Parking at Weekend Masses: A Message of Welcome, Safety, and Courtesy

Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

It is a great blessing to see so many people gathering each weekend to celebrate Mass together at Manly. Whether you are a long-time member of our parish or visiting for the first time, your presence is a gift to our community, and we want you to feel truly welcomed and at home here.

As our numbers grow, we are aware that parking can sometimes be a challenge, especially at the 8:30am and 10:30am Sunday Masses. With this in mind, we would like to gently share a few reminders—rooted in both pastoral care and our shared responsibility for one another's safety.

Keeping It Safe and Accessible

Please do <u>not double park or block other vehicles</u>. While it might seem like a quick solution, doing so can seriously hinder access—particularly in emergencies. If an ambulance or emergency service needs to reach someone and the driveway is blocked, it could delay urgent care. For this reason, <u>the driveway must remain</u> completely clear at all times.

Making Use of Nearby Parking

If the parish car park is full, we warmly encourage you to take advantage of the Council car parks, all of which offer 2 hours of free parking:

- Manly National Carpark Central Avenue
- Pacific Waves Carpark Central Avenue
- Whistler Street Carpark Whistler Street

These are just a short walk away and a helpful way to ease congestion here on parish grounds.

For the 8:30am Mass Community

If you are attending the 8:30am Mass, please aim to move your car before 10:15am, especially if you are heading to morning tea or a gathering afterward. This helps free up space for those arriving for the 10:30am Mass.

A Spirit of Hospitality

We never want someone to turn away from Sunday Mass because they could not find a place to park. Let us continue to make our parish a place of welcome and generosity, not only inside the church, but even in the way we share our car park. Every thoughtful decision helps someone else feel at ease and at home.

The Mission of the Lay Faithful Part 1 - Their Secular Character

Over the past few weeks, we have been reflecting on the various vocations in the Church, and their nature and mission. This week, I would like to focus more

specifically on the mission of the **lay faithful**—whether single, married, or widowed—both in the Church and in the world. One particularly important Church document in this regard is *Christifideles Laici* (The Lay Members of Christ's Faithful People), promulgated by Pope John Paul II in 1988 following a Synod dedicated to this very topic.

We've already mentioned that all Christians, regardless of their specific vocation, are called to a life of holiness according to their state in life. As disciples of Jesus, they share in His threefold office of **Priest, Prophet, and King** (cf. *Lumen Gentium* 10, 12, 36). Over the coming weeks, we will explore in more detail what this means in practice for lay Catholics. In other words: **how are the lay faithful called to imitate Christ more closely in their daily lives?**

This is a vital question, because the vast majority of Catholics are lay people, and it is they who stand on the **front lines of the Church's mission in the world** (CL, 9). *Christifideles Laici* emphasises that the lay faithful possess a **"secular character"** by virtue of their presence and activity in the world. They have secular professions and occupations, and they are deeply involved in the ordinary circumstances of daily life—family life, social relationships, civic responsibilities, and cultural engagement.

It is precisely **within these spheres** that they are primarily called to live out their Christian vocation: to engage in temporal affairs and to sanctify the world from within by bringing the light of the Gospel into every aspect of human life. Their mission is to **infuse the world with the message of salvation**, seeking to orient all things toward communion with God in Christ (CL, 3, 17; LG, 33; cf. 1 Cor 7:24).

This **secular character** of the lay vocation is to be understood as a **form of spirituality**—one that is lived out in the concrete circumstances of everyday life. Lay people are called to use their **spiritual gifts and charisms** to do the will of God by serving others and society, thereby **building up the Kingdom of God in the world** (*Apostolicam Actuositatem* 4; CL 55).

To build up the Kingdom means the lay faithful are called to actively participate in the various dimensions of society—social, political, economic, cultural, legislative, and administrative—and to infuse them with Gospel values. In doing so, they help ensure these structures and institutions serve the common good of all people in society, no matter their creed (CL 42).

Next week, we will look more closely at how the Synod Fathers envisioned this engagement, and we'll highlight some of the more pressing contemporary concerns that call for renewed attention and action by the lay faithful.

May Our Lady, Star of the New Evangelisation, inspire the lay faithful to see and embrace the mission God has entrusted to them in the world. Amen.

Gospel Reflection

A lawyer's question about who is – and, by implication, who is **not** – one's neighbor sets the

stage for one of Jesus' most beloved parables, the story of the Good Samaritan (found only in Luke's Gospel). Jesus stuns his hearers by making a Samaritan the hero of the story – especially in light of the *inhospitality* of the Samaritans to Jesus and his companions on their journey to Jerusalem (the Gospel for the 13th Sunday of Year). Jesus' hearers would expect a Samaritan to be the villain of the story, not the hero. While the two clerics do not help the man for fear of violating the Torah by being defiled by the dead, the compassionate Samaritan – a man presumably with little concern for Jewish belief or morality – is so moved by the plight of the poor man that he thinks nothing of stopping to help regardless of the cost of time or money.

The Jews of Jesus' time defined "neighbor" exclusively as another Jew, but Jesus' parable of the Samaritan expands Good such concept. One of the key principles of Christianity is the concept that all men and women are "neighbors": children of the same heavenly Father, brothers and sisters in Christ. The Samaritan and the traveler illustrate that Jesus' concept of "neighbor" is not limited to one's own clan or community. Christ-like compassion must be manifested in deeds of kindness; morality, in the light of the Gospel, cannot be guided by laws inscribed in stone but ultimately by the spirit of the heart. 

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Who is my neighbour?

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus. 'Do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself.'
