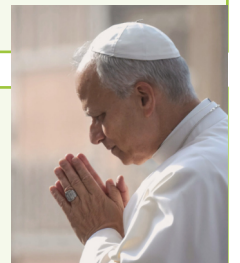

SIX THINGS EVERY CATHOLIC SHOULD KNOW ABOUT PALM SUNDAY

Palm Sunday holds a special place in the liturgical year for Catholics worldwide. It marks the beginning of Holy Week and commemorates the Lord's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. As we prepare our hearts for this significant day, here are six key aspects every Catholic should know about Palm Sunday:

Catholics carry palm branches on Palm Sunday in imitation of the Gospel The use of palm branches on Palm Sunday dates back to the Gospel narratives, where the crowd welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem by laying palm branches on the road before Him. "When the great crowd that had come to the feast heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took palm branches and went out to meet him, and cried out: 'Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, the king of Israel'" (Jn 12:12-13). Palms are symbols of victory and peace in ancient cultures, and for Catholics, they represent the victory of Christ over death and the reign of peace in his kingdom.

Palm Sunday is also known as Passion Sunday In the Roman Missal, the official title of the feast is "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord," but Catholics also call this Sunday "Passion Sunday." This dual identity highlights the contrasting themes of Jesus' royal reception into Jerusalem and the solemn anticipation of his passion. The liturgy begins with the joyful commemoration of his entry, symbolized by the blessing and distribution of palms. A somber tone descends, however, as the Mass proceeds. A solemn reading of the Passion narrative prepares the faithful for Holy Week's events.

Mass on Palm Sunday includes a procession One of the most visually striking elements of Palm Sunday is the procession. In many parishes, the faithful gather outside the church to receive blessed palms, then proceed inside in a solemn procession, reenacting Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The Roman Missal notes, "Accordingly, the memorial of this entrance of the

Lord takes place at all Masses, by means of the procession or the Solemn entrance before the principal Mass or the Simple Entrance before other Masses." This procession serves as a physical and spiritual journey, inviting participants to reflect on their own journey with Christ. In some countries, like Malta, the processions are especially vibrant.

Clergy wear red vestments on Palm Sunday The liturgical colour for Palm Sunday is red, symbolizing the blood Jesus shed during his Passion. On this day, the red vestments worn by priests and deacons vividly remind us of Jesus' suffering and sacrifice for our salvation. Historically, red has also been associated with royalty. The Gospels depict Jesus' entry into Jerusalem as a royal procession. The use of red on Palm Sunday can also be seen as a reflection of Christ's kingly dignity, despite the path of suffering He was about to endure. **The Passion narrative has a central role in the Palm Sunday Mass**

The story of Jesus' death is a central part of the Palm Sunday liturgy. It recounts the events leading up to the Lord's crucifixion, from the Last Supper with his disciples to his death on the Cross. Listening to the Passion narrative, the faithful are invited to meditate on the depth of Christ's love and the reality of human sinfulness.

Palm Sunday should be observed as a day for reflection and renewal

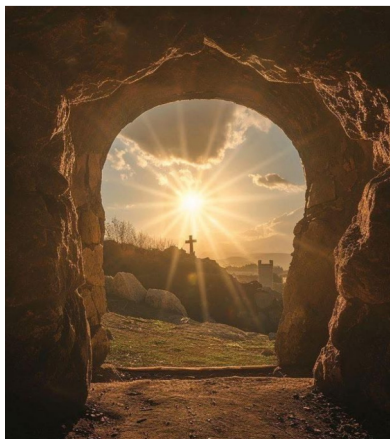
Palm Sunday offers Catholics a special opportunity for reflection and spiritual renewal. It marks the start of Holy Week, a time to contemplate the mysteries of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection. The faithful are encouraged to participate fully in the Holy Week services, entering the Paschal Mystery with open hearts and minds. The Passion narrative also prompts Catholics to examine their own lives. In a Palm Sunday homily, Pope Francis pointed to the characters in the Passion narrative and asked, "Where is my heart? Which of these persons am I like?" As Palm Sunday approaches, Catholics everywhere can embrace the rich traditions and profound symbolism of the feast. By doing so, we deepen our faith, draw closer to Jesus and prepare ourselves to experience the joy of Easter with renewed hearts. From www.oursundayvisitor.com

HOW DOES THE CHURCH DETERMINE THE DAY FOR EASTER?

