32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time – 10th November 2019



This Sunday's readings focus on God being at our side at all times. Through our belief in the resurrection, we are his children. Our God is the God of

the living. In the First Reading it is this belief in the resurrection that gives strength to a mother and her seven children to endure martyrdom, rather than prove unfaithful to the Law. The Psalm is a prayer of trust in God who answers the petitioner's cry. Paul prays for the young church in Thessalonica that they may remain strong and faithful to Christ Jesus in the sure hope of his coming again. The Lord is always faithful, so they can be confident and turn their hearts towards the love of God. (Second Reading). In the Gospel, Jesus answers a treacherous query from the Sadducees. They try to ridicule his belief in the resurrection, but he explains that they have not understood at all the transformation which will take place at the time of resurrection. He does this by using arguments from the Pentateuch which, being Sadducees, they have to accept. Jesus is the God of the living. The Sadducees had

rejected the idea of an afterlife and the resurrection of the dead. So, they think that by posing the right question to Jesus they can show that these are foolish ideas. Jesus, in answering them, does not tell us anything about heaven as such, he simply shows that their reasoning is false because they have too narrow an idea of God. Belief in the resurrection radically changed the way people looked at life. It gave them a new hope that enabled them to live through dreadful hardships and persecutions. For the early church, faith in the resurrection of Jesus was the cornerstone of all their preaching and it was this that allowed a message of indestructible hope to reach many whose lives were filled with despair. As we place our candle at the altar for our loved ones in November, we are letting them go off into what death really is - our finding our way to the arms of God. Words of Pope Francis - "Hope is not looking at a halffull glass, which is simply optimism, which is a human attitude that depends on many things. Christian Hope is a gift of Jesus, of His very self, His very name is hope. It is Christ in you, the hope for glory. This is the eternal hope. which is the root of our joy even in the losses of our lives. Pathways to God/ Donal Neary si/Sean Goan 2019



Environmentally-friendly shopping bags made from RPET, a polyester from recycled plastic bottles @

\$15ea will be sold in Manly before and after Masses this weekend 9th/10th Nov by parishioner, Martine Valentine, on behalf of Sarangi Social Enterprise.

Sarangi empowers marginalised women in Nepal by offering dignified work and training. 100% of Sarangi's profits go towards creating more training and employment opportunities.

Martine, is raising her airfare to volunteer with Sarangi, as a consultant artist, for two murals in January 2020. One mural will be at Lalgadh Leprosy Hospital, a Christian organisation, with an Australian medical connection. It serves Nepalis affected by leprosy, as well as other ill, needy, marginalised, disabled and poor people <u>www.nepalleprosy.com</u>. The other mural will be at the Australian Embassy in Kathmandu.

Sandra Fiedeldy, an Australian woman, established Sarangi alongside local people in 2014. These bags are sewn by refugees and formerly trafficked woman in Nepal. Each bag removes approx 5 plastic bottles from the environment. The designs are original and support indigenous peoples from Nepal & Australia. 

ST VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY "Build Homes, Build Hope" Campaign

The Society is seeking support for its campaign for the NSW Government to increase the supply of social housing by at least 5,000 homes every year for the next ten years.

Across NSW, thousands of people are without a place to call home and many more are living in chronic housing stress. Social housing should be a safety net that supports people experiencing homelessness and housing stress but there isn't nearly enough to meet community needs. More than 53,000 applicants are on the waiting list right now and the waiting time exceeds 10 years in some parts of the state. This figure is extended to over 160,000 with immediate family members.

In response, the Society has launched the "Build Homes, Build Hope" campaign to call on the NSW Government to build more social housing. St Joseph Lilies: St Joseph Lilies symbolise the purity and honesty of St Joseph. He trusted God and was entrusted with the holy honour of taking care of Mary and Jesus. The lights and darks in the painting represent the hard work and many sacrifices made for others by those who love God and who try to serve Him. The

shadows of our wounded world mercifully disappear in the sublime light of His love.

First Holy Communion: A young boy celebrates the Sacrament of the Eucharist, receiving the body of Christ for the first time. There is a lovely look in his eyes and his hands are folded humbly to receive the body of our Lord.





Galway Cathedral: The Galway Cathedral lit up at night, is a celestial sight! It was constructed on the site of the old city prison and is situated on the banks of the River Corrib.


Icon of St Luke the Apostle and Evangelist: This is a copy of an icon of St Luke hand-painted (written) in the traditional 14th Century Greek Orthodox style, using the traditional technique with egg tempera and gold leaf background. St Luke was a Greek physician. He was born in Antioch and



became a disciple of St Paul whom he followed. However, St Luke never met Jesus. The authorship of the Gospel of St Luke and also the Acts of the Apostles is ascribed to him. St Luke is said to be the first icon painter. He painted an icon of the Virgin Mary and baby Jesus. It is believed that he also painted icons of St Peter and St Paul. He faced martyrdom when he was hanged in Greece in March 84 AD. His name means "bringer of light" (Luke). In his Gospel, St Luke mainly emphasises God's Salvation and Mercy.

Catholic Mission Month Dorothy Makasa, Mission Education Officer from Catholic Mission, presented to the Year 3-6 students last week as part of Catholic Mission Month.

Dorothy led the Year 3 and 4 students through an activity called '*Know Me*, which is an interactive and multi-modal story telling workshop. During this workshop several objects were concealed in a bag. Each object represented an issue that significantly affects the lives of children in the Majority World. The students then role-played an action based on that object. Dorothy then shared a story, supported by images, of a Catholic Mission project that meets the needs of children regarding the issue.

During the Year 5/6 workshop, Dorothy took the students through an activity called 'The haves and the have nots,' which is an interactive simulation that explores relevant global issues. The students were randomly designated as a Have or a Have Not at the start of the workshop. Dorothy gave some background information about global inequality and the students personally experienced inequality and its consequences through several scenarios in a simulation game. This activity helped the students gain an appreciation of how many children in our world go without basic needs such as clean water, food, education and housing, while other children have all these things and more. The students found both workshops very engaging and they helped them appreciate the relevance and importance of the work of Catholic Mission. Monique Johnston REC

First Reading

Wisdom 11:22 - 12:2 A reading from the book of Wisdom

You have mercy on all things because you love everything that exists.

In your sight, Lord, the whole world is like a grain of dust that tips the scales, like a drop of morning dew falling on the ground. Yet you are merciful to all, because you can do all things and overlook men's sins so that they can repent. Yes, you love all that exists, you hold nothing of what you have made in abhorrence, for had you hated anything, you would not have formed it And how, had you not willed it, could a thing persist, how be conserved if not called forth by you? You spare all things because all things are yours, Lord, lover of life, you whose imperishable spirit is in all. Little by little, therefore, you correct those who offend, you admonish and remind them of how they have sinned. so that they may abstain from evil and trust in you, Lord.

Responsorial Psalm *Ps* 144:1-2, 8-11, 13-14
