Our Spiritual Journey

Week 1 - The Search for Happiness

Last Monday, we held the first meeting of our *Our Spiritual Journey* series, focusing on the topic of 'The Search for Happiness.' We began by acknowledging that every person's

spiritual journey begins with the universal pursuit of happiness. As the Greek philosopher **Aristotle** said, every human action is aimed at the ultimate end which is **happiness** (*eudaimonia*). In other words, every decision we make, every goal we pursue, is ultimately motivated by the desire for happiness — even if we don't always agree on what that is.

So, what exactly is happiness? And how can we attain it? Unfortunately, human beings are skilled at staying busy, often to avoid the discomfort of silence and stillness. We've become masters of distraction. People frequently complain about being too busy, but much of this busyness is self-imposed. We shy away from stillness. This realization brings to mind St. Augustine's famous words: "You are great, O Lord, and greatly to be praised... You have made us for Yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in You."

It is this inner restlessness that fuels our frantic lifestyles. Even when on holidays, many of us struggle to truly relax. Yet all religious traditions emphasize the importance of stepping away from the noise of daily life in order to "center" ourselves — to rediscover what truly matters. God, in His wisdom, instituted a Sabbath day of rest precisely for this reason (Genesis 2:2-3). And in the Psalms, we are reminded: "The Lord says: Be still, and know that I am God." (Psalm 46:10).

It's crucial to note, however, that stillness for the sake of stillness alone is not the answer. We avoid silence because we often don't want to face our problems. Noise becomes our coping mechanism. We've all experienced suffering, and sometimes the memories or thoughts tied to that suffering are too painful or overwhelming. We don't know how to process or deal with it. As a result, we distract ourselves with constant activity. But this is where the power of Christian prayer enters. Jesus offers us peace, saying: "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not be afraid." (John 14:27). And again: "I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world!" (John 16:33).

The goal of this series, *Our Spiritual Journey*, is to help us learn how to embrace the healing power of silence, but only through a silence that is focused on God. Jesus desires to heal and empower us. He said, "I came that you may have life, and have it to the full." (John 10:10). For as **Elijah** discovered, it is in the silence that we encounter the Lord (1 Kings 19:11-13). Together, we will explore how to practice silence in the Christian way, and to explore spiritual practices in our Catholic tradition.

May **Our Lady of Consolation** guide us as we seek true happiness, by contemplating Christ in the silence of our hearts. Amen!

Canonisation of -

Blesseds Pier Giorgio Frassati and Carlo Acutis

Sunday 7 September

When Blesseds Pier Giorgio Frassati and Carlo Acutis are canonised on Sunday, 7th September in Rome, they will become the Church's two newest saints.

Despite being on the other side of the world from where the canonisations will take place, there will be particular cause for celebration in the Diocese of Broken Bay, with a special Mass taking place at Our Lady of Dolours Church, Chatswood.

Bishop Anthony Randazzo will celebrate Mass for the pair on Sunday evening at 5:30pm, when he will formally install the relic of Blessed Pier Giorgio and bless the church's new Eucharistic Chapel, where a relic of Blessed Carlo is already installed.

Blesseds Pier Giorgio and Carlo led very different lives, but both responded to the call to holiness at a young age. Blessed Pier Giorgio had a love for the less fortunate and spent a lot of his young life serving people through charitable work. Blessed Carlo had a love of the eucharist, which he wanted to share with others and built a website dedicated to eucharistic miracles.

Chatswood Parish Priest, Fr David Ranson said the canonisation of both saints presented a great message that the Spirit of God can inspire young people to great holiness.

"The canonisations highlight for me the power of the Spirit of God to spark the life of discipleship even amongst people who are young in age," he said.

"It is my hope that these two saints will inspire many young people to live their lives with both passion and purpose. They are wonderful role models for our young people."

The relics of both soon-to-be saints will be permanently housed in the new Eucharistic Chapel in Chatswood and available for veneration when the church is open.



SPIRITUAL CONVERSATIONS GROUP

The group meets on Thursday evenings at 7:00pm at St Mary's Parish Centre.



First Reading Wisdom 9:13-18 (JB)

A reading from the book of Wisdom

Who can comprehend the will of God?

What man can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom.

Second Reading Philemon 1: 9-10, 12-17 (JB)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon

Receive him, not as a slave anymore, but as a very dear brother.

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him - I could say - a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

Luke 14:25-33 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke


All who do not renounce their possessions cannot be my disciples.

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes, and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'

The Gospel of the Lord.

All: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.



GOSPEL REFLECTION

Today's Gospel is the beginning of a treatise, unique to Luke's Gospel, on the nature and demands of discipleship.

Jesus' sobering words in today's

Gospel are meant to make us fully aware of the cost of discipleship before we embrace something we are not prepared for. The gift of grace comes at the price of the same cross awaiting Jesus in Jerusalem.

Some translations of today's Gospel ascribe rather harsh words to Jesus: in some texts, Jesus speaks of "turning one's back" on family; in other translations, the verb "hate" is used. A more precise translation of the idiom here is whoever **prefers** the love of family or self to Christ cannot be his follower.

The images of the unfinished tower and the king poorly prepared for battle illustrate the frustration and ultimate failure of the disciple who does not give himself/herself totally to the Gospel. When a follower of Jesus begins to hold anything back in imitating Christ, discipleship becomes a charade.