Easter the Christian holiday that celebrates the day of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, is a moveable feast, which means that it does not occur on the same date every year. Easter is calculated based on the phases of the moon and the coming of spring. **Determining the Date of Easter** In 325 A.D., the Council of Nicaea, which agreed upon the basic principles of Christianity, established a formula for the date of Easter as the Sunday following the paschal full moon, which is the full moon that falls on or after the spring equinox. In practice, that means that Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon that falls on or after March 21. Easter can occur as early as March 22 and as late as April 25, depending on when the paschal full moon occurs. You can easily find the date of Easter in

this and future years, in both the Western (Gregorian) and Eastern (Julian) calculations online.

The Significance of the Paschal Full Moon The Council of Nicaea decided that Easter must always occur on a Sunday because Sunday was the day on which Christ rose from the dead. But why is the paschal full moon used to determine the date of Easter? The answer comes from the Jewish calendar. The Aramaic word "paschal" means "pass over," which is a reference to the Jewish holiday. Passover fell on the date of the paschal full moon in the Jewish calendar. Jesus Christ was Jewish. His Last Supper with his disciples was a Passover Seder. It is now called Holy Thursday by Christians and is the Thursday immediately before Easter Sunday. Therefore, the very first Easter Sunday was the Sunday after Passover. Many Christians erroneously believe that the date of Easter is currently determined by the date of Passover, and so they are surprised when Western Christians sometimes celebrated Easter before the Jewish celebration of Passover.



Approximate Dates for the Paschal Moon The paschal full moon can fall on different days in different time zones, which can present a problem when calculating the date of Easter. If people in different time zones were to calculate the date of Easter depending on when they observed the paschal full moon, then that would mean that the date of Easter would be different depending on which time zone they lived in. For that reason, the church does not use the exact date of the paschal full moon but an approximation. For calculation purposes, the full moon is always set on the 14th day of the lunar month. The lunar month begins with the new moon. For the same reason, the church sets the date of the spring equinox at March 21, even though the actual vernal equinox can occur on March 20. These two approximations allow the church to set a universal date for Easter, regardless of when you observe the paschal full moon in your time zone. From www.learnreligions.com

WHAT IS A CHRISM MASS?

Traditionally, the Chrism Mass is celebrated during Holy Week, on the morning of Holy Thursday. However, it can fall on another day of the week, or during the Lenten season, as close to Holy Week as possible. During the Mass, three types of oils are blessed for use in each parish in the diocese for the

coming year. Also at the Mass, all the priests and the bishop publicly renew their commitment to priestly service. **WHAT ARE THE THREE OILS?** The three oils are the Sacred Chrism, Oil of Catechumens, and the Oil of the Sick. **SACRED CHRISM** The Sacred Chrism is consecrated by the bishop at the Chrism Mass. It is important to note that it may only be consecrated by the bishop. The bishop pours a fragrant perfume called balsam* into the oil and mixes it. Its distinct smell is meant to symbolize the 'aroma of Christ' which our lives are meant to give off. (CCC 1294) The Sacred Chrism is used to anoint the newly baptized, to seal the candidates for Confirmation, and to anoint the hands of priests and heads of bishops at their ordination. The Sacred Chrism is also used in rituals pertaining to the dedication of churches and altars. Anointing with the Sacred Chrism signifies the call of the baptized to the threefold ministry of priest, prophet, and king. *Balsam is an oily, resinous and fragrant substance from plants. **OIL OF CATECHUMENS** The Oil of Catechumens is blessed by the bishop at the Chrism Mass. Children and adults preparing for the Sacrament of Baptism are anointed with this oil as a preparation for the life in Christ that awaits them in baptism. It is used as a source of strength to renounce sin and the devil. **OIL OF THE SICK** The Oil of the Sick is blessed by the bishop at the Chrism Mass. It is used to anoint the elderly and those suffering from serious illness so that they might find healing and strength through the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick.



WHY DO THE PRIESTS AND BISHOP RENEW THEIR PRIESTLY PROMISES AT THIS MASS? :

The bishop invites the priests to renew the promises they made at their ordination: to dedicate their life in service to the Church - to preach the Gospel and teach the Catholic faith, to faithfully celebrate the sacraments and to pray for God's people. The bishop also asks the people to pray for their priests, that the Lord may bless them with the fullness of his love and to help them be faithful ministers of Christ. The bishop also asks for prayers for himself so that he may be a faithful and humble servant to all. **WHAT HAPPENS WITH THE OILS AFTER THE CHRISM MASS? :** At the end of Chrism Mass, the Holy Oils are brought back to the parishes of the diocese for use in the coming year. They are usually presented to the parish community during the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. Parishes keep the Holy Oils in a receptacle called an ambry, usually near the baptismal font.
