Homily by Richard Leonard SJ.

There are people inside and outside the Church who think that Christ did not give the Church a mandate to speak about political matters. They regularly quote the Gospel we have just heard to support their case.

But if one knows and understands the context and meaning within which this text was written it provides no ammunition for those who want the Church to stay indoors, reflect on things 'spiritual', preach the eternal verities, and sing hymns more ancient than modern.

In Jesus' day, we know that some people thought he was a Zealot. Zealots were a well-organised group who agitated for the end of the Roman occupation of Israel. One of the things Zealots did was withhold paying the Roman taxes. We can see why some people thought Jesus may have been a Zealot. He took the part of the poor, the sick, women and those who lived on the fringes of society. He attacked

the religious authorities of his day and certainly stirred up trouble in many places he went. On the other hand he rejected violence, taught his followers to pray for their enemies and to return good for evil. Jesus showed us that the justice and equality God longs to see in the world comes from a community which is converted by love, not by weapons, fear or revenge. Jesus was no Zealot.

Rather than undermine civil authority, however, Jesus, in this passage, supports it. But he does more. 'Give to Caesar what is Caesar's' is followed by 'And give to God, what is God's', which encompasses all the Caesars of this world, all civil authorities and states.

The sense that we as the People of God can split off our obligations to the Gospel from the State is as false as it's dangerous. We only have to think of some of the darkest chapters last century to see what happens when good, church-going people, like us, do not put their Sunday devotion in touch with their Monday politics. Evil can reign.

Christian leaders, who are charged to proclaim and defend the Gospel, are obliged to use whatever forum necessary to declare that God's personal love encompasses everyone and everything under heaven. As the prophet Isaiah reminds us today, God calls each one of us by name.

At times we may not agree with our religious leaders; we may think them ill informed; we may even think they have overstepped the mark. If this is the case we should tell them, enable them to consider other perspectives and to broaden the basis upon which they make their judgments. But we should never be seduced by those who want the Church sidelined from the mainstream of the debates that shape the way we live, the values we share, the laws we draft and the priorities we draw up for our human community.

If the Church shows disinterest in any of this, it is untrue to the very things for which Jesus lived, died and was raised from the dead. By all means we should give to Caesar all that Caesar is justly entitled to have for the sake of the common good. A higher allegiance, however, goes to God, who will call all Caesars to account for what they have done and what they failed to do. And we might be asked to explain how we let them get away with it in the first place.

A letter to the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay \sim [13 October 2020] My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

In our Catholic tradition, the month of October is dedicated to the Rosary. It is particularly meaningful for us in the Diocese of Broken Bay because our Cathedral is dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary. The Parishes of Wyoming and The Entrance also enjoy the patronage of Mary, Queen of the Holy Rosary.



The Gospel reading for the Mass of the feast is Luke's account of the Annunciation (Luke 1: 26-38). The Gospel recounts for us the moment when Mary is told that she will be a blessed Mother. The Church in her wisdom has made this moment part of our liturgical year, to remind us of this momentous junction in the story of our salvation.

During this October, I invite you to spend some time each day praying the Rosary. Try not to make it a series of repetitious prayers. Instead, see the meditation as a moment of encounter with Jesus, in the company of His Blessed Mother. If you are not used to praying the Rosary, it might be a challenge at first. Might I suggest that you begin by praying with someone else, or with your family after dinner in the evening.

Each mystery is designed to give us a sense of the wondrous moments when God breaks into human history and therefore into our lives. The mysteries remind us that God's entering into our history is not an abstract proposition, but a personal encounter. The Lord does not just come, He comes to us. And in coming to us, the Lord gives us this invitation, to become a fragrant sacrifice for the life of the world (cf Ephesians 5:2).

Nothing gives God more joy, my sisters and brothers, than hearing that someone has accepted the Divine invitation to live life to the full. And nothing gives the world more joy, true joy, than receiving the gift of Jesus Christ into our lives. This is how stupendous a moment the Annunciation is.

The medieval saint and scholar, Bernard of Clairvaux, beautifully spelled out just how important this moment was. In a prayer to Mary, written as if he were there himself, St Bernard wrote: The price of our salvation is offered to you. We shall be set free at once if you consent... In your brief response we are to be remade in order to be recalled to life. Tearful Adam with his sorrowing family begs this of you, O loving Virgin... Abraham begs it, David begs it... This is what the whole earth waits for, prostrate at your feet... Answer quickly, O Virgin. Reply in haste to the angel, or rather through the angel to the Lord. Answer with a word, receive the Word of God. Speak your own word, conceive the Divine Word. Breathe a passing word, embrace the eternal Word.

We know Mary's words in response. And with these words, Mary becomes both the Blessed Mother of our Lord Jesus Christ and the model of discipleship for every single one of us. Like Mary, we are invited to be open to God, and say "yes" to God when we are called. Like Mary, we are invited to carry Jesus with us in our life, in the community of the Church, and to those that we encounter in the world.

In the words of St Paul, we "put on Christ" (cf Galatians 3:27), so that in our encounters with others, they may come to encounter Christ, and savour the life that God planned for the world from the very beginning. It can be an encounter with God through us, his humble servants.

This month of the Rosary is a reminder of the pivotal moment of transformation that can come with every encounter with the Lord, and the powerful transformations that occur when we respond to that encounter with Mary's yes.

May Our Lady of the Rosary pray for us all that we may come to recognise God's calling in every moment of our lives, and may we be granted Mary's courage to echo her words "Let what you have said be done unto me".

Personal Participation of the Eucharist

It is good to see the increasing number of our parishioners for the participation of our daily masses and weekend masses. Vatican calls for a "necessary and urgent" return to in-person Mass. Very recently, Cardinal Robert Sarah, the Prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship has sent a letter to world's Episcopal conferences which says, "Broadcast liturgies can never replace personal participation in the Eucharist". He has encouraged them a return to the "normality of Christian life," in particular to the resumption of regular participation at Mass. He continues to say that "As soon as circumstances permit, it is necessary and urgent to return to the normality of Christian life, which has the church building as its home and the celebration of the liturgy, especially the Eucharist as the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed...".


