**Great news!** The Covid restrictions for Churches have been eased and we can now accommodate 150 people in the Church at Freshwater and 400 in the Church at Manly both with 2sqm social distancing. We look forward to welcoming all of you back.

This coming Tuesday 8th December at 6pm we will be celebrating our Parish Feast Day Mass of Mary



Immaculate at Manly with Bishop Anthony Randazzo and Fr John (our new assistant priest). We look forward to seeing as many of you as possible, and then meeting with Bishop Anthony and Fr John, for light refreshments afterwards. This Mass will also conclude our 150th Anniversary Celebration of the first Mass celebrated in the first Church at Manly.

We thank you very much for the wonderful response we have had to your booking-in for Christmas Masses. Due to the large number of bookings for Christmas Eve, we have had to reconsider how we do the 5pm Christmas Eve Mass at Freshwater. **By using the undercroft area of the school for an outdoor Mass we can accommodate approximately 285 people seated, whereas the Church is limited to 150 persons. **Reflection...** John's brief appearance in Mark's Gospel begins a new era in the history of salvation. Mark's details about John's appearance recall the austere dress of the great prophet Elijah (2 Kings 1: 8). The Jews believed that Elijah would return from heaven to announce the long-awaited restoration of Israel as God's kingdom. For Mark and the synoptics, this expectation is fulfilled in John the Baptizer. In the Baptizer's proclamation of Jesus as the Messiah, the age of the prophets is fulfilled and the age of the Messiah begins. John's baptism with water is an act of hope and expectation in the Messiah's baptism in the very Spirit and life of God.

Each one of us is called to be a prophet of Christ. The word **prophet** comes from the Greek word meaning "one who proclaims." Not all prophets wear camel skins and eat locusts – there are prophets among us right now who proclaim in their ministries, in their compassion and their kindness, in their courageous commitment to what is right that Jesus the Messiah has come.

To be a prophet of God's justice begins with embracing God's vision of what the world can and should become and then giving one's self totally and unreservedly to realizing that vision. In the baptismal call to become prophets of the God who comes, we are to do the work of transforming the wastelands around us into harvests of justice and forgiveness, to create highways for our God to enter and re-create our world in charity and peace.

As an "Advent people," we are caught (like the Israelites returning to Jerusalem – Reading 1) between a world that is dying and, at the same time, a world waiting to be reborn. The work of Advent is to bring about that rebirth: to prepare a world that is ready for the Lord's coming. *connectionsmediaworks.com*

**SCRIPTURE REFLECTION** The call to repentance lies at the heart of the Advent season. Like the people in today's readings, we, too, are called to a change of heart, as we long for a better world where injustice will cease.

Today's **First Reading** is full of hope and consolation for a nation weary of suffering. God is seen by the prophet Isaiah both as a warrior who fights for his people, and as a shepherd who nourishes and guides them to rest.

The **Psalm** reveals God's inner ways and intentions; he is a God of peace, mercy, faithfulness and justice, who longs to help us.

One of the themes of Advent is that of looking forward to the second coming of Jesus. St Peter advises us to wait patiently. We are to live in a way worthy of our Christian calling; living lives that please God as we allow his peace to fill us. (**Second Reading**).

The **Gospel** underlines how radical John the Baptist was in his calling, just like the Old Testament prophets. His focus was on the need to repent, for people to change their world view and live accordingly. In this way, they will be more open to the teachings of Jesus, so that 'the glory of the Lord shall be revealed' (Isaiah 40: 5).

This week, we might ask for the grace of trust, and to receive the deep love of God into our hearts. God is offering us new life in Christ, empowering us to be his instruments for change in a world torn apart by self-serving actions and fear. *Pathways to God*



#### Manly Catholic Church: An Overview by Patty. Thomas

In 1865 the Mission of Manly Beach was under the control of North Shore Deanery. Fr Bruno Powell from St Leonards (established 1855) was able to visit the Mission only once every three months as his area to cover was from Parramatta to the Hawkesbury and Broken Bay. He called for the creation of a church in Manly as Mass was being celebrated in the Steyne Hotel and private homes ("Strathspey" on Ocean Beach Esplanade and "The Pines" boarding house Denison St and Ocean Beach).

**Freemans Journal 6 May 1965**: stated Dr Powell from St Leonards will be celebrating Mass today on a beautiful site, facing the Pacific that has been liberally donated by Mr Gilbert Smith for the new Catholic Church in Manly.

Dr Powell commented in the homily that this planned Church was due to the earnest zeal of the Catholics of Manly to have a church. The Catholic Mission of Manly Beach has a wide, scattered population of the labouring class, who have limited funds in the erection of their church, however, the mission is visited frequently by daytrippers and holidaymakers to the village of Manly. He saw its potential as a growth area especially as a ferry service had commenced in 1857 from Sydney to Manly.

Fr Callaghan McCarthy, (1826-1894) an Irish priest, came to Manly as a priest in residence in 1866 for a sea change after extensive parish development in the Mudgee parish which at the time reached to the Queensland border. He took upon himself to complete Dr Powell's vision. He set to work building a Church in 1868 and opened in 1869 with the first Solemn Mass on 8 Dec 1869, the feast of Mary Immaculate. He also built the first presbytery at 87 Ocean Rd Manly in 1867.

