Good News at last! St Mary's Church, Manly will be open daily from this Monday 11th October for private prayer from 10am – 5pm. When entering the Church you must wear a mask, cleanse your hands, sign in by using the Services NSW QR code or sign on sheet and keep 4sqm apart for social distancing.



St John the Baptist Church, Freshwater is being painted inside and outside and the Church will remain closed until at least the end of next week. This is in preparation for the Church's Centenary celebrations on 20th November 2021. There will be more information to follow.

The Bishop's Roadmap to opening the Churches is included in this bulletin. It is anticipated that our Churches will be open for Mass and Sacraments on the first Monday after NSW achieves 80% double vaccination.

The Parish Office will remain closed to visitors but you can contact the office by phone or email. In the meantime please keep well and active and Fr John, Martino and I look forward to seeing you in the very near future. God Bless Fr David Taylor

**Gospel Reflection** The young rich man in today's Gospel is one of the most sympathetic characters in the Jesus story. Clearly, Jesus' teachings and healings have touched something in him, but his enthusiasm outdistances his commitment. Assuring Jesus that he has kept the "you shall NOTS" of the Law, Jesus confronts the rich young man with the "you SHALLS" of the reign of God: "Go and sell what you have and give it to the poor."

And, as Mark describes it, the man's face fell and "he went away sad." He can't bring himself to do it. His faith is not strong enough to give up the treasure he possesses for the "treasure in heaven." The young man walks away, sad certainly, and perhaps feeling even somewhat disillusioned that his hero Jesus is not what he thought and hoped he would be.



Then Jesus, speaking to his disciples, turns another Jewish belief upside down. Popular Jewish morality was simple: prosperity was a sign that one had found favor with God. There was a definite "respectability" to being perceived as wealthy and rich (how little things have changed). Great wealth, Jesus points out, is actually a hindrance to heaven: Rich people tend to look at things in terms of price, of value, of the "bottom line." Jesus preaches **detachment** from things in order to become completely **attached** to the life and love of God.

Throughout the Gospel, Jesus points to the inadequacy of viewing religion as a series of codes and laws. The young man was no different than his contemporaries in seeing one's relationship with God as based on a series of negatives ("you shall not"). Discipleship is not based on NOT doing and avoiding but on DOING and acting in the love of God. Jesus calls us not to follow a code of conduct but, rather, to embrace the Spirit that gives meaning and purpose to the great commandment.



## A message from Bishop Anthony 30 September 2021

As you are aware the NSW Government has now

published its "Roadmap" from the current COVID restrictions. Broadly, this is envisaged in three segments:

- From the Monday after 70% vaccination rate
  has been achieved (forecast to be Monday 11
  October) various enterprises may open, including
  places of public worship, and be available for
  those who are vaccinated.
- 2. From the Monday after 80% vaccination rate has been achieved, further venues can reopen for those who are vaccinated. Places of public worship ae exempt from this particular restriction.
- **3. 1 December 2021** when COVID vigilance applies to all, irrespective of vaccination status.

The full details of the "80 per cent roadmap" can be found in this <u>fact sheet.</u>

Considering this roadmap and all its implications for the Faithful of Broken Bay, I have determined the following to apply to our own diocese:

- From Monday 11 October our churches are to be reopened for private prayer and devotion only. It is for our people to be mindful of government requirements for this stage of the Roadmap and to engage this opportunity with a sense of responsibility and COVID safety. During this stage:
  - a. The hours of opening of our churches should be available to our parishioners.
  - b. Public Masses remain suspended and "private" Masses with a congregation should not take place. The exception will be the Mass of Ordination at Our Lady of Rosary Cathedral on 18 October and the subsequent three Masses of Thanksgiving for our newly ordained priests.
  - c. Confessions should not be publicly scheduled but most certainly should be available by personal arrangement with the clergy of the parish.
  - d. Baptisms, unless in the event of impending death, should be delayed until the next stage.
  - e. Weddings and funerals: up to 50 people may attend. These need to be vaccinated.
  - f. Those who are unvaccinated may only attend weddings with a maximum number of 5 people.
  - g. Those who are unvaccinated may only attend funeral with a maximum number of 10 people.

