Dear Parishioners,

Happy Easter! It is such a joy that we can again celebrate Jesus' death and resurrection together as a church after last year's Easter being missed due to lock down. If you're here for the first time, welcome. If you're here for the first time in a long time, welcome back! It's great to have you with us. This newsletter is your invitation to come and get involved in the many things our parish can offer to find a place to belong, to explore faith, to get help or get involved.

If you're asking questions about Jesus Christ and Catholic faith, read more about the *Alpha program* below. If you're not Catholic but would like to be, read about *RCIA* below. If you've got primary school aged children, we've got something for them, and we've got youth groups for Year 7 to 12 and for young adults called *Cana, Antioch and Emmaus* which you can read about in these pages.

These Easter celebrations are an expression of the faith of our community and the many, many people who have contributed to the hospitality, the music and the visual environment, and, who have served on the altar, proclaimed scripture to us, or shared holy Communion with us. And many more people working behind the scenes. Thank you to all of them. – Fr Jim McKeon & Fr Bogdan Skupien and the Parish Team.

Our schools: We've been fostering the relationship with OLHC and St Gerard's Catholic schools within our parish. Principals Dominique O'Sullivan and Barbara Yee are members of our Parish Pastoral Council and also meet regularly with Fr Jim. In Term 1 Fr Jim, Fr Bogdan and Hien Vu between them visited every class in the two schools for a religion lesson, and Years 4-6 also celebrated the sacrament of Reconciliation. This will continue throughout the year, and in Term 2 Fr Jim and Fr Bogdan will also begin to visit Catholic SRE classes in our state schools, and will reach out to Marist Eastwood and Mt St Benedict's College Pennant Hills.

Covid-safety: We are glad that we can again celebrate Mass together. There is now a much lower risk of Covid transmission in NSW, but we are taking a few precautions:

- ◆ We are limited to one person per two square meters in each of our churches. [The doors will be shut when we reach our limit](#)
- ◆ We are not shaking hands at the sign of peace. Instead we can bow, wave or smile
- Communion is only received as the Body of Christ, and only on the hand
- ◆ The priest and others giving Communion to you will wear a mask
- ◆ We are not using hymnbooks
- ◆ We are not passing around a collection bowl (see more details below)
- ◆ Please use the hand sanitiser provided at the door
- ◆ Please take this newsletter home with you (don't return it to the box)
- ◆ Please sit 1.5m apart from people who are not in your household. This may mean sitting diagonally, rather than directly behind the person in the next pew
- ◆ Please wipe down your pew with disinfectant wipe after the liturgy


No collections: You'll notice that we no longer pass around a collection bowl to receive donations during Mass. This is a covid-precaution to avoid many hands touching the same item. Our parish still relies on the generosity of your, our parishioners and visitors. will be people with buckets at the doors as you leave the church to collect your donations that will go to the Holy Land Appeal, and on Easter Sunday the blue box will support our clergy, and the red box support our parish. If you don't have cash there is a paywave / tap and go device at each door, with each tap donating \$10 to our parish. Thank you for your generosity.

Helping refugees: Australian residents received significant support from our Government during the lockdown and recession in 2020, but refugees and asylum seekers who were ineligible have struggled significantly. Jesuit Refugee Services continues to help support newly arrived people who are struggling to settle into Australia. In early May we'll be collecting particular food stuffs to be of practical support to them.

An opportunity to be a “missionary disciple”

Through our baptism, we are called by Jesus to be missionary disciples – to share the Gospel message with others. As followers of Jesus, we are also called to community, to grow together in the Christian life.

At times people express an interest in knowing more about the Christian faith and the way of life, and as a community of faith we are called to respond.

Through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, the parish community shares with these people their faith, life and beliefs.

In an effort to support these people, in the pre COVID-19 era, we gathered with them to share our faith in a home setting, around members of the local community.

If anyone is interested in becoming involved in supporting people on their journey of faith discovery, please contact the Parish Office (9876 2853) and the RCIA team will be in contact with further details of what is involved.

What is Christian Initiation?

Christian initiation is the process of preparing for and receiving the three sacraments of initiation: Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Those baptised as infants receive these sacraments over years – Confirmation at around the age of seven, and Eucharist a year or so later. But in the early Church, these sacraments were received together. That still happens for adults who wish to become Christians. Their preparation may last one or even more years; they learn about and apprentice in a life of faith in the community before receiving all three sacraments at once, usually at the Easter Vigil, on the night before Easter. This process is known as the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA). Adults baptised in other Christian traditions prepare to be received into the full communion of the Catholic Church and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist. Depending on their background, this preparation may take a few or many months.

Children's Sacramental Journey - First Eucharist 2021

This Easter Sunday at the Family Masses, 9:30am at St Gerard's and 6pm at Our Lady Help of Christians, the children who are preparing to celebrate their First Eucharist will be presented at Mass and receive a reflection of the Lord's Prayer. Please keep these children and their families in your prayers.

