On Thursday 7th February we celebrated our monthly Healing Mass at St Gerard's. Afterwards we enjoyed a cuppa, and said 'farewell' to Jan Doherty, who is moving out of the parish. We shall miss you Jan!

**How happy are you who are poor: yours is the kingdom of God.  
But alas for you who are rich: you are having your consolation now.**

In the Gospel today we hear Luke outline beatitudes and woes. How do we understand poor and rich? This is difficult, because the average Australian is the wealthiest citizen of all the country in the world! Or is there something more to the words that Jesus means by contrasting poor and rich? How would you explain what Jesus meant? A few thoughts:

The poor are desperate, without what is essential for security. They know they depend on God and on others and they live out their life for others. A priest visiting Christmas Island detention centre, said everyone came to the Easter liturgy, for everyone was praying and hoping for help. Can you think of an example in your life? Is it one you can share?

The rich for Jesus are those are those who focus on personally 'having it all'. They change the attitude of "mind over matter" to mean 'I don't mind and you don't matter'. They strive to acquire and to dispossess. Their attitude is that they act as though, 'who they are' is 'what they have'. Their wealth without responsibilities, their power over. Their success is without a sense of ever having received or been gifted by someone greater than themselves.

We usually have a foot in both being poor and feeling bad about it and being rich and feeling wishful for more wealth. We are conflicted. (If only we won Lotto our problems would end! If only this, or if only that..)

How do you understand what Jesus meant by *Happy you Poor* and *Alas for you Rich*? This could lead to a great conversation. If you are poor, where are you experiencing this *Kingdom of God* and if rich, where are you experiencing this *consolation now*?

Our Lenten challenge is to review our current attitudes. Let Jesus enlighten and guide us to live by the Be-attitudes. We can also avoid some woeful consequences from the wrong attitudes.

We hear St Paul state the fact that makes all the difference to our lives.

*Christ has been raised from the dead.*  
Our belief and our hope in Christ is "We too will be raised from the dead!"

*If our hope in Christ has been for this life only, we are the most unfortunate of all people.*

Paul sees life differently. For him, what matters most is an eternal perspective, a hope for the everlasting life of being in love and being with all those you have loved and been loved by. This is life for eternity with God, *Who is Love*.

Look around. Say hello and greet them with the sign of peace. We are looking forward to being raised from the dead. See if you could get to know them in this life, in a Lenten group!

## Reflection on this Sunday's Gospel Reading—Happy are You

"The glass is either half empty ...

... or broken," said a discouraged detective in one of Jonathan Kellermann's mystery novels.

The beatitudes Jesus proclaims this Sunday seem for all the world like the broken option. Blessed are those who are poor, hungry, weeping, hated, excluded, insulted, and denounced. Are these really beatitudes?

What is a beatitude supposed to be, anyway?

They were an ancient formula for encouraging people to do good. For instance, in this week's Responsorial Psalm, which is the first psalm in the bible, we read, "Blessed is the one who does not take the wicked for his guide, nor walks the road that sinners tread."

Blessed are you if you stay empty, if you become a spacious home for God, for other human beings, for the long-suffering earth.

And Psalm 41 says, "Happy those concerned for the lowly and poor; when misfortune strikes, the Lord delivers them. ... " Jeremiah 17 has "Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord . . . , he is like a tree planted [next to] water that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green."

Beatitudes are numerous and beautiful in the Old Testament. They all say this: if you do a particular thing, you will receive blessings. Beatitudes were consolations, helping their hearers to be good persons.

But Jesus seems to have reversed the idea. Blessed are you if you do the deed of suffering.

Wait, Lord, what do you mean? I am supposed to seek to be penniless and sorrowful and in pain? Why would you want me to be in such a terrible state?

There have been many opinions on this. But your author has his own guess.

A person has to be open and empty in order to let God and others come in. If we want to love and be loved we need to have space at the center of who we are. And then goodness will come in.

Consider a rich person who "has everything." Isn't he tempted to let his possessions define who he is? "Attack my property and you attack me," he might say. Possessions become an "instead of." Instead of love I choose something more stable [so it looks]: cars or boats or corporations or just plain power. Instead of eating only what I need, each North American who goes to a restaurant can eat enough for five people! Would you like another order of French fries, the waiter asks after we have already finished a steak the size of a serving plate and a quadruple order of fries.

Yet the principle running through all the beatitudes is this: you are blessed if you don't cram yourself full. Full of food, drink, pride, drugs, fame, sex, visits to the beach, stunning hair-do's, flattest abs, shiny teeth, fast cars, every kind of wealth, and of course reputation. Instead, blessed are you if you stay empty, if you become a spacious home for God, for other human beings, for the long-suffering earth.

We are built to be quiet receivers, people who know they are empty and yet are patient. There is only one reality, only one Being who can give us the bread of life, who can satisfy our deep hunger for love. Don't you want to welcome it into your soul instead of flying around at fastest pace having fun fun fun?

Blessed are you if you let go into his arms.

**Children's Liturgy of the Word - 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Children's Liturgy (Kidz Word) is an age-appropriate Liturgy of the Word offered at the 9:30am Sunday Mass at Carlingford and the 10:15am Mass at Epping during school terms. The presiding Priest calls forward the authorised adult leaders and children just after the Collect (Opening Prayer) and the children are invited to go with the leaders to the parish meeting room.

**Catechist Corner**

Jesus said, "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matt 19:14)

Being a scripture teacher was never in my post-retirement bucket list. When my friend told me there was a need for people teaching scripture in state schools, I had no thought of trying this uncharted territory. I reckoned there were several reasons. Although I have migrated from Hong Kong more than 25 years, my Hong Kong English accent still puzzled many local speakers. Being in my own profession over three decades, I had provided training and mentoring to my co-workers and team members. But I could hardly identify any related experience of teaching in a school, especially for young kids. Nevertheless when my friend showed me a flyer about CCDMI Program, its topics and contents caught my eyes. The 14-module program was literally addressing the skill I regarded I was missing. Next I found myself registering to the level one program and, after a few months, working together with my friend as a scripture teacher.

It was still vivid experience in my first few lessons. To lessen my fear, every time before entering the classroom, I would say a prayer usually about something like 'there would be no big drama' or 'I could remember what to say and do and finish my planned lesson smoothly'. Some of my prayers were answered while some were not. When I was upset, I recalled the advice from my fellow scripture teachers - that there were good times as well as bad times but we were there to sow the seeds and let God to do the rest. So far, it has been my stress reliever and spiritual encouragement!

In my first year, I was very much focusing on my plan. For example, I must first set up the sacred place, then to have an opening prayer, next to do a roll call, to help every child finish their worksheets, and most importantly to keep lesson finished on time. Day after days, I found my students were getting bored. I then asked for tips and techniques from my fellow scripture teachers. Through their enlightenment, I could always find some creative and useful ideas. When I saw the happy joyful faces which told me they enjoy the lesson, all my effort has paid off. With hindsight, I was in fact learning in conjunction with my students I taught.

After three years as a scripture teacher, I treasured the opportunity for each lesson I delivered. I am most grateful to my fellow scripture teachers. They have helped me through these years. One thing I reckon to be very precious is the friendship cultivated in the team. The sense of community is a force that drives us forward. Everyone is working generously with a great heart. The willingness to give and share in the team has told me that Holy Spirit is there amongst us.