- h. It is essential that anyone visiting our churches use the QR code to register their visit, sanitise, and always wear a mask.
- 2. From the Monday after 80% vaccination rate has been achieved, public Masses are to resume in all our churches according to their usual schedule. In accord with the government regulation, the vaccination status of our people who attend our churches, or who undertake a ministry in them, will not need to be verified. Thankfully, this will enable us to go forward together as one community of the Church. As they engage this opportunity, it will be important for our people to make informed decisions about their COVID safety. During this stage:
  - Other rituals such as Baptisms and other services of prayer and devotion may be resumed.
  - b. Confessions should be publicly scheduled again.
  - c. The number of people who can attend Mass and other liturgies and services of prayer is based on the 4 sqm principle (uncapped), including for funerals and weddings.
  - d. Congregational singing will not be possible, but a musician and cantor are possible and should be engaged for the beauty of the liturgy.
  - e. COVID safe practices related to the celebration of our liturgies should be reintroduced including:
    - i. Avoiding the handling of objects by multiple persons;
    - The Chalice is not to be shared; Holy Communion for the Faithful is to be under one species only;
    - iii. The Sign of Peace should only be given by a simple bow or nod of the head.
    - iv. Those who wish to receive Holy Communion on the tongue should be asked to wait until the end of the Communion Procession and the priest should sanitise his hands after each of these communicants.
  - f. It is essential that anyone visiting our churches use the QR code to register their visit, sanitize, and always wear a mask.

Given that our parish facilities other than our church buildings will be subject to the status of people's vaccination it may be that parishes continue to suspend face-to-face parish meetings, social gatherings, and use of facilities such meeting rooms and halls until after 1 December, and that parishes continue to encourage online gatherings. Should parish facilities be opened during this stage, they will be subject to the vaccination status of those who use them, and the 4 sqm principle.

#### 3. From 1 December 2021

- a. Density for gatherings in our churches will shift to one person per 2 sqm for both indoor and outdoor gatherings.
- b. Congregational singing will be possible at our liturgies.
- c. There is no restriction on the use of other parish facilities such as meeting rooms and halls.

I now welcome the NSW Government's roadmap, and particularly the understanding it has demonstrated for places of public worship. I am confident that the staged return I have outlined, in accord with both the spiritual needs of our people and the Roadmap, will ensure our safety and our unity as we journey forward together into the new environment ahead of us.



# Vox Populi - The Voice of the People

## Pray, hope and don't worry" By Ivica Covic

On 23 September, we celebrated the feast day of one of the most loved saints of modern time – Saint Pius of Pietrelcina, commonly known as Padre Pio.

St Padre Pio, famous for receiving the Stigmata, performing miracles, being an extraordinary Confessor and even having the ability to levitate and be at two places at once (how awesome is that!) famously said:

"Pray, hope, don't worry. Worry is useless. God is merciful and will hear your prayers."

But in a time where we are unable to physically receive the sacraments, the LGAs within our Diocese are in extended lockdown, Covid cases still present in our state, and when many are struggling with the impacts of lockdown whether it be psychological, economic or social, how are we supposed to not worry?! It seems way too simple to just pray, hope and not worry. I am sure that at least at some point in this pandemic, we have indeed prayed to our merciful God to hear our intentions, but have we felt listened to?

Padre Pio lived during the time of the Spanish Flu. Not only that, but he also contracted it and survived it. He also suffered from other significant illnesses such as cancer and severe arthritis. So, let us allow ourselves to be consoled by the words of a saint who is relevant to our pandemic situation. Padre Pio knew what it was like to bear pain and suffering and yet still experience a profound joy for Christ, His Church and want to share it with others.

We often find ourselves worrying about many things. Let us recall the interactions of Saints Mary and Martha with Jesus in Chapter 10 of St Luke's Gospel. We recall that Martha was doing all the preparations and serving whilst Mary was at the feet of Jesus. Martha then got upset and approached Jesus, asking Him to demand that Mary help her. But Jesus then replies:

"Martha, you are worried and upset about many things. But only one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the good portion, and it will not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:41-42).

One thing especially that stands out to me from this Gospel passage is that Martha seemed so immersed in her worries, where unlike Mary, she did not realise and see the glory of God before her. We each have our own questions that we ask God: "Why do I have to be doing this all on my own?" "Why is He not listening to me?" "How am I supposed to pay all these expenses?" "Why me?" "What do you want of me, God?" And I'm sure that when we ask 2 these questions, we expect a straightforward answer. And when we don't get a straightforward answer, or even we feel like we don't get an answer, then we keep asking and asking, and our worries become blinding and restrictive.

