Greetings everyone!

As I have said to some of you this past week, while I am 'physically' back in the parish, I'm not quite sure about the rest of me!...two and a half months away and given the wonderful varied and challenging experiences which I have had during that time, does require a bit more 'adjustment' than I Anticipated. Still, I can honestly say it is good to be home! Please be patient as I settle back into parish life and continue to reflect and process my experiences and time away over recent months.

Also, some of you may be anticipating (even hoping) for a run of 'travelogue' homilies over coming weeks. I'm sorry to disappoint you but my intention is to gradually share the fruits of my sabbatical, when appropriate, as time progresses.

Finally, like many of you, I continue to be deeply saddened and guttered by the ongoing fallout of child sexual abuse at the hands of clergy and senior officials within the Catholic Church in particular. This week Cardinal Pell lost his appeal against his conviction for historic child abuse offences. It is essential we respect the legal processes and their outcome, whether we personally agree or not with the decision. Most importantly, while we certainly pray for Cardinal Pell, our thoughts outreach and prayers must firstly be directed to all those who have been so greatly wounded by the crime of sexual abuse, particularly from our own community of faith.

I am aware that within our parish and the wider community our reactions to this outcome will be diverse and complex. For some, this case has reopened existing wounds and past traumas.

Along with other church leaders I want to reiterate my support to the victims of abuse and to all who are hurting. Should anyone wish to come and speak personally with me in coming days I will definitely make myself available. Please contact me either in person, by email or phone to make an appointment.

Let us care for one another and remember we must answer the inevitable questions put to us by the sad circumstances of this week as Fr David Ranson, our Diocesan Administrator said on a previous occasion, "with humility, integrity and courage, such that a new sense of purpose might motivate and guide us into the future, not with stoic resignation, but with Christian hope. In this way, this dreadful moment in the life of our Church in Australia can act to purify and clarify our own discipleship".

- Q One of the prayers in the baptismal rite says that we have become "a member of Christ who is Priest, Prophet and King." How do Christ's members act as priests, prophets and
- A In Baptism, we are called to be like Christ to act as "priests, prophets and kings" in the world (*Rite of Baptism for Children, 62*). It sounds impossible.

But what does a priest do?

He intercedes with God on behalf of the community. The royal priesthood of the baptised, to which we belong, does the same – offering worship to God and interceding for the world in prayer.

What do prophets do?

They speak out, proclaiming God's will for the world. We do the same when faith motivates us to speak out for the oppressed and to live in a way that shows others what the Gospel means.

And what are kings?

They are those chosen by God to serve. In Baptism, we are chosen, anointed and sent to follow Christ's example of leadership through service. changes everything.

Reflection on this Sunday's Gospel -The Agony in the Garden—The Place Where Angels Strengthen Us

Trevor Herriot writes: "Only after we have let the desert do its full work in us will angels finally come and minister to

That's one of the lessons of Gethsemane. It's only after the deserts of loneliness, duty, and helplessness have done their work in Jesus that "an angel from heaven came and ministered to him." A unique thing can happen to us when we are overwhelmed. When the burden of self-sacrifice prostrates us in weakness and leaves us sweating blood, it's then that God's strength can flow into us most deeply. Many people have experienced this.

Jesus gets up off the ground and walks with awaits him.

Martin Luther King, for example, recounts his own Agony in the Garden and the angel that came to strengthen him:

One night toward the end of January, I settled into bed late, after a strenuous day. Coretta had courage to face already fallen asleep and just as I was about to doze off the telephone rang. An angry voice said, the ordeal that 'Listen, nigger, we've taken all we want from you, before next week you'll be sorry you ever came to Montgomery.' I hang up, but I couldn't sleep. It seemed that all of my fears had come down on me at once. I had reached a saturation point. I got out of bed and began to walk the floor. Finally

I went to the kitchen and heated a pot of coffee. I was ready to give up. With my cup of coffee sitting untouched before me I tried to think of a way to move out of the picture without appearing a coward.

In this state of exhaustion, when my courage had all but gone, I decided to take my problem to God. With my head in my hands, I bowed over the kitchen table and prayed aloud. The words I spoke to God that midnight are still vivid in my memory:

 $^{\circ}$ I am here taking a stand for what I believe is right. But now I am afraid. The people are looking to me for leadership, and if I stand before them without strength and courage, they too will falter. I am at the end of my powers. I have nothing left. I've come to the point where I can't face it alone.'

At that moment I experienced the presence of the Divine as I had never experienced him before.

The parallel to Jesus in Gethsemane is so obvious that it's superfluous to elaborate on it. God sends angels to strengthen us precisely when God finds us lying prostrate, sweating the blood of duty. Moreover that particular kind of sweat does something else for us as well.

In the Gethsemane accounts we're told that, right after being strengthened by an angel, Jesus gets up off the ground and walks with courage to face the ordeal that awaits him. His agony and the strengthening he receives within it, readied him for the pain that lay ahead. Indeed, at the time of Jesus, the word "agony" had a double sense: Beyond its more obvious meaning, it also referred to a particular "readying" that an athlete would do just before entering the arena or stadium. The athlete would ready himself (in those days the athlete normally was a he) for the contest by working up a certain sweat (agony) with the idea that this exercise and the lather it produced would concentrate and make ready both his energies and muscles for the rigours that lay ahead. No athlete wants to enter the contest unprepared, unready.

