

Part 4 - Final Reflections on the Resurrection

Over the past few weeks, we have examined the evidence for Jesus' Resurrection. We began by exploring the historicity of the Scriptures, explained the uniquely Christian concept of Jesus' bodily resurrection as a spiritual body, and



considered the remarkable growth of Christianity through the witness of the disciples—even in the face of severe persecution. This week, we turn to the Gospel accounts of the disciples' encounters with the risen Christ and consider how these narratives offer compelling evidence for the Resurrection.

The New Testament records that Jesus appeared on about twelve occasions over a period of forty days after His Resurrection. On one of those occasions, He was seen by more than 500 people at once. These accounts provide substantial reason to believe that Jesus did indeed appear to His followers after the discovery of the empty tomb.

In his comprehensive survey of scholarly research on the subject, Gary R. Habermas (2006) notes that there is a strong consensus among researchers that Jesus' followers genuinely believed they had encountered appearances of the risen Christ. It was this conviction, he argues, that propelled the early proclamation of the Gospel. Furthermore, a majority of biblical scholars maintain that the Resurrection is best explained as a supernatural event, rather than as a natural phenomenon such as hallucination or delusion (Spitzer, 2013).

All four Gospels describe Jesus' post-Resurrection appearances in similar ways. Though the details vary slightly, they all present a consistent picture of Jesus' transformed, glorified body. Pope Benedict XVI notes how the disciples struggled to describe this paradox: Jesus possessed a real body, capable of eating, drinking, and being touched—yet He was no longer bound by physical laws. He could appear and disappear at will and pass through locked doors. His body, though physical, had been transformed—clothed in divine glory. Matthew also mentions how His presence evoked worship, an honour that is reserved to God alone (cf. Mt 28:9-10).

Pope Benedict further emphasises that the Resurrection was an "overwhelming reality" for the disciples—so powerful and undeniable that it dispelled every doubt and filled them with a new, fearless determination to bear witness. He also describes the Resurrection as opening a new possibility for human existence: an "evolutionary *leap*" that joins human mortality with the infinite life of God. In this way, Jesus' Resurrection quite literally opens the gates of heaven for humanity.

Another compelling piece of evidence, according to Pope Benedict, is the shift of the **Sabbath observance** by Jesus' disciples from **Saturday to Sunday**—the first day of the week. For first-century Jews to alter such a deeply sacred and Divinely instituted tradition, something extraordinary must have occurred. Pope Benedict argues that only their witness of the Resurrection can adequately account for such a radical and enduring change.

In conclusion, for those to whom this evidence is presented and yet still do not believe, the issue may not be a lack of proof, but rather a need for deeper faith. As Pope Benedict reminds us, God's revelation is gentle. He does not impose belief nor overwhelm us with His power. Instead, He extends an invitation—offering love and seeking it in return.

May our faith in the power of Jesus' Resurrection fill us with the hope and joy of knowing we are destined for eternal life. Amen. . Alfred Soliman – Seminarian





Fifth Sunday of Easter – Year C

First Reading

Acts 14:21-27 (JB)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them.

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe.

They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed.

On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

Gospel Reflection

To those who profess to follow him – from the apostles to us to the very last generation who will inhabit this planet – Jesus gives a "new" commandment, a new standard for all human relationships: as I have loved you, so must your love be for one another. It is that concept of unconditional, sacrificial love that distinguishes us as men and women of faith, as true disciples of the Risen One.

As a Church, we come together at the "command" of Christ to accompany one another through our lives' journeys to the reign of God, to support one another in life's joys and sorrows, to "be Christ" to one another in love and compassion.

Jesus leaves his Church a "new" standard of love, a standard that transcends legalisms and measurements, a standard that renews and re-creates all human relationships, a standard that transforms the most Godless and secular world view into the compassion and justice of God. It is a love that grows stronger the more it is tested, a love that endures and remains steadfast the more it is pulled, a love that continues to heal and forgive the more it is engaged.

Our very identity as disciples of Christ is centered in such persistent and constant love; our faithfulness in imitating the compassion and forgiveness of the Risen One is lived in our openness of heart and spirit to love selflessly, completely and unconditionally, as God has loved us in his Christ.
