HOW CAN I CARRY THE TRANSFORMING PRESENCE OF CHRIST FROM THE ALTAR INTO MY RELATIONSHIPS, WORK, AND DAILY INTERACTIONS?

Carrying the transforming presence of Christ from the altar into daily life is the heart of Christian discipleship. What happens in worship is not meant to stay there; it is meant to overflow into the world. Here are several ways to let the grace you receive at the altar shape your relationships, work, and ordinary interactions.

1. Let worship form your inner posture.

At the altar you encounter Christ's self-giving love—love that is patient, merciful, and unafraid to serve. When you rise from that place, pause to ask: What inner posture did Christ show me today? Maybe it was humility, compassion, or perseverance. Intentionally carry that posture into the next thing you do. Over time, this trains your heart to respond to people not out of impulse but out of the character Christ is forming in you.

2. Practice the "continuation" of communion.

Communion is not only receiving Christ but becoming His body. After worship, look for small ways to extend the same generosity you have received: slowing down to listen, forgiving quickly, offering encouragement, or noticing someone who is overlooked. These may seem small, but they are the daily bread of Christlike presence—ordinary acts that become sacramental when done in love.

3. Bring prayer into the rhythm of your day.

The altar is an encounter, not an escape. Let that encounter follow you by anchoring your day with brief, sincere prayers. Before a meeting, whisper: Christ, be in this conversation. Before a hard task: Strengthen me to work with integrity. Before speaking to someone difficult: Let me see them as You do. These simple prayers make space for Christ's presence to guide your responses rather than your anxieties.

4. See others through the lens of mercy.

Worship reminds you that you are loved and forgiven. Carry that awareness into your relationships by giving

others the same mercy Christ extends to you. This does not mean ignoring boundaries or accepting harmful behavior—it means approaching others without harsh judgment, remembering that every person is in process, every heart is burdened, and every story is known fully only to God.

5. Offer your work as an act of love.

Whatever your job, let it become an altar of its own Approach your tasks with diligence, honesty, and kindness. Ask how your work can contribute to the good of others, even in hidden ways. Christ transforms the ordinary not by making it spectacular, but by filling it with purpose and love.

6. Return often—and with openness.

Finally, the transformation that begins at the altal deepens through repetition. Keep returning with honesty, gratitude, and desire for renewal. The more you allow Christ to shape you in worship, the more naturally His presence will radiate from you in daily life

In this way, the altar becomes not a destination but a starting point—sending you out as a living sign of Christ's love wherever you go.

LETTER FROM FATHER GREG

Dear Parishioners,

As many of you are aware, Bishop Anthony Randazzo announced a few weeks ago in his pastoral letter that the Precious Blood of Christ will soon be reintroduced during Holy Communion in all churches across our diocese. This is a wonderful and grace-filled moment for our faith community, as it allows us once again to share more fully in the Eucharistic mystery — receiving both the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Having said that, our parish is not yet ready to begin this practice immediately. Before we can do so, it is essential that our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and senior altar servers receive the proper preparation and training. This is a sacred and important ministry that calls for reverence, understanding, and careful attention to detail. We must ensure that everyone involved is confident and well prepared before we start distributing the Precious Blood of Christ again.

As the end of the year is a particularly busy time for many of us, I have decided to delay the reintroduction of the Chalice until beginning of next year. This will allow us to dedicate the necessary time to provide training and formation for all ministers involved.

Thank you for your patience, understanding, and ongoing commitment to our parish community. Together, we will approach this next step in our Eucharistic life with faith, reverence, and joy.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK AND LAST RITES

In the Catholic Church, Anointing of the Sick and Last Rites are related but distinct concepts, often misunderstood as the same. Both are part of the Church's pastoral care for the sick and dying, but they serve different purposes and can occur at different stages of illness or life.