What Mary did is that she drew as close to Jesus as she could. She was not restrained by her worries, and she realised the glory before her and placed herself at the feet of Jesus – both literally and figuratively. Let us then, like Mary and also like Padre Pio, place ourselves and our worries at the feet of Jesus who is our hope and who gives us peace.

Being hopeful does not mean being naïve to the various problems we are facing individually and as a society. Being hopeful means putting our trust and faith in God – the conqueror all fear, doubt and death.

Saint Padre Pio, pray for us! Saints Martha and Mary, pray for us!

# Why we dedicate the Month of October to the Holy Rosary

It all started in 1571, when the Catholic League entered into battle against the Ottoman Empire to protect Italy from invasion. The Turks were on a warpath to overthrow all of Europe, killing millions of people and forcing Islamic conversion on survivors. They had conquered the Middle East and Mediterranean islands of Cyrus and Crete. Italy was next.

As the impending battle loomed, Pope Pius V called on various religious communities throughout Europe to join him in praying the rosary, including public recitations, to defeat the Islamic threat. Heading into battle, every man in the Catholic League's forces carried a rosary. Their fleet was no match for the competition, vastly outnumbered.

Miraculously, the Catholic League returned victorious after a daylong battle known as the Battle of Lepanto that took place o the coast of Greece. In thanksgiving for Mary's intercession and protection, Pope Pius V declared the day - October 7- as a feast day for Our Lady of the Rosary. To celebrate, a rosary procession was held in Saint Peter's Square.

The presence and protection of our Mother Mary has immense power - requested, channelled, and honoured through the rosary. Her immaculate intercession has won wars and conquered hearts. After the feast day was established, the entire month of October was dedicated to the rosary in 1884 by Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical Superiore Anno:

"Last year, as each of you is aware, We decreed by an Encyclical Letter that, to win the help of Heaven for the Church in her trials, the great Mother of God should be honoured by the means of the most holy Rosary during the whole of the month of October. In this We followed both Our own impulse and the example of Our predecessors, who in times of diculty were wont to have recourse with increased fervor to the Blessed Virgin, and to seek her aid with special prayers."

Although the commitment to the rosary was formalised in 1571, it was an established prayer long before then. The rosary was first given to Saint Dominic by the Virgin Mary during an apparition in 1214 in Prouilhe of southern France. She presented it as a source of strength and grace to persevere in his eorts to convert Albigensian heretics, saying:

"Wonder not that you have obtained so little fruit by your labours, you have spent them on barren soil, not yet watered with the dew of Divine grace. When God willed to renew the face of the earth, He began by sending down on it the fertilising rain of the Angelic Salutation. Therefore preach my Psalter composed of 150 Angelic Salutations and 15 Our Fathers, and you will obtain an abundant harvest."


Saint Dominic went on to found the Order of Preachers, or the Dominicans. The image of Our Lady of the Rosary reenacts this apparition, with Mary holding the child Jesus in one hand and the other hand extending to give the rosary beads to Saint Dominic. Pope Benedict explained the meaning behind the image in a 2007 Angelus:

"This important iconography shows that the Rosary is a means given by the Virgin to contemplate Jesus and, in meditating on his life, to love him and follow him ever more faithfully. It is this message that Our Lady has also bequeathed to us in her various apparitions."

We know it to be one of the most recited and celebrated Catholic prayers - used to implore our Mother Mary for her intercession and blessings. St John Paul II expanded on the rosary's power in his 2002 apostolic letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae, when he announced the Year of the Rosary and the addition of the Luminous Mysteries:

"With the Rosary, the Christian people sits at the school of Mary and is led to contemplate the beauty on the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love. Through the Rosary the faithful receive abundant grace, as though from the very hands of the Mother of the Redeemer."

In the month of October, let us renew our devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary - re-ecting on its origins saving nations and individuals in times

### Gospel

Mark 10:17-30 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Go and sell whatever you have and come follow me.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' The disciples were astounded by these words, but Jesus insisted, 'My children,' he said to them, 'how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God.' They were more astonished than ever. 'In that case' they said to one another 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.'
