The Gaze of Jesus © Michael Tate Where is the *man* in this story? Notice it is the *woman* who is taken, afraid for her life, and made to

stand in the middle of the mob. Where was the man? Century after century, it is women who have been stereotyped as the seductresses and have borne the blame, and been made to suffer, whilst the men get off scot-free, discarding the women to their fate.

But, that is not the aspect of the story I want to focus on.

This story is all about 'eyes' and how you 'see' someone.

The accusers of this woman make her 'stand there in full view of everybody.'

She is surrounded by the hostile glare of eyes filled with blood lust – eyes full of condemnation and hate - eyes boring in on her dishevelled and distressed state - eyes which already see her as a mess of crushed skull and broken bones from the stoning they are anticipating. Jesus *never* looks at the woman while she is being accused.

It is only when the accusers have left in

embarrassment that Jesus, who has been bent to the ground doodling in the dust, looks up at her. Isn't that remarkable!

Jesus – the Lord of the Universe

Jesus – the one whom angels worship

Jesus - the human expression of the All Merciful

does not tower over her - but 'looks up'.

*He* is the one on the ground. He is the truly '*earthed*' one in this story.

He is so well grounded that he is quite content to adopt the posture of a slave.

Can you imagine the electricity in that glance upwards of Jesus?

– not the condemning *glare*, but the *gaze* of love

- a look which sees her as God intended her to be

- a look which *sees* her potential

- which sees her as she could be if she gives up her current pattern of behaviour. And then Jesus speaks to her!

Up till now, *no*-one has spoken to this woman; she has been a mere object.

Now, she is not only reassured by his eyes. She hears his voice. He is treating her as a human being worth speaking to. And what does she hear?

That Jesus has a better way of dealing with sin than condemnation and punishment.

I am reminded of the new story of a bishop in South America who severely criticised rigid priests in his diocese who had refused to baptise the child of an unmarried woman. He called them hypocrites, praised the young woman who had carried the baby to term, and lamented the fact that she had had to wander from presbytery to presbytery for the baptism of her child.

That bishop acted in total harmony with today's gospel. That bishop was elected as Pope. That is why I am so full of hope for the future of the Church.

Jesus' method is indeed pastoral. He looks at the woman, he talks to the woman, he looks and talks in a way which rescues us from the past and frees us to live a new sort of life in the future. Only then: 'Go, sin no more.'

Yes, the challenge is given to me to give up some behaviour which may be harmful to another, and is always dehumanising for me. But the challenge only comes after Our Lord has affirmed that I am a person worth his looking at and talking with.

Do we really believe in *this* scenario?

Don't you know from your own experience that a look, a glance, can change the future? Haven't you felt the electricity when eyes lock, perhaps across a crowded room? Jesus looks at you, looks at me, that way.

Do you have the courage to 'lock eyes' with Jesus and live out the consequences? 'The eyes have it.'

## **REFLECTION** © Greg Sunter

This entire scene is a conspiratorial 'set-up' to trap Jesus. Jewish law dictated that adultery was to be punished by death for both parties. However, the Roman occupation had forbidden the Jewish authorities to carry out the death penalty. By bringing the woman to Jesus they sought to place him in a nowin situation. If he upheld the Jewish law and ordered the death penalty, then he was flaunting Roman law. If he did not uphold the law then he could be branded as a false teacher. They thought it was a perfect trap!

But where is the man with whom the woman was committing adultery? When he is not also brought forward for judgment as any legitimate accusation would demand, Jesus senses the trap being set for him. He realises that those accusing the woman must have somehow been involved in setting her up so that she could be 'caught committing adultery'. In Jewish law, accessories to a crime were equally guilty and subject to the same penalty. When Jesus says to the gathering, 'If there is one of you who has not sinned ...,' he's letting them know that he's aware of their part in this crime and what judgment is due them also! If they persist with their accusation, they'll also be tried as accessories! So they quietly walk away.

Jesus' words to the woman sum up his message throughout the gospel: 'Neither do I condemn you, go away, and don't sin any more.' As with others in the gospels, Jesus recognises that the woman has indeed sinned, but he does not condemn her for it. By telling her not to sin any more he is calling her to conversion. He is saying, yes, you've made mistakes, but you can do better and I'm challenging you to try.

#### **Gospel Focus – Restoring honour**

When the accused woman is brought before Jesus for judgment he neither looks at the woman nor at the accusers. He bends down and writes in the dirt. When the accusers melt away, Jesus (still kneeling on the ground) looks up at the woman to speak to her. She has probably never been treated with this level of respect in all her life. With this action, as much as anything else, Jesus restores dignity and honour to the woman. No longer looked down upon, she can begin a new life.

#### Living the Gospel – Forgiven, not forgotten

The words Jesus speaks to the accused woman could as easily be addressed to each of us. We all feel at times that we've done the wrong thing – something we don't deserve to be forgiven for. However, Jesus says to us, I know you've done the wrong thing, and you are already forgiven, but you need to make a commitment to change and not repeat the error. It is Jesus' promise not to give up on us - not to forget about us – that we can draw strength from as we try to respond to his challenge to change.

#### Scriptural context – Jerusalem

This gospel passage begins with Jesus going to the Mount of Olives. We know the Mount of Olives best from the passion narratives in the synoptic gospels. But today's passage is not part of the last week of Jesus' life. The three synoptic gospels generally portray the ministry of Jesus as something of a journey towards Jerusalem and have him arriving just in time for the Passover and his arrest. However, the gospel of John places most of Jesus' ministry in and around Jerusalem to better focus the tension between the teachings of Jesus and the Jewish hierarchy.

#### The Scarlet Letter ~ has some similarities with today's Gospel story of the woman caught in adultery.



In 1850 Nathaniel Hawthorne published *The Scarlet Letter*. Its setting was a Puritan community in Boston in early New England. Hawthorne's novel tells the story of Hester Prynne who was forced to wear the scarlet letter "A" for "adultery" because she had given birth to an illegitimate child and refused to name the father. The child's father was none other than the community's minister, Arthur Dimmesdale.

Hester bore the letter, the public scorn and the humiliation alone, while the minister had merely to bear the pangs of conscience. After many years, the minister finally confessed his secret sin to the people and later died in peace. Hester continued to wear her letter, and went on to live like a saint bringing happiness to her disturbed illegitimate daughter and helping others in their troubles. The townsfolk said the letter stood, not for Adultery as it had done but now for Able, and a sign of honor.
