#### Wedding Garments at Baptisms! © Fr Michael Tate

If Eddie McGuire sent you and your family an invitation to a Collingwood luncheon, all expenses paid, of course you might reject it out of hostility or indifference, but if you went, I bet you would find something black and white to wear. Even the baby in your arms would probably wear a black and white beanie. It would be a show of gratitude, of being willing to dress up for the occasion.

This is only a parable! But you get the point, Eddie would expect you to make an effort. That is what the king in the gospel parable expected. The king who is God had invited all to come into the great banquet hall of his Kingdom. Some were indifferent, or openly hostile and they rejected the invitation.

The servants of the king went out and gathered in 'all whom they found, good and evil alike'. They respond, drawn by the attractive prospect of sharing in the life of the Lord of the Feast, and they are welcomed, whether good or evil. We don't have to first prove ourselves good and worthy of Divine Love who is seeking us out. God simply ardently loves us. And so the invitation and the welcome is extended to all.

By the way, this is why Catholics believe in infant baptism. There is nothing the baby brings apart from its beautiful existence. Proof of capacity to understand all that is happening is not required. It is sufficient that the baby be surrounded by the faith of parents and the local church community.

At the baptisms of infants, it is always a nice moment when the godparents help put a white shawl around the shoulders of the baby or little child. It may have been used for the baptism of a grandmother present at the ceremony, or be

completely new. With teenagers or adults, I ask them to be ready at this point in the ritual to change into a white shirt or blouse or at least drape a white scarf around their shoulders.

So, at every baptism, we look for a signal of commitment to respond to the spirit of the occasion, by the wearing of a white garment. This is the point of the king's (God's) question to the wedding guest. He asks the guest: 'My friend, how come you are here without a wedding garment?' The guest might have replied: 'Because of dire poverty', or 'Lack of time', but the story goes on, 'But the guest was silent'. The guest was tongue-tied because he was caught out having decided not to enter into the spirit of the occasion. The wearing of the white garment by the newly baptised indicates that they are appropriately attired for their sacramental presence in the banquet hall of God's kingdom. At a later stage in life, Holy Communion will be offered: a real foretaste of the Great Banquet of Heaven. Until we reach that ultimate banquet, let us constantly enter into the Spirit of the occasion wearing the garment of our baptismal commitment in the way we live and thus remain forever in the Banquet Hall of the King of the Feast.

# A letter to the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay $\sim$ [6 October 2020] My dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, Last Sunday at the tomb of Saint Francis of Assisi, our Holy Father Francis signed the third encyclical of his pontificate. It is called "Fratelli tutti" and in the letter Pope Francis takes up the theme of fraternity and social friendship. "Fratelli tutti" is a literal quotation from Saint Francis of Assisi, who, as the Pope immediately explains: "... addressed his brothers and sisters and proposed to them a way of life marked by the flavour of the Gospel." (FT 1) I think that what will be important for us as the community of the Church of Broken Bay, is to reflect prayerfully, not just on the thoughts and words of the encyclical, but also upon our own circumstances in the Diocese and in the society in which we live. In Chapter One, there is an obvious reference to shadows over the closed world which are spreading and leaving people injured by the roadside, cast out, and discarded. These shadows plunge people into confusion, loneliness, and desolation. Dare I say that these shadows existed before the COVID-19 pandemic. Within the Church there is at times division, animosity, and antagonism amongst members who call themselves brothers and sisters of Jesus Christ. I have people from within our community who write to me selectively quoting bits and pieces of Church teaching to support their viewpoint or the ideology that they desire to promote. I am glad that people are reading the teachings of the Church, however, I would be even more grateful if people read them with an open mind and heart, with the desire to engage in fruitful and respectful dialogue, and within the context in which they were written. I suppose that this is an ongoing discipline that each one of us might need to attend to, in a spirit of fraternity and social friendship. If we are able to love one another, how much more effect will our witness to the Gospel be to the world? Pope Francis reminds us that knowing how to dialogue is the way to open the world and build social friendship (cf FT Chapter Six) which manifests an open heart and provides the basis for better politics. Dialogue gives rise to the culture of encounter, which becomes a passionate way of life. People who dialogue are generous, recognising, and respectful of others. Time and time again in the Gospels, Jesus engages people through dialogue. Dialogue is animated by love and requires active listening as well as speaking. The Holy Father offers us an opportunity for growth, as individuals and as a community of faith. He recalls that encounter is not enough. We have to face the reality of the injuries of past mis-encounters, and so we have to establish and walk paths of re-encounter (cf FT Chapter Seven). Wounds need healing. As individuals and as a community we need both to seek and to offer forgiveness (cf Luke 15:11-32). The Pope urges us to be daring and to start from the truth, which is the inseparable companion of justice and mercy. Page 2/2 A final thought is the reminder that for us Christians, the source of human dignity and fraternity is the Good News of Jesus Christ. Our inspiration to be faithful, active, and committed is always the joy of the Gospel. Pope Francis invites us to make our own the world's desire for fraternity, beginning with the recognition that we are all brothers and sisters – Fratelli tutti. Peace be with you, + Authory

#### Personal Participation of the Eucharist


It is good to see the increasing number of our parishioners for the participation of our daily masses and weekend masses. Vatican calls for a "necessary and urgent" return to in-person Mass. Very recently, Cardinal Robert Sarah, the Prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship has sent a letter to world's Episcopal conferences which says, "Broadcast liturgies can never replace personal participation in the Eucharist". He has encouraged them a return to the "normality of Christian life," in particular to the resumption of regular participation at Mass. He continues to say that "As soon as circumstances permit, it is necessary and urgent to return to the normality of Christian life, which has the church building as its home and the celebration of the liturgy, especially the Eucharist as the summit toward which the activity of the Church is directed...".

Mother Teresa & the Rosary

"Cling to the Rosary as the creeper clings to the tree - for without Our Lady we cannot stand." (Mother Teresa of Calcutta)

Three Years after her death, the late, Pope John Paul II, said of Mother Teresa: "as the years pass, her memory remains more vivid than ever. We remember her with her smile, her deep gaze, her rosary." (John Paul II on 5 September 2000) and at the time of her beatification he remarked: "Is it not significant that her beatification is taking place on the very day on which the Church celebrates World Mission Sunday? With the witness

of her life, Mother Teresa reminds everyone that the evangelizing mission of the Church passes through charity, nourished by prayer and listening to God's word. Emblematic of this missionary style is the image that shows the new Blessed clasping a child's hand in one hand while moving her Rosary beads with the other. Contemplation and action, evangelization and human promotion: Mother Teresa proclaimed the Gospel living her life as a total gift to the poor but, at the same time, steeped in prayer.
