Dear sisters and brothers,

Last Sunday evening provided us with a wonderful opportunity to gather as a parish family with our Seminarian Martino Hoang as he was instituted into the ministry of Acolyte as part of his journey towards Priesthood. On behalf of Martino I would like to thank Fr David Ranson for presiding and leading us during the Mass as well as all those who assisted in the celebration of the Mass and the preparation of our supper. Your efforts were greatly appreciated.

Secondly, as mentioned in last week's bulletin, over coming weeks we are embarking on a renewal of some of the positions on our Parish Pastoral Council (PPC).

Members of the PPC generally agree to serve initially for a two-year period followed by a second term of two years. This is done in such a way to enable approximately half the Council to step down every two years ensuring that sufficient members remain in situ to mentor the new members into the processes and current work of the PPC. Four continuous years is the maximum period of service as a member of the PPC. After a two year break a parishioner can then be considered again for another period of two years on the Council.

- **Ability to maintain confidentiality.**
- **Willingness to serve for a time and then let go.**
- **Ability to articulate and communicate thoughts and opinions.**
- **Generous with time and energy.**

Recommendation forms will be available from next week onwards.

Finally, I hope as many of you as possible will join us for our annual parish **"thanksgiving" evening** which will take place on Wednesday 20th November at St Gerard's Carlingford.

RECEPTION OF HOLY COMMUNION FROM THE CHALICE

From time to time I get asked about the 'correct' way to receive Holy Communion from the chalice and in particular my thoughts about the practice of "intinction" by the person receiving communion.

The Church in its official documents, while noting that the 'entire' Jesus Christ is always received in either the consecrated bread or wine, makes it clear that Holy Communion received under **both** species of bread and wine is always the **pre-ferred** way of receiving the Eucharist. Within the Catholic tradition we receive from a common cup (chalice) as a sign of both sharing in the death (blood) of Christ and my 'common union' or sharing of a common life with my sisters and brothers in Christ who also share in the "one cup" of the saving death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

While it has become a common practice in some churches, intinction or "dipping" the consecrated host into the chalice by the person receiving Holy Communion is not officially allowed by the Church as

1. it fails to align with our Lords command to "take and **drink**". In other words intinction reduces the **sign** value of our sharing together in a common **meal** where we both eat and drink
2. it increases the possibility of spillage of the Precious Blood as the partially "soaked" host travels from the chalice to the persons mouth and
3. can increase the transmission of germs or infection as the persons fingers may (as I have seen happen on more than one occasion) accidentally touch or submerge into the consecrated wine itself while dipping the host into the chalice.

Interestingly, over the years some of the official research done on the reception of Holy Communion from a common cup has shown that

1. given the alcohol content of the altar wine used and
2. providing the lip of the chalice is properly wiped followed by at least a quarter turn of the cup before it is offered to the following person, the transmission of germs is, in almost all cases, negligible....in fact there is more chance of transmission of germs as you leave Mass from the touching the church door handle and then scratching ones nose or mouth!

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Saint John Henry Newman

Conversations: The good words of John Henry Newman By Andrew Hamilton SJ

It is fair to say that of English saints the newly canonised John Henry Newman is the most intellectual and active in public life since Thomas More. The number of Catholic educational institutions and professional guilds to be named after each man bears witness to that.

The title of Robert Bolt's searching play about More was Man for All Seasons. The same phrase could also be well referred to Newman, with the difference that for More winter came at the end of his life, whereas for Newman it came in the middle. He had to negotiate through times of great personal and national change many of the anxieties and polarities that mark our own times. As a result he may bear reflection beyond the world of church today.

Newman crossed boundaries of temperament and culture. He was a deeply private man who engaged fully in public life. He lived his faith in contact with the secularising trends that shaped politics and religious faith. He lost his faith at school after reading contemporary philosophical writing and returned to it through his contact with Evangelical teachers.

In the debates that marked the Anglican Church in the first half of the 19th century he had to deal with liberal ideas about faith and the place of church in society. Through his reading during these debates he came to an understanding that continuity with the Christian tradition was represented most fully in the Catholic Church. When he became a Catholic his path took him from the broad culture and ethos of the Britain in which he was raised into the narrower world of the Church to which he came.

Catholics who celebrate Newman's canonisation may do so for differing reasons. Some will find encouragement in the breadth of his faith and in his insistence on the primacy of conscience. Others will be reassured by his insistence on the authority of scripture and of Church councils in matters of faith and church life. He held together strands of living faith that today are often opposed to one another. He also challenges both groups.

