# Dear Fríends,

I hope you are all well. Bishop Anthony's letter in this weekend's bulletin on page 6 reminds us to take extra care during these uncertain times. It's encouraging to see many of you coming along to Mass on Sunday. While the 8:30am, 10:30am and 6pm Masses are well attended, the 6pm Vigil at Manly and the 5pm Vigil and 9am Masses at Freshwater still have plenty of seats available.

Today's gospel, the loaves and fishes is very familiar to us but there is still much for us to reflect upon. Fr David Taylor



Jesus withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself . . . Taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, Jesus said the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds. *Matthew* 14: 13-21

The multiplication of the loaves and fish is the only one of Jesus' miracles recorded in all four Gospels. The early Christian community especially cherished this story because they saw this wonder as anticipating the Eucharist and the final banquet in the kingdom of God. This miracle also has strong roots in the First Testament: For the peoples of both the First and New Testament, the image of a great banquet was an important visualization of the reign of God: the gifts of the land were unmistakable signs of their God's great Providence; the Messiah's coming was often portrayed as a great banquet with choice food and wines; the miracle of the loaves and fishes is a clear affirmation in God's providence. Just as the merciful God feeds the wandering Israelites with manna in the desert, Jesus, "his heart moved with pity", feeds the crowds who have come to hear him.

In Matthew's account, Jesus acts out of his great compassion on the crowds. First, he challenges the disciples to give what they have – five loaves and two fish. Then he performs the four-fold action that prefigures the Eucharist: Jesus takes, blesses, breaks and gives the bread and fish to the assembled multitude, making of them a community of the Lord's banquet.

Given the many demands on our time and the expectations of work and school, we need to make time for that "out of that way": quiet deserts and sacred time where and when we can escape the clamor of the marketplace and the tyranny of our calendars to experience the peace of being alone with God, to listen to the voice of God in the quiet of our hearts, to know the joy of doing simple, humble things for others.

More astounding than Jesus' feeding of the five thousand is Jesus' transforming them into a community, a community who becomes one in their need, one in the bread they share, one in the love of Christ who has brought them together. Christ calls us to become a Eucharistic people: to **become** the Eucharist we have received.

We, too, can perform wonders in our own time and place by imitating the four "Eucharistic verbs" of Jesus: to **take** humbly and generously from what we have been given by God, to **bless** by offering it to others in God's love, to **break** from our own needs and interests for the sake of others, to **give** with joy-filled gratitude to the God who has blessed us with so much

The bread of the Eucharist, which we share together in charity and faith, is a prelude to the great banquet of the next world to which our loving Father invites us.

The "fragments" that disciples gather are not to be lost; they are part of the miracle. We are all part of the body of Christ: there are no useless scraps, no wasted fragments: every one of us is a child of God, part of the body of Christ that is blessed, broken and shared at this table. We are only whole when every piece, ever fragment, is gathered.



#### EUCHARISTIC ADORATION AND DIVINE MERCY HOLY HOUR

**Reflection...**In today's readings, we celebrate the great love of God, who not only gives us life, but desires to sustain and nourish us generously too.

In the **First Reading**, it is God himself who urgently pleads with his troubled, scattered people to listen. Through his prophet, he issues an invitation to a sacred meal. God offers 'water' for thirsty souls; 'corn, wine and milk' will also be made freely available for hungry hearts, without charge.

In the **Psalm**, one traditionally sung at meals, we praise the God who cares for all his creatures, supplying them with nourishment.

Paul writes in very stirring language, assuring us of the ever-present love and power of Jesus Christ. Divine love gives us grace and encouragement to live life to the fullest, even with and through the unavoidable trials and sufferings of life. This is the Christian gospel, the Good News! (Second Reading).

Jesus's response to the people is one of compassion **(Gospel)**. He heals the sick and feeds the hungry, and there is still plenty of food left over to share. Jesus feeds the crowd in a way that foresees the food and drink he will offer us in the Eucharist.

Let's pray this week for courage to take the risk of really hearing what God is saying to us; what sacred nourishment he is freely offering us. May we put ourselves into his hands, asking that he will deepen his life in us and in our anxious, unjust world.

Fill their hearts with love for you and your creation; open their minds to a lifetime of learning; and make them humble servants of your holy people.



#### Bishop of Broken Bay

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Over the past fortnight, we have seen an escalation of COVID cases, not just in the State of Victoria, but also in parts of Sydney. It is worrying, but not unexpected.

Some of the most vocal critics are the very same people who advocate large public gatherings and demonstrations, as well as those who seem to flaunt the physical distancing recommendations and precautionary hygiene measures.

My dear people, now is not the time to relax our vigilance as a community of the Church. The Government measures that have been in place and that we have adopted as a Diocese are for the protection and well-being of all. I would like to thank you for implementing these measures and I urge you to continue to be observant and respectful of them. As a Catholic community, it is important that we take a leading role in good citizenship.

I was reminded this week that the Spanish Influenza pandemic of 1918 swiftly spread around the world and was not "under control" until 1920. While the COVID-19 Coronavirus is different to the Spanish Flu, there is much for us to learn as a community regarding how we might contribute to the safety of our society.

The Flu took a heavy toll on family life. Community wellbeing was threatened continuously over a threeyear period. The economy was damaged as businesses closed, workers found themselves unemployed, and basic services such as mail delivery and garbage collection were hindered due to flustricken workers.

Thanks be to God, we have a much stronger health system in 2020 than in 1920. We also have access to cleaning and sanitising products that were simply not available to the masses 100 years ago. However, family life is just as vulnerable now as it was during the Spanish Flu because human lives and relationships are always vulnerable in moments of crisis. Likewise, the economy and the availability of gainful employment is currently under threat.

Being aware that members of the community are at risk or in danger is one of our major efforts at this time. Our Parishes, Catholic Schools, and CatholicCare communities are particularly well placed to be alert to risk and they are places where people feel secure. They are for many a safe harbour in the storm.

This week, I urge you to renew your efforts to ensure that you and your family remain attentive to the need for good hygiene, at home and when you are out and about. By being attentive, you will help limit the risk in the community of the Church and therefore in our neighbourhoods and social communities. I also encourage you to pray for an end to this time of trial.

*"The plague that prowls in the darkness you will not fear"* (Psalm 90: 5-6)

The words of the psalmist invite us to remain faithful and to take refuge in God's unwavering love. Central to our belief as a Catholic community is that God never abandons His people in time of suffering and hardship.

My prayer this week is that God will protect you and bless you; keep you safe and defend you from all evil; and that you may persevere always in God's love.
