Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Fr. Joey's exciting excursions of parish ministries – Destination 2

Right after greeting the parents of our first communicants after a beautiful First Communion Mass for the kids, I had to rush to the Carlingford parish meeting room to visit my next destination for my series of "Fr. Joey's exciting excursions of parish ministries".

Upon arrival, I was a bit embarrassed because they were still waiting for me to bless the food. Despite their waiting, all were smiling and after blessing the food we lined up for a huge table of one of my favourites...an array of Chinese home cooked food! (yes, better than the ones in the restaurants) It was nice to see them eating together, chatting, smiling and laughing together. No wonder they are called the Happy Family Chinese Group. They really are happy and they really are a family!

The group started ten years ago in the homes of a few members. The group grew so they needed a bigger place, so they decided to have it in the parish meeting room. They meet once a month. They start with the Saturday vigil mass and they serve at that mass. Then they have the dinner followed by a spiritual session for two hours. In that session, they divide themselves into groups of 6-8 people and share the gospel for that Sunday. At the end of the sharing, they come up with a personal resolution for the next three weeks up until the next time they gather the following month. The remaining time, they use for learning the faith from different sources like Videos or some structured spiritual talk from a parish in Hong Kong that they have a connection with.

Right now there are 30 members and they come from Indonesia, Malaysia and mostly from Hong Kong. The present coordinators are Andy Lee and his wife Irene. They have two children, Clavell who is a Compliance Manager and Claudia, who is a physiotherapist. I have worked with them before and they are truly very fast and efficient.

Although the group is there for support for all the members, Andy points out that he is amazed at the generosity and cooperation of everyone.

Lucy, who has been with the group for ten years said that she values the kindness and friendship of all the members. She said she is enriched by the resolutions that they share and she enjoys their other activities like their planned outings and games. Joanna has also been with the group for more than 10 years. She says that the group has helped her learn and deepen her faith. And from there she has been involved in a lot of things like the RCIA, Bible sharing, and Alpha.

I am always struck by the many people I meet in our parish. We are so blessed that most of our parishioners are really serious in their faith. A lot of them take time to volunteer and learn their Catholic faith.

As a priest, one of the things I cherish as a reward in my ministry is when I see our parishioner being passionate and active in their faith. The more I see our parishioners get involved in our parish to deepen their faith and their relationship with God, the more I get motivated in my priestly ministries. In other words, the more I get motivated to work hard!

So let us help and support each other and let us pray for each other so that we may bring the kingdom of God in our parish!

PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL REPORT JUNE 2019

Dear Parishioners,

Growing Missionary Disciples through Small Groups has been the focus of our Parish Plan in 2019. By way of short articles in the bulletin, the PPC would like to offer some deeper insights and purpose of small groups in achieving this mission. We invite you to read, reflect and share with others the value and meaning of belonging to small groups.

As a parish, we are helping every parishioner to grow as what Pope Francis calls a "Missionary Disciple". There are the 10 attributes of a Missionary Disciple which we use in our parish:

1. Has a personal relationship with Jesus
2. Has a daily prayer life
3. Has a commitment to Sunday Eucharist and the Sacraments
4. Uses gifts in ministry
5. Knows basic Catholic theology (Kerygma)
6. Has knowledge and love of the Scriptures
7. Can and does share faith with others
8. Personally outreaches to people in need
9. Gives Generously
10. Experiences real Christian community (in a small group and has friends in parish)

It has been said that faith is shared at a distance of no more than 10 feet (3m in the new language).

Our parish wants to grow Missionary Disciples, but the question is how?

The answer is that we will, in most cases, grow Missionary Disciples through small groups. Most of the attributes above are best developed in small groups, particularly those small groups with some support and direction from the parish leadership.

So, what is a small group?

It is a group of people who come together to share community and to grow in their faith. Some types of small groups include:

- Friendship Groups – e.g. Family Groups
- Ministry Groups – e.g. Parish Pastoral Council, Choir, St Vincent de Paul
- Evangelistic Groups – e.g. Legion of Mary
- Learning Groups – e.g. Faith Education courses
- Fellowship Groups with a combination of friendship, evangelisation and learning

In all of these the aim of the small group for a parish is to promote growth of people in their faith, not only in their knowledge but in their attitudes, skills and activities. While growth in faith is really about a person's decision to give their hearts and lives to Jesus, living more and more within a discipleship lifestyle enables and supports that decision to be lived out each day.

So, what are the advantages of a small groups?

The answer to this question will form part of next month's article....until then, good wishes and happy reading!


