Dear Parishioners,

The church doors will be open!

We have all been eagerly awaiting the end of stay-at-home public health orders, which will include places of worship being open for fully vaccinated people from Monday, October 11th. We will indeed have both of our churches open for personal prayer from this day.

However, Bishop Anthony has directed that Masses not recommence until NSW reaches the 80% vaccination threshold, likely to be only two weeks later. In doing so, he places our diocese on the same footing of our neighbouring dioceses of Sydney and Parramatta. Given our proximity to these dioceses, to recommence Mass when they have not would risk people travelling in from elsewhere and jeopardising the limit of 100 people at OLHC and 150 at St Gerard's which the density limits require.

Postponing the commencement of Masses until everybody, vaccinated or not is allowed to come also removes from us the burden of having to verify people's vaccination status, which would have been difficult, yet risk us breaching public health orders if we failed to do so.

So, from Oct 11th we invite you, if you are vaccinated, to come to your church, to spend time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle, checking in with a QR code and wearing a mask.

OLHC Church will be open 7am - 9pm each day, with exception of a 10am opening on Wednesdays at a 6pm close on Saturdays. St Gerard's Church will be open 10am - 6pm every day. There may be occasional closures for funerals and cleaning.

We will continue to offer livestreamed Masses, and online prayer gatherings in the weeks until Mass is again celebrated publicly, at which time we will review the level of demand for the various online services.

Weddings and funerals can take place with up to 50 people who are vaccinated.

We will continue to offer the sacrament of Penance outdoors on Tuesdays 10am-11am in front of St Gerard's Church, Fridays 10am-11am in front of St Gerard's Church , and Saturdays 9am-10am under the tree in front of OLHC Church. Alternatively, at other times by appointment with the priests.

Our next parish bulletin on October 16th will have an update on the re-commencement of Masses, as the date will likely be known by that stage.

Excavation at OLHC: The works undertaken on site this week are early site investigations for potential archaeology finds on the site as required and approved by Heritage NSW. They are excavating a small number of trenches, assessing and recording what is identified and then will produce a report to Heritage NSW detailing the results. This will then determine the extent of future investigations and monitoring required once the main works commence.

Deacon Aldrin's ordination: Many of your will remember Aldrin Valdehueza who did his pastoral placement in our parish a couple of years ago, just as Hien Vu is doing now. Aldrin was ordained a deacon last year, and will be ordained a priest on Monday Oct 18th at 11.30am.

Although we expect to be out of lockdown there will still be very limited numbers, so we invite you to watch the ordination at www.bbcatholic.org.au/ordination. Please pray for Deacon Aldrin, as well as Deacons Roger Delmonte and Sam French who will be ordained with him, as they enter their last few weeks of preparation.

Refugees and Asylum Seekers: While only one family of asylum seekers have been in the news lately, there are thousands of people either seeking asylum in Australia, or, have been granted refugee status and are in need of support. Last weekend we celebrated Migrant and Refugee Sunday, with Pope Francis issuing a powerful letter entitled "Towards a Wider 'We'". A number of Catholic agencies provide us resources for prayer, advocacy and practical support. See https://www.acmro.catholic.org.au/ and aus.jrs.net.

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Data security: We are continuing to clean out the OLHC parish office in preparation for moving the office to St Gerard's on Nov 8^{th} . Great care is being taken with any materials which contain people's private details such as address or phone numbers. We are using secure document shredding bins for all papers, and a recycling service which will destroy and recycle all CDs and disks with back ups of data.

Air conditioning: Progress continues at St Gerard's. Air conditioning units are now mounted overhead on the back verandas. There will be some delay now in getting the ductwork built as there are only a few people working at the factory at present. Once this is completed the internal return air openings can be cut either side of the altar.



Catechist Ministry in Secondary Schools

One of the features of which our parish can be rightly proud is our continuous ministry to the three state secondary schools in our parish: Cheltenham Girls High, Carlingford High and James Ruse High. Many parishes have no such ministry. We have this unique opportunity to speak of Jesus and his message to teenagers in their most valuable and formative years. In recent years this ministry has been led by Mary O'Byrne who has coordinated our dedicated team of catechists with great enthusiasm and love. No matter how well a person may lead a ministry, it is always good that leadership be passed on from time to time, so Mary has given notice that she will be stepping down at the end of this year. We are now seeking expressions of interest for a parishioner to volunteer to take up this leadership role. It can be done by a present catechist, or by someone who is not presently a catechist, but who values this ministry and can organise, motivate and support our existing volunteer catechists. 

On **18 October 2021** (10-11:30am AEDT) the ACU Centre for Liturgy will have the privilege of hosting Fr Bruce Morrill, SJ, who will give our next <u>online</u> public lecture (via Zoom) exploring the vital connection between ethics and our physical enactment of liturgy.

