Dear Parishioners,

We continue to live in lockdown until July 30th, and we know that lockdown or tight restrictions may continue beyond this time too. We cannot just hold our breath and hope that it will be over, rather we need to adjust our lives to the present circumstances, and try to find the good and the new opportunities which may emerge. You'll see in this bulletin some opportunities to gather in small groups for discussion and prayer, and to gather with the wider parish for prayer and worship.

You'll also read of some work which has been continuing in the parish, behind the scenes, to keep us moving forward.

For many of us there is a deep longing for the community of the Church, and of taking part in the Eucharist. I invite you to think about the Eucharist as being like protein. Vitamin C is a nutrient which our bodies cannot store, and it gets flushed from our bodies, so we need to have it daily. The protein we eat, by comparison, becomes part of us, woven into every cell of our bodies, and so even when we are deprived of protein for a time, we can continue to be healthy and strong, because we have been built up by the protein we have eaten before. So too, we are built up, spiritually and emotionally by our regular sharing in the Eucharist, and even though it may yet be some time until we can again share Eucharist together, we can draw from the spiritual nourishment which we have already received, and remain strong because of it. – Fr Jim

Senior Servers and Communion Ministers: Fr Jim has appointed Anthony O'Reilly as coordinator of Senior Servers and Communion Ministers at St Gerard's. Anthony will liaise with existing servers and ministers, as well as inducting and training new servers and ministers. With this role established, we will return to having two senior servers rostered at each Mass at St Gerard's.

Denis McNamara: You might notice that Denis McNamara's name is not on the listing of parish staff on the bulletin this week. Denis will be returning to continue his great work of encouraging missionary discipleship, but is at present taking a well earned break with his wife Maureen. Denis will continue his role but in a different format, coming on board twice for two blocks of time each year to offer two faith formation programs. He will be leading Unlocking the Mysteries of the Bible in October.

Youth-led Mass: Recently the Parish Pastoral Council announced that as part of the pastoral plan, we have discerned to start a new youth Mass on Sunday nights at St Gerard's. At present our Antioch youth group meet at St Gerard's 3 out of 4 Sunday nights of the month. It makes sense that the youth Mass and youth group be positioned so that one flows into the other, and in any other time we could look to move the Antioch meeting to OLHC each Sunday to connect with the Sunday night Mass. With the redevelopment of the OLHC site starting next year however, there will be no opportunity for any post-Mass gatherings, which raises the possibility of instead starting a Sunday night Mass at St Gerard's. Further reflection noted that there is a strong cohort of senior primary school students at St Gerard's who would likely connect to a Sunday night Mass there, as well as our catechist outreach to three state high schools: Cheltenham Girls High, Carlingford High and James Ruse High. With the decision to move forward with planning for a new Mass, Mt St Benedict College and Marist College Eastwood have also expressed interest in having an involvement with this Mass. We can now announce that we will commence a 5pm Sunday night Mass at St Gerard's starting October 17th. This will be a Mass, like any other, for the whole parish, and it will be youth-led, in that the ministries will be mostly led by teenagers, young adults and their families. Sunday night Mass will continue at OLHC Epping.

St Gerard's Statue: Around ten years ago the statue of St Gerard Majella which was previously inside St Gerard's Church was moved outside as part of a memorial wall on the eastern side of the church. Although a small canopy was constructed over it, it has deteriorated in the weather. Fr Bogdan has taken it down to clean it, and proposes to then move it to the front of the church where it will be under cover and be illuminated. Parish Logo: In the coming months design work for the new buildings at Epping is continuing. Signage will be part of this design, which gives us the opportunity to think about creating a logo for the parish, other than the sketches of the two churches which is on our letterhead. Earlier this year a parishioner Chloe, offered the logo which you see here. It incorporates the Cross, with the letters "E" and "C" for Epping and Carlingford gathered around the Cross. The rays from the centre remind us of a monstrance, making the Eucharist visible to us for worship. Fr Jim would like your feedback about this as a possible logo to be adopted by the parish for official signage and communications — jim@eppcarl.org.au

Parish Forum: With the uncertainty of the current Covid-19 lockdown and how long it may last, the Parish Forum scheduled for 19 August to provide you an update on the OLHC, Epping development project will now be postponed to the end of September, in the hope we may be able to gather in person at that time. Should we still not be able to meet in person come the end of September, we will host the information sharing session with you via zoom instead. This delayed timing will be better as it relates to the project update and particulars I can provide with you at that time including the project timelines, appointment of the builder, parish and school relocation, as well as the opportunity to share with you the outcome of the detailed design work – the renders and drawings of the interior and exteriors for the new parish facilities. I will advise the new parish forum date in the coming weeks – Fr Jim McKeon

NATIONAL HOMELESSNESS WEEK, 1-7 AUGUST 2021

On any given night, 116,000 people in Australia are experiencing homelessness, which is not "rooflessness'. Only 70% of people without a home are sleeping rough. The vast majority of homelessness is hidden—people in crisis accommodation, rooming houses, insecure housing, overcrowded dwellings, or couch surfing. A home means security, stability, privacy, safety, and being able to control your space.