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Reflection on this Sunday's Gospel



Jesus resolutely took the road for Jerusalem

Where is my life leading? A question many people ask themselves today – as the things that really matter are lost sight of in a haze of materialism and hedonism. We read in the weekend papers of people seeking to give their lives a new direction, because wealth and acclaim have left them with a sense of emptiness. If this spiritual emptiness is more widespread in today's world, the problem is not new. St Paul's advice for the Galatians, in our second reading - describing the 'self-indulgence' of the times as a kind of bondage - is as meaningful today as when it was first written.

It is our fundamental decisions that give direction to our lives. In today's gospel reading from Luke, Jesus begins to instruct his disciples, preparing them for the decisions that lie ahead of them. The example of Jesus, in the direction he gives to his life, is clearly affirmed - 'the time draws near for him to be taken up', and 'Jesus resolutely took the road for Jerusalem'. He shared our life to the full; he too had to make the painful human decisions that gave direction to his life. In these decisions, he was 'resolute', faithful to the end in expressing the generous ways of his Father. Our lives are shaped by the basic decisions we have made - concerning family priorities, concerning our professional responsibilities,

concerning our attitudes as neighbours and citizens. As this gospel reading takes us into the company of Jesus, let us ask ourselves how responsible we are in the making of these life decisions, and how resolute we are in putting them into practice.

Luke presses home the lesson, recalling, at this point, three surprising responses made by Jesus to those who sought to become his followers. Jesus used words to great effect. The crowds followed him to hear his words of wisdom and encouragement. Many of his off-the-cuff sayings have become proverbial. But the prophet from Nazareth was not the ordinary kind of storyteller, he overturned people's expectations. In the usual way of things, a good story reconciles us, in the end, to the wholesomeness that is inherent to our human affairs; and proverbs sound a note that reassures us that there is a predictable order in things. The parables of Jesus, however, invite us to leave behind the reassurances of our familiar world, and to enter into the new order of things he called the 'Kingdom' of his Father – where the last may be first, and the one who shows himself to be our true friend may be a traditional enemy. Similarly, the three responses in today's gospel, though they are like proverbs, are meant to bring a shock that confronts us with the radical nature of our decision to be a follower of Jesus. They should be taken in this spirit, rather than as literal prescriptions. There may be a little ironical humour implied, also – for instance, if the father who is to be buried is still hale and hearty.

Those who take seriously the invitation to follow Jesus, with all its radical implications, will never regret their decision – as the history of the Church has proved age after age.

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We listen to the readings to learn how to follow Jesus

Do you ever wonder about what you hear in the readings at Mass? Take the first reading – Elija the prophet finds this man Elisha, who is guiding the oxen dragging the plough. Elija throws his cloak on Elisha who then runs after Elija. Did he not like the cloak? There are a few words spoken then Elisha kills two of the oxen, sets fire to the plough to cook the oxen to feed the workers. How would he explain that to his dad? I think he burnt his bridges in that relationship. There was no turning back. His career as a ploughman just went up in smoke.

The psalm response is "You are my inheritance, O Lord." So where do we go to collect this inheritance? In the psalm we ask "Preserve me God, I take refuge in you. I say to the Lord, "You are my God, . . . it is you yourself who are my prize". (You and not the money) You show me the path of life, the fulness of joy in your presence, at your right-hand happiness forever". YES, that is "my inheritance", the joy, the presence and happiness forever!

St Paul is very clear in telling us how to live. *Serve one another in works of love. A single command, Love your neighbour as yourself. If you go snapping at each other and tearing each other to pieces, . . . you will destroy the whole community.*

At Mass there is so much to learn and the reading go quickly. We have questions. We need time to think. Have you ever thought ~ Where can I go over the readings before I come to Mass, or when I go home from Mass? YES you can, Google **Sunday Mass readings**. This is one among many. <https://www.catholicgallery.org/sunday-mass-readings-njb/>

We can discover so much from the readings that show us how to follow Jesus.

Being a Missionary Disciple: Outreaching to the non-baptised

Q How do members of the assembly help attract and welcome people to our faith?

A A simple invitation to come to Mass may be just what a spouse, neighbour, good friend, or acquaintance has been waiting for. People are attracted to faith by the way others lead their lives – in the neighbourhood, school, workplace, or ball field. What they observe in us kindles a desire for something more. Some people have no experience of any formal faith tradition and don't know how to access it, so a willingness to share our faith and extend an invitation opens the way for them. We must become the hands and feet and welcoming voice of Jesus in the marketplace. The Holy Spirit is alive and working through us to lead others to Jesus. And when visitors cross the threshold of our church, we must pay attention. Everyone needs a warm welcome – especially seekers.