The small weatherboard church was tendered on 15 Feb 1868 at the cost of one thousand, two hundred and 31 pounds drawn up by Fr McCarthy and builders John Wilson and William Bagnall. The size of the Church was 40 feet length, 18 feet wide and 10 feet high walls. The catholic population in 1869 was under 100 people.

William Bede Dalley (Premier of NSW) commenting on the old Church in 1877. "Here the Holy Sacrifice had been offered for twenty years. Time and the storms, however, had done their work and by 1887 it had become a decaying edifice, - yet dear to the hearts of the people, for not only had it rendered noble service, but it was associated with the spiritual labours of the priests who had served so willingly in the colony." In 1876, Manly was recognised as a parish in its own right under the auspices of the North Shore deanery. The parish covered from The Spit to Broken Bay. The first official parish priest was Rev P Hallinan.

By 1887, the little wooden church was full, so plans were drawn up for a new Church to accommodate the growing population. Fr George Tuckwell had purchased land on the Ocean Beach-Steyne Rd Manly and Cardinal Moran blessed the foundation stone on 12 June 1887. He proposed to call the new Church Mary Immaculate, St Brigid and St Athanasius. Mary Immaculate, because he had been in Rome when the feast of the Immaculate Conception was promulgated, St Brigid, in honour of all the Irish priests who had served the Colony of Sydney (and it was his mother's name) and St Athanasius, a doctor of the Church, in honour of all the priests and seminarians at St Patrick's and their caretaking of the Manly Church.

The site, however, proved too small and another site was found for the new church next to the wooden church linking Whistler St and Francis St. This foundation stone was also blessed by Cardinal Moran on 1 Feb 1891. The nave was completed, and the Church blessed and opened 4 Dec 1892. (Nave was 80ft long x 30ft wide with walls of 25ft). Moran declared in his homily "It is one of the finest most beautiful buildings in Sydney and surrounds....a noble ornament for the village of Manly... faithful to the vision of William Bede Dalley."

A baptistry on the western wall was added in 1896. Altar rails, a confessional and vestment press were added in 1897. It was not until 12 June 1908, that the next foundation stone was blessed for the addition of the transepts, sanctuary and sacristy. The Church was finished thanks to the generosity of a parishioner, Mrs Isabella Dwyer. The Stone Church was blessed and opened 6 June 1909 by Cardinal Moran. The capacity of the Church was 600 persons.

Manly continued growing and in the 1940's Mons John McDonald had plans drawn up to extend the Church again but due to the war and cost building was delayed. The expansion extended the nave to include two side aisles, a narthex, baptistery and mortuary chapel and now accommodated 900 persons. This work was completed and blessed in Sept 1963.

In 1971, Fr Denis Ryan updated the sanctuary adding a freestanding altar, ambo and baptism font all in marble and converted two confessionals into shrines for the Sacred Heart and Mary Immaculate. In 1986, Fr Ryan's dream of a pipe organ was realised with one of the largest pipe organs in NSW by the courtesy of two main benefactors.

In 1995, Fr Phillip Murphy redesigned the sanctuary removing the old high altar to a side altar (previously a side altar to the Sacred Heart) and creating a Blessed Sacrament Chapel with a quote from John 15: "I call you friends". The sanctuary was made one level covering the marble floor and steps and carpeted. The last remaining marble altar rails at the front of the sanctuary (in front of the Blessed Sacrament chapel) were removed. It was at this time 24 Sept 1995 Bishop Murphy first Bishop of Broken Bay blessed and dedicated as now complete.

### **First Reading**

Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11 (JB)

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

#### Prepare the way for the Lord.

'Console my people, console them' says your God. 'Speak to the heart of Jerusalem and call to her that her time of service is ended, that her sin is atoned for, that she has received from the hand of the Lord double punishment for all her crimes." A voice cries, 'Prepare in the wilderness a way for the Lord. Make a straight highway for our God across the desert. Let every valley be filled in, every mountain and hill be laid low, let every cliff become a plain, and the ridges a valley; then the alory of the Lord shall be revealed and all mankind shall see it; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.' Go up on a high mountain, joyful messenger to Zion. Shout with a loud voice, joyful messenger to Jerusalem. Shout without fear, say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God.' Here is the Lord coming with power, his arm subduing all things to him. The prize of his victory is with him, his trophies all go before him. He is like a shepherd feeding his flock, gathering lambs in his arms, holding them against his breast and leading to their rest the mother ewes.

## Second Reading 2 Peter 3:8-14 (JB)

A reading from the second letter of St Peter

We wait for new heavens and a new earth.

The Day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then with a roar the sky will vanish, the elements will catch fire and fall apart, the earth and all that it contains will be burnt up. Since everything is coming to an end like this, you should be living holy and saintly lives while you wait and long for the Day of God to come, when the sky will dissolve in flames and the elements melt in the heat. What we are waiting for is what he promised: the new heavens and new earth, the place where righteousness will be at home. So then, my friends, while you are waiting, do your best to live lives without spot or stain so that he will find you at peace.
