekend. Angela farewelled her husband Artemio Farol last Friday morning from our church. We extend to Angela and her family our deepest sympathy and the assurance of our prayer at this sad time. Eternal rest grant unto Aretmio, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.

As I shared last weekend. we have continued to progress the reconfiguration of our parish staffing. I am pleased to share with you that we have created now two new positions in our parish team:

1. Manager of Parish Operations

2. Parish Support Officer

In so doing, I am very happy to share with you that I have appointed Olivia Lee to the position of Manager of Parish Operations. Olivia will bring her set of skills already well known and valued by us to this new role. She will take forward many of her current responsibilities such as Communication, Asset Management, and Liaison with parish ministry leaders and groups, and combine these now with more general oversight of our parish's operations. I am confident that Olivia will exercise her new role with much dedication, energy and professionalism.

Taking up Olivia's former role (somewhat amended) in the front office will be Carol Langley. Carol is not unknown to us as she acted as Temp in our Parish Office for some days earlier in the year. Carol hails from Manly. Shas a PhD in Theatre (UNSW), Master of Arts in Theatre (UNSW) and a Bachelor of Science (Sydney). She is a published author, writer and tutor, particularly in French and Hebrew. After pursuing a career in information technology, Carol established a marketing services company, and since then, has worked as a freelance writer on corporate contracts and on personal projects. Carol enjoyed her time so much with us earlier, that she is delighted to be back with us in this full time capacity.

These two new positions commence on Monday 22 May. Together with those who have more recently joined us - our wonderful Administration Assistant, Chloe Aylward, our brilliant new Director of Music, Titus Grenyer and our very dedicated CCD Coordinator, Karen Forbes - we have much look forward to as we continue our journey Being Church in the City. Please join with me in wishing Olivia and Carol the very best in this new chapter for our parish office team.

We continue through until June our Pastoral Works Broken Bay Appeal, the pastoral charity of our Diocese of Broken Bay. Our Pastoral works are at the forefront of our community, serving those in need, helping to rebuild and renew families and parish communities and introducing our children in state schools to the wonder and beauty of our faith. The appeal mainly supports two key Diocesan ministries which get little or no government funding. They are:

• The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) – around 650 volunteer catechists taking the Gospel

to approximately 14,000 state school children during the school terms. CCD provides a large range of online resources for the students plus newsletters, training, and workshops for the volunteers.

• Hospital Chaplaincy & Pastoral Care Program – again Chaplain and care practitioners visit more than 3,000 individual hospital patients each year. Some are end-of-life patients, many may feel isolated, lonely or fearful; others will recover but are grateful to receive the sacraments; while some are parents trying to come to terms with very sick children or babies. There are probably many amongst us who have or are facing similar circumstances and are very aware of the time, care and attention offered by this ministry.

Funds raised during the appeal go directly to these ministries. It is a difficult time to be asking people to be generous. We are all facing cost-of-living challenges in many ways. However, our support and generosity are vitally important. It has made a huge difference in the past to many people. All donations over \$2 are tax deductable. These donations contribute to our Parish target. Our own Parish is committed to raising some \$70,000 annually for the Appeal, and by the end of June we have some \$40,000 remaining to raise. Everyone's gift makes a difference.

Recently, we have had cameras and systems installed in our church to provide us with a very professional capacity for live-streaming. Though most people have now re-joined us (last weekend we had over 1200 people join us for our Masses), our capacity to broadcast will ensure our outreach even further – across the world! The capacity gives us opportunity, especially, for significant events – such as School Graduations – and also for weddings and funerals. The equipment, software, and systems now installed are 'state-of-the-art' with remarkable functionality to make the experience of watching what is livestreamed very professional and first class. The operating system is now in the corner of the choir loft. And now we are looking for operators! Might there be people who would be interested in becoming first class operators of the cameras and film makers? This is something open to people of all ages! It may be, however that some senior students, in particular, would really enjoy engaging this ministry? If anyone is excited and interested by this possibility, do let me or Olivia in our parish office know, and we will arrange training with Ben Thrum, our sound engineer who has installed the system for us and to whom we are very grateful.