The lecture is entitled "Ritual bodies as 'Reasonable Worship': Putting Liturgy in Proper Ethical Perspective". Liturgy as ritual worship is meant to empower Christians to be 'living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God' (Rom 12:1). Liturgy and ethics are integrally related in a sound interpretation of Christian tradition but the theological rhetoric of sacrifice, holiness, royal priesthood, and more, can be puzzling, if not provocative, for 21st century Catholics. This lecture proposes that acceptance of the disruptive challenge of this language will illuminate rather than obscure the connection between liturgy and ethical living.

Fr. Morrill holds the Edward A. Malloy Chair in Roman Catholic Studies at Vanderbilt University, where he is Professor of Theology in the Divinity School and Graduate Department of Religion.

Accepting Disappointment in Love

In many of her novels, Anita Brookner, almost as a signature to her work, will make the following comment: the first task of a couple in marriage is to console each other for the fact that they cannot not disappoint each other. That's an important insight. Why?

No love or friendship ever fully takes away our separateness. When we are young and hear sadness in love songs, we think that the sadness and disappointment are a prelude to the experience of love. Later we come to realize that the sadness and disappointment don't ultimately originate from the fact that love has not taken place, but from the finite, limited character of human love itself. Brookner has it right: the first task in any love is for us to console each other for the limits of our love, for the fact that we cannot not disappoint each other.

Why? Why can't two persons ever be enough for each other? Why is disappointment part of the experience of every relationship, friendship, and marriage?

Because the very way that we are made precludes ever having, in this life, a oneness of mind, heart, and body that fulfills us in such a way that there is no disappointment. Our longing is simply too wide. We long for the infinite and are built for it and so we wake to life and consciousness with longings as deep as a Grand Canyon without a bottom.

In this life then, outside of rare and very transitory mystical experiences, there is no consummation (sexual, emotional, psychological, or even spiritual) with another person that is so deep and all-embracing that it excludes all distance, shadow, and emptiness.

No matter how deep a friendship or a marriage and no matter how good, rich in personality, and deep the other person may be, we always find ourselves somewhat disappointed. In this life, there is no union that fills every emptiness inside of us. Somewhere, we always sleep alone.

In essence, there is no union which fulfills perfectly the Genesis prescription that "two become one flesh." No matter how close a marriage or a friendship, two can never ultimately become one. No matter how deep a union, we always remain separate, two persons who cannot really ever, in this life, make just one heart, one mind, and one body.

No love or friendship ever fully takes away our separateness. Sometimes sexual electricity or emotional or spiritual affinity can promise such a oneness. But, in the end, it cannot fully deliver it. No matter how deep and powerful a union, ultimately, we remain, and need to remain, captains of our own hearts, minds, and bodies.

This needs to be recognized, not just to help us deal with the disappointment, but especially so that we do not violate each other.

What's implied here?

In this life we are always, to some degree, in exile from each other. We stand alone in some way. Where we feel this most deeply is not in our sexual isolation, but in our moral separateness. What we crave even more deeply than sexual unity is moral affinity, to be truly one heart with another. More than we desire a lover, we desire a kindred spirit, a soul mate. If this is true, then the deepest violations of each other are also not sexual but moral.

It's when we try to be captain of somebody else's soul (even more than of his or her body) that we rape someone. And it is our failure to accept that we will always be somehow separate from each other that creates the pressure inside of us to unhealthily try to be captain of someone else's soul. We violate another's separateness precisely because we cannot accept the disappointment of love.

Finally, beyond even this, we cannot not be disappointed in love because, in the end, we are all, in some way, limited, inadequate, blemished, dull, and boring. None of us is God. No matter how rich our personalities or attractive our bodies, none of us can indefinitely excite and generate novelty, sexual electricity, and emotional pleasure, within a relationship. A relationship is like a long trip and, as Dan Berrigan puts it, "there's bound to be some long dull stretches. Don't travel with someone who expects you to be exciting all the time!"

What's the lesson in this? Stoicism and cynicism about love and romance? To the contrary: the recognition that, in love, we cannot not disappoint each other is what makes it possible for us to remain inside of marriage, friendship, celibacy, and respect.

It's when we demand not to be disappointed that we grow angry, make unrealistic demands, and put pressure on each other's moral and sexual integrity. Conversely, when we recognize the limits of love, when we accept an inevitable separateness, moral loneliness, and disappointment, we can begin to console each other in our friendships and our marriages. In that consolation, since it touches so deeply the core of our souls, we can, in fact, begin to find the threads that can bind us into a unity of heart beyond disappointment.