Anointing of the Sick is one of the seven sacraments and is intended for anyone who is seriously ill, undergoing major surgery, or experiencing the frailty of old age. It involves a priest anointing the forehead and hands of the sick person with holy oil, accompanied by prayers for healing, strength, and forgiveness. This sacrament is not only for those near death but also for the recovery of health, both physical and spiritual. It can be received multiple times if the person's condition worsens or if they face another serious illness.

Last Rites, on the other hand, is not a single sacrament but a combination of several rites given to a person who is close to death. It typically includes three elements: the Sacrament of Reconciliation (confession), Anointing of the Sick, and Viaticum, which is the final reception of the Eucharist ("food for the journey"). The Last Rites are meant to prepare the soul for death and entry into eternal life, offering spiritual comfort, peace, and the forgiveness of sins.

In summary, while the Anointing of the Sick can be administered at any serious stage of illness, Last Rites are specifically for those who are dying. Every Catholic nearing the end of life is encouraged to receive the Last Rites if possible, but the Anointing of the Sick is broader in scope and not limited to the dying.

Importantly, a priest cannot administer either the Anointing of the Sick or the Last Rites after death. Once a person has died, the sacraments can no longer be given. In that case, a priest may offer prayers for the dead, but the sacraments themselves must be given while the person is still alive, even if they are unconscious.

ADORATION AND CONFESSION

Due to Fr Greg and Fr Bronek being in Perth this week for their Salvatorian meeting, there will be no Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from Monday to Thursday. During their time away, the supplying priest will provide the sacrament of Confession only, beginning 20 minutes before each scheduled Mass. We apologise for any inconvenience this temporary change may cause and appreciate your patience and understanding. Regular services will resume once our priests return at the end of the week.


CALLED TO BE A SYNODAL CHURCH




CHRISTMAS BAKE SALE

PWBB NOVEMBER APPEAL

Who does Pastoral Works Broken Bay support?

Every year, your donations to Pastoral Works Broken Bay (PWBB) support two key Diocesan ministries. They are the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD) and Hospital Chaplaincy and Pastoral Care Program. PWBB also contributes financially to St Lucy's School and St Edmund's College for students with disabilities and the Ephpheta Centre which supports the deaf community.

1. Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD)

In our Diocese, more than 700 volunteer catechists who have received specialised training provide religious education to over 12,000 Catholic students attending public primary and secondary schools in our local parish communities. CCD provides regular resources and newsletters for the students and their families. It is a vital evangelisation role and a vibrant, enriching, and rewarding ministry. Without your support, thousands of our young people in our Diocese would not receive Catholic education.

2. Hospital Chaplaincy and Pastoral Care Practitioner Program

In the last financial year, our Priests and CatholicCare Pastoral Care Practitioners engaged with around 2,000 individuals (including patients, their families/friends/carers, and even hospital staff) across the seven hospitals in which they minister, representing around 5,000 pastoral visits. Their special ministry supports patients and their families when they are at their most vulnerable, and they are there for those who may not have a family. Sometimes, it may mean a simple conversation, a listening ear, or providing prayerful and sacramental support.

3. St Lucy's School

St Lucy's School is a Catholic K-12 school in the Dominican tradition for students with disabilities. They provide a holistic education, offering outstanding academic programs taught by special educators. At St Lucy's they view each child individually to unlock their unique potential and to encourage them to become independent.


4. St Edmund's College

St Edmund's is a Catholic 7 -12 high school for students with a wide range of disabilities including sensory impairment, intellectual disability, and autism. St Edmunds creates a holistic learning environment incorporating academics and personal wellbeing through co-curricular activities.

5. The Ephpheta Centre

Ephpheta means "Be Open". The Ephpheta Centre provides pastoral care, sacramental services, support, and advocacy for the deaf or hard of hearing. The chaplaincy team visits people confined to their homes, nursing homes, hospitals, and those in prison, as well as friendship community gatherings catering to people across Sydney and the Central Coast.