We look forward to next weekend, the celebration of the Feast of Pentecost which brings to a close the Season of Easter. It is the great Amen to what we actually began 90 days ago at Ash Wednesday. The ash placed then on our foreheads has become the fire of the Spirit inflaming our hearts and minds. It will be a great moment to share our Parish Mission which is now been discerned through the remarkable engagement of so many people. This we will do through a special Pastoral Letter to our community which I have written for next weekend.

During masses last weekend we were invited to discern between three shortlisted, potential parish mission statements. An incredible 546 parishioners responded, and based on this discernment, Fr. David will be announcing our adopted parish mission statement at Pentecost next weekend.

In recent weeks we have also been sharing parishioner responses to the question, what is the primary purpose God is calling us to focus on as a parish mission?

Here is a further selection of our responses...

"To bring more people into our church. To build on the faith of existing members. Help it become more meaningful. To keep children in our church after receiving the sacraments and into adulthood until eventually bringing their own families to church."

"Showing our ways of life as we follow the teaching of Christ."

"To be a light in a secular and satanic world. To stand against evil such as - beliefs that are against Jesus."

"To help each other, for us to feel safe and welcome."

"To love God as we love one another."

"Discern what we can offer and help with."

"To support our wonderful church, Our Lady of Dolours, our Priests and to give thanks to God for all the daily good things, to pray for our families, to support one another and to pray for one another, and to give all we can for charity and to be most importantly have a place of worship."

"To form communities so that we may be the place where they can communicate which each other and between each other. So that they may be of service and focus on helping and understanding each other so as to reduce the polarisation in our community. When we stop talking to each other we stop understanding and having the capacity to accept that yes, we are different but that this means we all have different gifts to offer each other and God." "To pray for each other. In this busy society there's no time for people to think or listen to each other. So, we need to pray for those who need comfort."

"To cultivate hope, faith, peace and joy."

"Outreach - evangelisation."

"To grow our faith and spread the word of God in the community."

"Helping sharing others with love."

"To evangelise, to spread the Good News to those yet to know Jesus."

"To gather together and as one to do Jesus' work of spreading the word of God and to help those who need it the most."

"To love one another in fellowship. To care for and keep our eyes on one another so God's two commandments are fulfilled - 1. love God, 2. Love your neighbour."

"To enter the lives of those around our church so they can experience, through knowing the glory and freedom and knowing Jesus. But first we must know them - not stay locked in our pews everyday only knowing each other."

"To care for those who need help and nourishment - to teach and love. To make opportunities to train and serve one another."

"To support existing members and recruit more members."

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Only Luke separates out resurrection, ascension, and giving of the Spirit over a fifty-day period. The clear implication in John's Gospel is that the Spirit is given on the day of the resurrection and that the ascension has occurred around the same time since, one week later, Jesus invites Thomas to touch him —something that Mary of Magdala had been forbidden one week earlier because the ascension had not yet occurred. In essence they are all different dimensions of the one reality, and the church, in following Luke's chronology, allows us to reflect on this one reality over fifty days in all its richly different aspects.

In Matthew's Gospel what is interesting is that we have the account of the women at the tomb (Matt 28:1-10), the account we proclaimed at the Easter Vigil, where the angel tells them not to be afraid and instructs them to tell the disciples of Jesus' having been raised and instructs them to go to Galilee. On the way to tell the disciples, the women see Jesus, who also tells them not to be afraid. The encounter between the women and the disciples is not described, and what we hear from the very last lines of the gospel, which we have just heard, is that the disciples are in Galilee. When Jesus appears some hesitate to recognise him.

We have a homily preached by Leo the Great, bishop of Rome between 440 and 461, on this solemn feast early in his episcopate, in 444. Leo saw the hesitancy of some of the disciples having a spiritual significance. His explanation was that it was for our benefit:

The Spirit of Truth would by no means have permitted this hesitation, wavering in human weakness, to enter the hearts of his preachers, if their trembling anxiety and questioning delay were not to have established the foundations of our faith. Consequently, it was our doubts, our danger, that was being considered in the apostles. We, in the guise of the apostles, were being instructed against the slanders of the wicked and the proofs of earthly wisdom. Their 'seeing' instructed us, their 'hearing' informed us, their 'touching' strengthened us. Let us give thanks for the divine plan and the necessary 'slowness' of the Holy Fathers [the apostles]. They 'doubted' so that we need not doubt. (Sermo 73)

In Matthew's Gospel, the ascension is the moment of the great commissioning. To be a disciple is to be sent into the world to bear witness to the resurrection, to be a messenger of the good news of hope and promise and of the victory of life over death and of love over sin. We hear no more about the fear of the disciples after this. This is the paradox of Christianity: the one who was dead is alive, the one who has gone remains with us, those who fail are forgiven, those who fear are fortified. This is the mystery of faith, this is the hope God's call holds for us. Would that we allow the eyes of our minds to be enlightened by this promise of the rich glories we are to inherit.

