The day began with a deeply prayerful gathering of priests at Cerretti Chapel, the former St Patrick's Seminary, for Adoration and Reconciliation. This was a moment of quiet communion and renewal in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, led by Bishop Anthony.

The celebration continued in our parish church of Mary Immaculate and St Athanasius, where an inspiring reflection was offered by Dr Peter Holmes, who spoke meaningfully on the gift of our *common priesthood*. This was followed by a reverent and joyful Mass celebrated by Bishop Anthony, drawing us into deeper thanksgiving for the gift of ordained ministry and the call of all the baptised.

Afterwards, many stayed to share in supper and fellowship in the parish hall, which was a beautiful expression of communion and joy.

A heartfelt thank you to Chris Lee and the team from the Office for Clergy and Parish Life for their generous support, and to our wonderful parish social group, whose hospitality and service so beautifully reflected the love of Christ in our midst. 

GOSPEL REFLECTION



Three short parables about the treasures of the reign of God are the central images of today's Gospel:

Death comes to us like a "thief" in the night, Jesus tells his listeners; therefore, we must always be ready to meet the Lord and enter his "kingdom" with "belts tightened" and through works of charity. The first generations of Christians read this parable as an indication that Christ would return in their lifetimes, in the middle of the great Paschal night.

Jesus frequently speaks of the coming reign of his Father as a wedding feast to which all of the faithful are invited. Luke includes the image in his Gospel, as well, with an interesting twist: Those who have embraced the spirit of servanthood taught by Jesus the Master will be served by the Master himself at his table in heaven. Jesus targets the parable to the leaders of the Jewish establishment who have used their positions to advance their own prestige and wealth at the expense of the people they were appointed to serve. While God casts out the exploiters from his kingdom, the faithful leader-servants will be served by the Messiah himself at God's great banquet.

The third parable is Luke's version of Jesus' story of the watchful steward who faithfully conducts the responsibilities entrusted to him by his master. This life on earth is a time that has been entrusted to us by God be about the business of preparing for the life of the world to come.

The Mission of the Lay Faithful Part 5 – The Socio-economic Question

In part five of our reflection on the **vocation and mission of the lay faithful**, we consider what Pope John Paul II referred to as the "**socio-economic question**" (Christifideles Laici, 43). Last week, we reflected on human work and the organisation of labour—how work is a fundamental dimension of human existence, ennobled by the labours of Christ during His earthly life. Through work, we are called to collaborate with God in cultivating and perfecting creation for our needs and the needs of others.

Human work, therefore, is an essential aspect of economic life. Economic activity refers to the development of wealth, both in quantity and in quality, ordered to the integral development (i.e. wholistic) of the individual and of society (Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church [CSDC], 334). In this regard, the Church upholds the right to private property, while also affirming that the means to social development lie not in "class struggle," but in collaboration that protects the rights and dignity of the poor and weak, and reminds the rich of their obligations toward them (CSDC, 89).

One of the fundamental principles of the Church's social

doctrine the universal destination goods (Christifideles Laici, 43). This principle does not contradict the right to private property; rather, it affirms that God created the world for all of humanity. Thus, the earth's goods are destined for the development of all peoples (Gaudium et Spes, 25). Individual persons, companies, and nations must therefore consider the broader impact of how they use resources-not only for their own benefit, but in service of the common good (CSDC, 178). economic systems, the Church's social doctrine does not endorse any particular model, as determining such specifics falls outside her competence. However, economic systems are not morally neutral. The Church reserves the right to critique unjust or immoral economic ideologies and practices. For example, in Rerum Novarum. condemned atheistic the Church incompatible with communism as the Christian understanding of humanity and creation. Similarly, in regard to free-market capitalism, the Church warns against systems that lack strong legal and regulatory frameworks. Without these, economic activity may be driven by greed and exploitation — rather than **stewardship** — and may cease to serve the common good. Instead, it must be governed by the principles of subsidiarity and solidarity, especially with the poor and the weak. In this respect, the State—as well as private individuals, businesses, and non-profit organisations—all have a role in promoting an economy that unites efficiency with solidarity (CSDC, 335-361).

The lay faithful are called to use their entrepreneurial gifts and talents to generate creative and meaningful work that dignifies human labour and contributes to society's economic wellbeing. At the same time, they must confront the risks and injustices that threaten economic activity today: globalisation's effects on human rights and solidarity; the widening gap between rich and poor; unequal access to technology; protectionist policies that hinder development; predatory financial systems that exploit the vulnerable; and unregulated markets that favour speculation over productive work.

May **Our Lady of Perpetual Help** inspire and assist the lay faithful in ensuring that economic activity is always ordered toward the common good and the service of human dignity. Amen.

First Reading

Wisdom 18:6-9 (JB)

A reading from the book of Wisdom

Just as you struck our enemies, you made us glorious by calling us to you.

That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage. This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes you made us glorious by calling us to you. The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord: that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers.

Second Reading

Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19 (JB)

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

We will look for the city designed and built by God.

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended.

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

All these died in faith, before receiving any of the things that had been promised, but they saw them in the far distance and welcomed them, recognising that they were only strangers and nomads on earth. People who use such terms about themselves make it quite plain that they are in search of their real homeland. They can hardly have meant the country they came from, since they had the opportunity to go back to it; but in fact they were longing for a better homeland, their heavenly homeland. That is why God is not ashamed to be called their God, since he has founded the city for them.

It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead, and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

Luke 12:32-48 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke See that you are prepared.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There is no need to be afraid, little flock, for it has pleased your Father to give you the kingdom.

'Sell your possessions and give alms. Get yourselves purses that do not wear out, treasure that will not fail you, in heaven where no thief can reach it and no moth destroy it. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

Peter said, 'Lord, do you mean this parable for us, or for everyone?' The Lord replied, 'What sort of steward, then, is faithful and wise enough for the master to place him over his household to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Happy that servant if his master's arrival finds him at this employment. I tell you truly, he will place him over everything he owns. But as for the servant who says to himself, "My master is taking his time coming", and sets about beating the menservants and the maids, and eating and drinking and getting drunk, his master will come on a day he does not expect and at an hour he does not know. The master will cut him off and send him to the same fate as the unfaithful.

'The servant who knows what his master wants, but has not even started to carry out those wishes, will receive very many strokes of the lash. The one who did not know, but deserves to be beaten for what he has done, will receive fewer strokes. When a man has had a great deal given him, a great deal will be demanded of him; when a man has had a great deal given him on trust, even more will be expected of him.'