For him freedom of conscience meant more than making unforced choices about belief. It required work and had its costs. Before his decision to join the Catholic Church he read in the original language the many volumes of the Greek and Latin Fathers of the Church. And his decision cost him friendships, the certainty of preferment in the Anglican Church and his cultural home. His insistence on the authority of tradition, too, placed him in a continuing life of exploration within a community and not in a secure fortress of certainties over it. It made him a player, not a referee. In this season of discontent in our public life the way in which he managed these tensions makes him of wider interest. His wide reading, scholarship, respect for his arguing partners and care in finding right words enabled him to appeal to the heart as well as the head. He met his interlocutors as persons and equals, not merely as an impersonal collective.

When conversation turns to faith it is common to regard the gift of finding good words as no more than a decoration on the hard reasoning that faith demands. Newman stands as a reproach to that view. The rhythms, images and music of his words opened the hearts of his readers and hearers to attend to his argument, and carried them through the complexities of the reality that he unfolded.

His famous sermon on the Second Spring of Catholicism in Great Britain encouraged and emboldened a small community to look beyond their poverty of resources to the great tradition that they represented. His care with words, too, stands as a reproach to simplistic, partisan, populist and polemical representations of Catholic life. Newman's life points to the importance of finding a rhetoric appropriate for communicating religious and political ideas.

His rhetorical store included single sentences of balanced clauses extending over a page and a half. In our time political and religious rhetoric is often based on Twitter and the op ed — single sentence or single screen. That discipline is valuable for commending conciseness, but when reality is complex its balanced consideration requires a more ample treatment.

Listen to what the Spirit is saying...

We invite the group who participated in Listening and Dialogue to now reconvene in communal Discernment on any one of the six themes. Each Discernment session is expected to result in a response that can be summarised in 1000 characters and that can be submitted through a form on the Discernment page (opened on 1st September). Our Writing and Discernment Groups will then meet and discern on these responses, with prayer and from their own theological knowledge, towards publishing thematic papers and fleshing out the agenda for the first session of the Plenary Council in October 2020.

This National Theme for Discernment is inspired by the voices of the People of God who shared how deeply they treasured the Eucharist and the sacramental and liturgical life of the Church. The Initiation Process for Adults: A period of formation in the Christian way of life

Q How long does it take to become initiated?


A For those who have never been baptised, the Church recommends at least one year of preparation – it may take longer, depending on the individual.

Christian initiation is not a crash course in Catholicism.

- It is a process of formation in the life of faith.
- It takes time for the seeds of faith to be nurtured and brought to fruition.
- It takes time for catechumens to be immersed in the Christian life and to make the rhythms of the Church's liturgical prayer their own.
- It takes time to nurture an interior prayer life and to come to know and love the Lord not as a remote reality but as a living presence in daily life.

That is why, except in cases of emergency, Christian initiation for adults typically lasts a year or more.

Promoting Missionary Disciples

At Mass, we hear readings, listen to prayers and usually we start **thinking**. We want to know more about something spiritual. We **feel moved to find out more**. We have **become curious**.

This **spiritual curiosity is a beautiful gift leading us to know Jesus**. We want to know more about his life and his message. We want to understand some aspect of life for those who follow Jesus. Curiosity can range from mere awareness of a new possibility, to something quite intense. This gift of **wanting to know more, is a grace**. Ask someone who is **Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible**, for they receive keys that give understanding.

Consider the parable Jesus tells about **the way the Pharisee and the Tax Collector pray**.

The first begins, *I thank you God. I am not like the rest and not like this tax collector. I fast, I pay one tenth of all I get.* The second person praying, *not daring to raise his eyes to heaven, beat his breast. God be merciful to me a sinner.*

Compare the pair. The first sounds like *I'm so much better than the rest. God you should be thanking me!* The second knows God. You are the **merciful** one. I trust you God, **be merciful to me**. I know our relationship, I am the one who fails, I am **a sinner**. Forgive me.

Jesus concludes ~ the one who knows the truth about where they stand with God, ends up lifted up and made a friend of God. Bragging about oneself before God ends in embarrassment.

From the questions that come to mind, what would you be curious to find out about? Let us pray for the grace to feel intrigued and to want to know more about Jesus and how to follow Him.