These rich glories are beyond our wildest dreams. Leo the Great concluded that the promise of the ascension is not that we shall be restored to the paradise of our first parents, but we shall be raised to the heights of heaven itself and dwell in the very presence of God:

Since the ascension of Christ is our elevation, and since, where the glory of the head has preceded us, there hope for the body is also invited, let us exult, dearly beloved, with worthy joy and be glad with a holy thanksgiving. Today we are established not only as possessors of paradise, but we have even penetrated the heights of the heavens in Christ. (Sermo 73)

In our eucharist we are thankful that the Christ who has left us is still present with us in the bread that is his body and the wine that is his blood. We share in this meal that we may share in the triumph of life over death, in the triumph of love over death. We are an Easter people and alleluia is our song.

LAUDATO SI' WEEK & NATIONAL RECONCILIATION WEEK

This week we continue the celebration of Laudato Si' Week and welcome the start of National Reconciliation Week - two very important representations of Catholic Social Teaching: care for God's creation, and Solidarity.

This week is a great opportunity to consider how as a community, and as individuals, we can take steps to contribute positively to greater respect for the Earth and for our Aboriginal brothers and sisters.

INDIGENOUS

There is a deep interconnection between the health of Country and the health of Indigenous people.

As Indigenous peoples' lands and seas are returned to their care, so are cultural management practices.

Land rights and native title have enabled recognition of some Indigenous rights across 57% of Australia's lands

Indigenous Protected Areas (IPAs) are growing and make up nearly half of Australia's National Reserve System, delivering multiple conservation, socioeconomic and cultural benefits.

Indigenous-led and governed caring for Country, undertaken via holistic and long-term programs, is key to future success.

It needs to be said that, generally speaking, there is little in the way of clear awareness of problems which especially affect the excluded. Yet they are the majority of the planet's population, billions of people. These days, they are mentioned in international political and economic discussions, but one often has the impression that their problems are brought up as an afterthought, a question which gets added almost out of duty or in a tangential way, if not treated merely as collateral damage. Indeed, when all is said and done, they frequently remain at the bottom of the pile. This is due partly to the fact that many professionals, opinion makers, communications media and centres of power, being located in affluent urban areas, are far removed from the poor, with little direct contact with their problems. They live and reason from the comfortable position of a high level of development and a quality of life well beyond the reach of the majority of the world's population. This lack of physical contact and encounter, encouraged at times by the disintegration of our cities, can lead to a numbing of conscience and to tendentious analyses which neglect parts of reality. At times this attitude exists side by side with a "green" rhetoric. Today, however, we have to realize that a true ecological approach always becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor.

REFLECTIONS

Are you aware of any Indigenous communities whose land and culture have been affected by economic activity such as mining or environmental threats such as climate change?

How might getting to know local First Nations people and talking with them about caring for country make a difference for the environment and for First Nations peoples themselves?



Attend a National Reconciliation Week event in your local community and continue to nurture relationships with local elders and communities and talk to them about caring for country: Catholic Social Services Victoria and Catholic Social Services Australia are offering a three-part webinar series on this year's Voice to Parliament referendum.

The Indigenous Voice to Parliament: Moments for healing this country event will bring together a range of speakers on this important topic. On May 25, Professor Melissa Castan will explore questions including: What is the history surrounding the referendum? Should First Nations people have a Voice in Parliament? Why is it being proposed as an adaption to the Australian Constitution?

The second webinar on June 29 will be given by Fr Frank Brennan SJ, who will look at how the Church has engaged in Aboriginal affairs, and why Catholics should take serious interest in the referendum.

The final session on July 27 will feature three different voices of First Nations peoples who will consider what the Voice means for them, for their communities and for Australia.