During Homelessness Week, one practical way you can help is by making an online donation to Catholic Care's **"Shout a Mate a \$6 plate'** fundraiser for Mary Mac's Place. The link to the website is:

Mary Mac's was commenced by parishioners of St John the Baptist Church, Woy Woy, and the work has continued through Catholic Care, supported by many volunteers.

Mary Mac's is open to anyone who is homeless, transient or needing a helping hand. Mary Mac's traditionally supplies a sit down meal served to our companions by our wonderful volunteers. Currently we are offering a takeaway meal due to lockdown restrictions. But it's more than just a place to get a meal—it provides connection, value and belonging without judgement.

Mary Mac's offers a place to shower and to wash clothes. We offer friendly support to address the experience of isolation and loneliness of some vulnerable people in our community. Mary Mac's can provide a pathway to other services like Legal Aid, homelessness support services and health assistance. With assistance from our community partners, a selection of food is available daily as a take home for those in need, and from time-to-time we also provide food hampers.

Reflection - Feed the Hungry

A cynic once quipped: "What would you get if you crossed a radical liberal social justice advocate with a strongly conservative pious daily communicant?" The answer? Dorothy Day!

That's a quip which can serve to throw some light on how one might begin, today, to live out the first corporal work of mercy, the command to feed the hungry. How do we feed the hungry?

To feed the hungry means to consume less ourselves, to do some fasting, and to live in a simplicity that puts us in more solidarity with the poor

Even if we are convinced, and perhaps even obsessed, by Jesus' command to do this, how, in fact, can it be done today? The world is a big place and millions upon millions of people live in hunger. Moreover we live a situation of compounded com-

plexity of every sort, political, social, and economic. There is no simple way to get resources from the rich to the poor, from your table to the table of someone who is hungry. How can you live out Christ's command to feed the hungry, given the complexities of today's world?

Generally speaking, rightly and wrongly, we look to our governments, to the United Nations, relief organizations, social services, welfare, and other such agencies to do this for us. Given the scope and complexity of poverty and hunger in the world, the tendency is to look over our shoulders to something massive, to some big government or agency, to feed the hungry. We tend to feel too small and individually over-powered in the face of hunger's enormity.

But this can be, and invariably is, a rationalization, an abdication, a way of escaping Jesus' command. Ultimately we cannot use the excuse that things are too complicated, that we are too small and powerless, and that only huge organizations can do anything for the hungry. The <u>Gospel</u> call to feed the hungry is uncompromising and eminently personal. Each of us is called upon personally to do something real and this must be something beyond the normal corporate things we are involved in: paying taxes and giving charity monies to governments and big agencies to enable them to do this for us.

We must do something ourselves.

But what more can we do concretely? How can you and how can I feed the hungry?

There are a couple of possible approaches. Mother Theresa takes one approach. For her, Jesus' command is simple and clear. Each of us should personally, beyond government and other agencies, reach out concretely and touch some poor person or persons. There should be times when we are, literally, taking food to hungry people, working in soup kitchens, giving aid to individual street people, and having a poor person eat at our table. This approach is individual, personal, and concrete. Each poor person has a face, and we do not, at least not all the time, ask questions regarding where they will eat tomorrow or what social problems are causing this hunger. In this view, the demand that we feed the hungry challenges us precisely to reach out beyond ideologies and social theories and irrespective of social structures—like the Good Samaritan, person-to-person, take food to the hungry.

But there is another approach, more abstract though not less critical. In this view, it is less important to feed this or that individual person on a given day than it is to change the social, political, and economic structures that are responsible for that particular person being hungry. This approach is less personal and it is slower, but it can, at the end of the day, be more far-reaching. In it, one attempts to feed the hungry by involving oneself in social justice groups that are trying to change the conditions that produce poverty.

Both of these approaches, in their best expressions, are predicated on some other things: feeding the hungry, as Jesus asks us to do it, involves a reduction in our own standard of living. To feed the hungry means to consume less ourselves, to do some fasting, and to live in a simplicity that puts us in more solidarity with the poor. Feeding the hungry also means prayer. We have some bad habits that only God can cure and thus only the outside power of God can ultimately transform our world.

So which is the best approach? As Christians, our task is not to pick between being a Mother Theresa or a social justice advocate. The gospel asks us to be both. We need to work at transforming the conditions that create poverty even as we, like Mother Theresa, reach out personally, beyond the economics and social issues involved, to feed very individual poor people.

Jesus' command to feed the hungry asks to become a Dorothy Day.