The gospel writers want us to have this same image of Jesus as he leaves the Garden of Gethsemane: his agony has brought about a certain emotional, physical, and spiritual lather so that he is now readied, a focused athlete, properly prepared to enter the battle. Moreover, because of his strengthening he brings a certain divine energy, he is indeed more ready than any athlete.

Christina Crawford, writing about a low time in her life, once commented: "Lost is a place too!" Indeed, biblically, it's a very important place. It's the place where angels can come and minister to us and it's the place that readies us for spiritual battle. When our own strength gives out, when the pain of duty seems too much, when we lie prostrate in weakness and cringe before what truth, justice, and God seem to be asking of us, when we've come to the point where, like Martin Luther King, we can no longer face it alone, we're finally at that place where angels can minister to us and we've finally worked up the spiritual lather that has readied our souls and bodies for the Good Fridays that await us all.

Certain things, Trevor Herriot suggests, can only happen in gardens and deserts:

How long, covered in the sackcloth of grass, thorn and sky, before our desires and illusions fall to intimations of communion; before edges dissolve and we comprehend the mystic's dream of union beyond all boundaries and distinc-

Confirmation 2019

This weekend, the children will be presented with the Creed at all weekend Masses. During the sessions, we explained to the children what it means to be receiving the Creed, what they are saying 'Yes!' to, and by professing their faith, they are saying 'I believe'! Please keep these children and their families in your prayers as they continue on this journey to learn more about our beautiful faith.

Time flies, as we move into Session 3 this week – Life in the Spirit. We help the children understand what spiritual growth means by talking about the Holy Spirit, how their love and their faith can grow. God plants seeds in their hearts so they can grow to become people who love greatly and learn to trust in God even when things are difficult. We discuss the Parable of the Mustard Seed and the Parable of the Sower. 



Read a chapter a day of Letters written by the Apostles

Peter I: The Context

Peter I is a wonderful letter. It is easy to understand and gives us strength at the times when we need it. It's a great letter to read regularly.

It is a letter written by St Peter to Christian communities in the lands that are now part of Western Turkey. The letter was given to a faithful friend (named Silvanus) who travelled to many Christian communities where he shared the letter, where they copied it and further distributed to neighbouring Christian communities.

Peter wrote the letter from Rome. At the time, Rome, as the capital of the world's most powerful empire had become an immoral place. It became known as 'Babylon', because it reminded people with Jewish backgrounds of the ancient city of Babylon, a city famous for its vices and decadence.

It was written about 62-64 A.D, while the Emperor Nero ruled. At the time, things were starting to become very difficult for Christians (it was around the time of the start of the great persecution when large numbers of Christians were first martyred in the arenas). Peter was writing to the Christian communities to strengthen them for the ordeals that were coming.

The letter shows that more than 30 years after the Pentecost the Holy Spirit was still working through Peter, strengthening him and guiding him as he continued to lead people to Jesus. The beauty of the letter is that it is the words of St Peter encouraging his readers to be holy in all they do, because as Christians their lives now must be different from those times when they weren't Christian. They must live in a way that shows that their lives are dedicated to God.

Peter's letter is rich in detail about how we can live a more deeply Christian life.

Peter advises that sufferings to Christians will come, just as Jesus suffered, and it must be expected. If we read Peter closely we can hear him encouraging his readers — including us - to draw closer to God by deepening trust, obedience and patience through the periods of suffering.

Peter 2

Peter 2 is a very different letter to Peter 1. Peter 2 shares a deal in common with Jude's epistle, and it is possible that Peter may have been alerted to the problem he addresses in his letter by Jude's epistle. It seems most likely to have been written by Peter (or the key ideas dictated by Peter) in Rome shortly before his death around 65 AD. The intended readers were likely to be those of Peter I; the Christian communities in Asia Minor.

We see Peter in the First Epistle strengthening the faith of his readers during a time of persecution, while in the Second Epistle he sought to help Christians recognise and reject false teachers who were causing considerable harm to the Churches. Peter states his concern for his readers in the Second Epistle as he explains that he wrote both "as reminders to stimulate you to wholesome thinking" (2 Peter 3:2). Both Epistles show how deeply Peter took to the task that Jesus placed upon his shoulders of building the Church.

The Christians of Asia Minor (modern Turkey), the majority of whom were converted Gentiles rather than Jews. Their religious backgrounds prior to becoming Christians were a multitude of polytheistic cults and pagan sects, all of whom had ideas and behaviours that were very different to those that the Jewish-Christian worldview brought.

False teachers, heretics and deceivers were spreading messages denying the Second Coming of Christ. They were saying that because Jesus hadn't come yet (it was about 30 years after his resurrection) he wasn't going to come at all. This led to their trying to introduce a debased morality on that grounds that without Jesus' second coming there wasn't going to be a judgement, and so why shouldn't people live immoral lives without fear of any repercussions.

Peter wrote to the Christian communities and stressed that he personally had seen the glory and power of Jesus in the Transfiguration and that we can fully depend upon His promises. He warns of what awaits those who reject or turn from God, but assures those of God's steadfast loyalty to those who remain true to Him. "Be on your guard" he urges "so that you may not be carried away by the error of lawlessness [departing from Jesus' teachings] and fall from your secure position." (2 Peter 3:17).

Peter's urgings to cultivate **wholesome thinking** is most certainly as relevant for us today as it was for his contemporary readers.
