2nd Sunday of Advent - The Pointing Man

Today our Gospel features St John the Baptist, one of the most important figures in all Scripture (Lk.7:28). He often appears in Christian art with an unruly mop of hair, wearing camel-skin and a leather belt - and with a pointing hand. The image of John in camel-skin comes from Matthew's Gospel today. By mentioning this detail, Matthew is linking John the Baptist with the great prophet Elijah, who wore something similar (2Kgs.1:8). The Jewish people long believed that one day Elijah would return from heaven to prepare the way for the Messiah. So, by emphasising the camel-skin, Matthew is presenting John as the new Elijah who is announcing the arrival of the Messiah and warning us all to get ready. He is the pointing man, pointing us all towards Christ. This is why we often see him in paintings pointing towards a Bible, a lamb or to an image of Jesus himself. In Leonardo da Vinci's last painting, St John the Baptist, he's pointing up towards heaven, reminding us of our need for eternal salvation. In 2016, Pope Francis described John the Baptist as the lamp pointing towards the light and bearing witness to the light. But he's not the light itself, for that is Jesus Christ. He also said that John is 'the voice', the 'voice crying in the wilderness.' But he is not the Word itself. He is only the voice bearing witness to the Word and pointing to the Word, the Word of God. For this was the entire purpose of his life: to prepare the way for the Messiah. This explains why his parents, Elizabeth and Zechariah, waited so long for him to be born. In God's plan, John could not have arrived any earlier. He had to wait until the time was right for Jesus' birth, because their lives were inextricably linked. Indeed, when Jesus began his public ministry, he used John's words: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!' (Mt.3:1). John's message is simple and still very relevant today: we need to change the way we live, to turn away from sin, because Christ is coming. This Advent, let's remember the remarkable saint who encourages us to get serious about eternal life. He dedicated his entire life to only one thing: pointing us all towards Christ.

First Reading

Is 11:1-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

He judges the poor with justice.

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.) He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land. His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless, his sentences bring death to the wicked. Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips. The wolf lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them. The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together. The lion eats straw like the ox. The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand. They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea. That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious.

Second Reading

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Christ, the hope of all people.

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

Gospel

Mt 3:1-12

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.

In due course John the Baptist Appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said: A voice cries in the Wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight. This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees comin g for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out."
