

FEAST OF ST. PHILIP NERI

St. Philip Neri, born on July 21, 1515, in Florence, also known as the "Apostle of Rome" was an Italian priest and a prominent figure in the Counter-Reformation movement. He grew up in a deeply religious household and displayed great piety from an early age. In 1533, Philip moved to Rome, where he lived as a layman while pursuing his studies. During this time, he spent his days visiting churches and catacombs, praying fervently, and offering assistance to the poor and sick. Inspired by his spiritual experiences and a desire to serve God more fully, Philip was ordained a priest in 1551.

He established the Oratory, a community of priests and laymen, where they would gather for prayer, spiritual conversations, and acts of charity. Throughout his life, Philip Neri became renowned for his gifts of prophecy, healing, and discernment of spirits. He possessed a deep understanding of the human heart and provided wise counsel to people from all walks of life, including saints, artists, and popes. His humility, simplicity, and joy attracted many individuals to seek his quidance and spiritual direction.



St. Philip Neri died on May 26, 1595, at the age of 79. His feast day is celebrated on May 26th each year. Pope Gregory XV canonized him in 1622, recognizing his significant contributions to the Church and his holiness of life.


donation page on our website where donations can be made at any time. However this PWBB May appeal is the last one for the financial year 2022/2023 and all donations over \$2 are tax deductible.

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Vox Episcopi 25 May 2023

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

When Saint Paul wrote to the Corinthians instructing them about gifts, he was not just reminding them of how talented they might be, but rather that they were gifted by God for a purpose. And that purpose could only be realised if each one lived in a full and wholesome relationship with God. In the Letter to the Romans, Saint Paul reminds us that the Spirit is not just some force or power of God the Father, but a person who works along with the Son and in relation to the Father.

The Spirit teaches us to be authentic in our relationship with God. Not to see God as a force or power, but as a person who thinks about us and loves each one of us and works for us and redeems us.

As sons and daughters of God we are led by the Spirit. As Catholic Christians we believe that the Holy Spirit is the ultimate preview and pledge of our salvation.

Some years ago, during one of his catechetical teachings Pope Benedict XVI spoke with conviction when he said, "One of the greatest evils of our time is mediocrity in matters of faith. Either we are Catholic, or we are not. If we are then this must be manifested in every aspect of our lives" (Visit to Croatia 7 June 2011). These challenging words are a reminder of the vocation that lies before all of the baptised.

They are an even more sober reminder of the vocation of the bishop, the priest, and the deacon, whose lives must be spent at the service of the faithful, who in turn, having been nourished by Word and Sacrament, will be God's presence in the world, not by way of mediocrity, but with excellence, enthusiasm, and distinction.

My dear people, the Holy Spirit is at work in the Church and indeed in each one of us in Broken Bay. As we prepare for the great feast of Pentecost, may we be strong in our faith and confident in our hope as together we pray:

Come, Holy Spirit! Come, light of our hearts. Make us witnesses before the world so that God may be all in all and our joy may be complete.



The Divine Retreat Centre promotes the safety and protection of children and other vulnerable persons in its care.

300 people attended the 2023 Catholic Mission Conference in Sydney last week, where the focus was on synodality, truth-telling and mission. I believe it was a significant moment in the life of the Australian Church, in as much as 300 people passionate about mission gathered from all parts of Australia, not only to be renewed and inspired by the speakers, but also to be led in processes of deep listening and discernment to hear what the Spirit is calling us to be. We were challenged to engage our hearts as much as our heads, and to commit to something *more* in whatever it is we call our mission.

The first keynote speaker, Dean Parkin, engaged in truth-telling around the Uluru Statement from the Heart, impressing upon us the fact that it is an invitation to us all to become citizens of a more inclusive and unified nation. Furthermore, this invitation was not given to the government, it was given to the people, in the belief and conviction that we would accept it. The audience was clearly deeply moved by this conviction and gave Dean a standing ovation.

How do we know when truth-telling and prophetic speech come from the Spirit?

Dr Elissa Roper suggested that we look for signs of authenticity and the fruits of the Spirit, but also pointed out the need for training when it comes to learning how to speak boldly and listen with humility. Bishop Shane Macklinlay was able to reflect on his recent experience of the Plenary Council to say that the processes of dialogue and discernment cannot be rushed. They are also processes of learning and conversion, not subject to timetables, and we need to be patient and strive for consensus before making decisions.

On the second day, Chiara Porro, the Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, spoke to us on Zoom from Rome, in the very early hours of her morning. A large part of her talk focused on indigenous issues, and it was interesting to hear her speak as if it is certain that a constitutional Voice will become a reality. This, at least, is how it sounded to me, which was a refreshing change to some of the negative debate we have been hearing here in recent weeks. I was also struck by her perspective, which is a new insight for me: that our identity as a nation grounded in a 60,000 year culture (if the referendum is passed) will change our relationship for the better not only with our Pacific neighbours but with the rest of the world.

Auxiliary Bishop of Brisbane, Tim Norton, spoke next, exploring mission as dialogue and mission as prophecy, sharing moving examples of modern day prophets in Brisbane. When someone asked him what we can do when the institutional church is driving us nuts, he told us simply, "Go to the poor. That's where Jesus is." Having listened to some of his story, this was obviously an authentic response, but also a challenge to usual ways of thinking.