In our third session during the week, the children learnt about the Holy Mass. We discussed about the importance of storytelling: families have stories, Jesus also told us stories. We explained to the children the true stories in the Holy Bible teach us about our history and how it forms our identity today as Catholics and why we celebrate the Eucharist, which means "thanksgiving". They learnt about the Liturgy of the Word and the said or sung responses during Mass. We also watched a video on formed.org about the Liturgy of the Eucharist where the children understand more in depth the prayers that are said, how to respond and receive Jesus in Holy Communion. Upon receiving the goodness of Jesus, they were taught to go forth and share the love of the Eucharist with others by their words, thoughts and deeds.

Our final preparation session for the families will take place within the church after the school holidays. The children then proceed to celebrate their First Eucharist on the weekend of the 24th/25th April 2021.

COVID-19 Safety Plan

- We adhere to maximum number of person permitted in the church based on the two square metre rule (160 people at Epping and 290 at Carlingford).
- All are asked to sanitise their hands on entering & leaving and use the QR code or sign in the book.
- We ask the parishioners to sanitise the pew where were sitting after every Mass
- There is no physical exchange of the sign of peace.
- All are asked to maintain 2 metre spacing when coming forward for Holy Communion (which is given on the hand).
- Please remember hand hygiene by sanitising your hands.
- Masks are no longer mandatory, however if social distancing is not possible, then it is recommended that a mask should be worn.



Reflection Seeing the Resurrection

God never overpowers, never twists arms, never pushes your face into something so as to take away your freedom. God respects our freedom and is never a coercive force.

And nowhere is this more true than in what is revealed in the resurrection of Jesus. The Gospels assure us that, like his birth, the resurrection was physical, real, not just some alteration inside the consciousness of believers. After the resurrection, we are assured, Jesus' tomb was empty, people could touch him, he ate food with them, he was not a ghost.

Love grasps the mystery. Love is the eye.

But his rising from the dead was not a brute slap in the face to his critics, a non-negotiable fact that left sceptics with nothing to say. The resurrection didn't make a big splash. It was not some spectacular event that exploded into the world as the highlight on the evening news. It had the same dynamics as the incarnation itself: After he rose from the dead, Jesus was seen by some, but not by others; understood by some, but not by others. Some got his meaning and it changed their lives, others were indifferent to him, and still others understood what had happened, hardened their hearts against it, and tried to destroy its truth.

Notice how this parallels, almost perfectly, what happened at the birth of Jesus: The baby was real, not a ghost, but he was seen by some, but not by others and the event was understood by some but not by others. Some got its meaning and it changed their lives, others were indifferent and their lives went on as before, while still others (like Herod) sensed its meaning but hardened their hearts against it and tried to destroy the child.

Why the difference? What makes some see the resurrection while others do not? What lets some understand the mystery and embrace it, while others are left in indifference or hatred?

Hugo of St. Victor used to say: Love is the eye! When we look at anything through the eyes of love, we see correctly, understand, and properly appropriate its mystery. The reverse is also true. When we look at anything through eyes that are jaded, cynical, jealous, or bitter, we will not see correctly, will not understand, and will not properly appropriate its mystery.

We see this in how the Gospel of John describes the events of Easter Sunday. Jesus has risen, but, first of all, only the person who is driven by love, Mary Magdala, goes out in search of him. The others remain as they are, locked inside their own worlds. But love seeks out its beloved and Mary Magdala goes out, spices in hand, wanting at least to embalm his dead body. She finds his grave empty and runs back to Peter and the beloved disciple and tells them the tomb is empty. The two race off together, towards the tomb, but the disciple whom Jesus loved out-runs Peter and gets to the tomb first, but he doesn't enter, he waits for Peter (authority) to go in first.

Peter enters the empty tomb, sees the linens that had covered the body of Jesus, but does not understand. Then the beloved disciple, love, enters. He sees and he does understand. Love grasps the mystery. Love is the eye. It is what lets us see and understand the resurrection.

That is why, after the resurrection, some saw Jesus but others did not. Some understood the resurrection while others did not. Those with the eyes of love saw and understood. Those without the eyes of love either didn't see anything or were perplexed or upset by what they did see.

There are lots of ways to be blind. I remember an Easter Sunday some years ago when I was a young graduate student in San Francisco. Easter Sunday was late that year and it was a spectacularly beautiful spring day. But on that particular day I was mostly blind to what was around me. I was young, homesick, alone on Easter Sunday, and nursing a huge heartache. That coloured everything I was seeing and feeling. It was Easter Sunday, in spring, in high sunshine, but, for what I was seeing, it might as well have been midnight, on Good Friday, in the dead of winter.

Lonely and nursing a heartache, I took a walk to calm my restlessness. At the entrance of a park, I saw a blind beggar holding a sign that read: It's spring and I'm blind! The irony wasn't lost on me. I was blind that day, more blind than that beggar, seeing neither spring nor the resurrection. What I was seeing were only those things that reflected what was going on inside my own heart.

Christ is risen, though we might not see him! We don't always notice spring. The miraculous doesn't force itself on us. It's there, there to be seen, but whether we see or not, and what precisely we do see, depends mainly upon what's going on inside our own hearts.
